## Dust Storm Hits Here As State Gets Rain

### VISION CUT AS SAND STRIKES HERE AT NOON

Dust, blotting out vision in the city, struck here shortly before noon today. The duster was described by some as one of the worst sandstorms experienced here this season.

Accompanied by clouds and lower temperatures, a thin fall of dust was noted early this morning, but the main part of the storm did not arrive until later.

Thunderstorms are seen in east. Thunderstorms brought rain to the interior and eastern parts of Texas today while dust storms again raged in the Texas panhandle.

Rain extended over central Texas from the eastern boundary to Abilene and Del Rio. Dr. Joseph Cline, federal meteorologist, said, "No rainfall was reported along the coast, but the thunderstorms were expected to extend down there by tonight. ... Meanwhile in the panhandle despite bombs which were exploded yesterday and today in attempts to produce rain, the wind switched to the north; the temperature fell to 56 and dust storms were reported blowing.

At Amarillo the visibility was two miles today, but the storm was expected to get worse as north winds carried in dust over the area from western Kansas where zero visibility was reported.

### U. S. Chamber of Commerce Crosses Blades With New Deal 1935 Program

WASHINGTON, May 2 — The United States Chamber of Commerce today vigorously opposed virtually all phases of the New Deal's 1935 program.

The action came as the White House belittled reports of a break between President Roosevelt and the business leaders. ... In a series of strongly worded resolutions, the chamber closed its 23rd annual meeting by urging that: 1.—The present NRA law be allowed to expire and that congress vote a substitute bill on a strictly temporary and limited basis. 2.—And mission of business to regulate itself must be recognized. 3.—The pending utilities bill outlawing holding companies of public utilities not be and regulation of public business not be taken over by the federal government from the stockholders. 4.—The 30-hour work week should not be made into law nor should the proposed permanent labor board be adopted.

### Texas CCC Quota Is Almost Doubled

## SWEETHEARTS FOR 39 YEARS ARE MARRIED

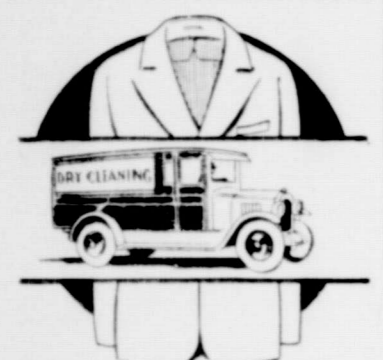

## Garner Lost Fight Over State Flower

VICTORIA, May 2.—Texas's bluebonnet covered hills this spring call to mind the story of how the cotton blossom, instead of the bluebonnet almost became the state flower of Texas.

It was Vice President John N. Garner, then a member of the Texas house of representatives, who waged the unsuccessful battle to have the cotton blossom named the state flower in recognition of the importance of cotton to Texas.

Judge John M. Green of Cuero led the winning fight to have the bluebonnet named. The debate, however, is a classic in Texas parliamentary history. And the defeat of his proposal was one of the few set-backs Garner has ever suffered.

## Simmons and His Message to Texans

"There has been so much misinformation going out by some newspapers and as there are several hundred petitions presented to the parole board asking for commutation of the death sentence to life in the Raymond Hamilton case, it is only fair that the statement of District Attorney Max Rogers should be placed before the reading public," writes General Manager Lee Simmons of the Texas Prison system. "The sentiment of a few misguided folk through misdirected sympathy, in my judgment, is serious. Taken on the unsworn and unsupported statement of Hamilton himself many thousands of people believe his statements to be true are signing petitions entirely ignorant of the fact that honest men in the discharge of their duties have tried his case in the legally constituted courts of the state. And I think this condition being brought about by misled enthusiasm will have more to do in undermining the very foundation of our courts than the criminals at large today."

Manager Simmons presented a summary of the facts and the court's charges in the Hamilton and Palmer cases. Hamilton and Palmer were indicted for the killing of Major Crowson, a prison guard. On the trial of Hamilton it was proved that he had been previously convicted in Fayette county of robbery with firearms and sentenced to life imprisonment and in Hill county for the murder of J. N. Bucher and a life sentence there imposed. It was also proved that while Hamilton and Palmer were confined on the Eastern state farm, Hamilton employed and later paid a convict, who was to be released in a short time, over \$600 to contact his brother, Floyd Hamilton, and Clyde Barrow to the end that automatic pistols and other help, including the presence of Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker in an automobile, armed with machine guns, be furnished with which to effect an escape. In pursuance to this plan the pistols were furnished and the escape was effected as planned by Hamilton and that in effecting the escape Major Crowson was killed.

This evidence the record shows was undisputable, and according to eye witnesses the conspiracy which resulted in the murder of Crowson, a prison guard and an ex-soldier, was originated wholly by Hamilton and not Palmer. The evidence showed that in the break away, Hamilton and Palmer both had automatic pistols and were shooting at both of the guards and that both Crowson and Bozeman were hit and Hamilton shot down Major Crowson in cold blood."

These are the facts as presented by District Attorney Max Rogers and substantiated by Manager Simmons and prison employes who were eye witnesses to the escape of the convicts including Hamilton after a cold blooded murder had been perpetrated. Facts are facts. They should be given to the people of Texas. Criminals should be punished, crime minimized. Justice should be done and the majesty of the law vindicated.

## President Roosevelt's Radio Message

President Roosevelt's message should be read by all people who are able to read, by all the people who think and by all the people who are interested in the welfare of the republic. In that speech the president pledged "no sectional and no political distinctions in distributing the \$4,000,000,000 fund to be used for recovery." He laid down the principles to govern the allotment of money from the \$4,000,000,000 fund: "First, that the projects should be useful. Second, that a large proportion of the money spent should go into wages. Third, that a considerable part of the cost should be returned to the federal government. Fourth, that the money expended on each project should be actually spent during 'the next fiscal year.' Fifth, that the projects should give employment to persons on relief and that these projects should be located in relief areas in relation to the number of workers on relief rolls.

It was a direct from the shoulder address. It was a message of cheer as well as confidence. It came from the heart as well as the brain of the statesman-leader who saved the nation from a revolution of violence. It is for all the people who believe in the institutions of democracy and government of and for and by all the people who prefer the rule of democracy to the rule of the dictator to continue the battle under the banner of F. D. R. until national recovery has been achieved, standards of living have been upheld, jobs are found instead of doles for all men and women who are fit to work and that idlers who refuse to work shall be compelled to earn their bread by the sweat of their brow and the movement of their hands."

## The National Recovery Program

Democrats control the senate and the house of the American congress. They control both branches by huge majorities. They are responsible for the legislation to be enacted and the important legislation or rather measures which have been lock-jammed by the leaders of factions in the senate. These are the major bills on the "must" slate of the president: First, social security. Second, the new banking act. Third, public utilities, holding company legislation. Fourth, measures to improve transportation agencies. Bear in mind these all important measures, (according to the president), are essential factors in a rounded program for national recovery. They are on the calendar of the congress. Favorable committee reports have been made. Under the big dome of the capitol of Texas there is another jam of important measures or bills—all recommended by the governor and his house and senate leaders.

A Roosevelt congress has been grinding since the first of January. The legislature of Texas has been grinding for months and months. Now what will happen to the important measures marked "must" by a democratic president and the important measures marked "must" by a democratic governor—in the immediate future. It will be for the voters to make answer in the campaigns and elections to come.

## UNDER THE DOME AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, May 2 — What becomes of the bills that fail to pass at a session of the state legislature is a mystery to many. More than two-thirds of the proposals are "born to blush unseemly and waste their fragrance on the desert air."

The typed paper that forms the physical make-up of a "bill" is taken at the end of a session by the chief clerk of the house or the secretary of the senate, neatly labeled, indexed, and then delivered to the secretary of state.

There is where the separation takes place between bills that have graduated into "acts" and those that do not make the grade. The lost ones are stored in a dusty vault.

The "acts" are carefully preserved in filing cases.

The occasions are few when either an act or a dead bill is taken physically from its abiding place in the office of the secretary of state.

Printed copies of the acts are accepted and used in most court proceedings. Occasionally there is a call for a "certified" copy. Then the act is taken out, transcribed, the copy double checked and a notation made under oath that the copy is true and correct.

Employees of the office do not recall any specific requests to produce unpassed bills. Such requests have

been made, however, usually by some one planning to draft a new bill on the same topic.

Only the official bill goes to the office of the Secretary of state. Beside it there are 300 printed copies. If the bill has hurried its first passage and won a favorable committee report, some local bills, escape printing and a few general bills get by with mimeographing to save time.

The usual bill is printed. It is printed on standard size paper. Each line is numbered. Copies are given to every member. The line number are for convenience in proposing changes. Rules require that the amendment specify the page, section and line.

The printed bills are junked at the end of a session.

The bills that finally pass are triple checked to secure accuracy. Sometimes a mistake occurs, despite that precaution. The chances for error are numerous. Few go through the house and senate without any amendment. The amendments are designated by the journal clerks.

Upon passage, the bill with the amendments is engrossed. Then, after it has passed both branches of the legislature, it is enrolled in the book where it originated. A committee gives it the "OK."

Signatures of the lieutenant governor and speaker, certified by the chief clerk of the house and secretary of the senate, then are inscribed.

The signing must be done publicly while the house and senate are in session. The governor's signature, attested by the secretary of state, makes the bill finally a law.

Before a bill takes effect, it must wait 90 days and after the close of the session at which it was enacted. This wait can be avoided by an

emergency clause citing the need of immediate action. The clause is valueless on the bill unless it receives two thirds of the House vote and two thirds of the senate vote.

"Personal privilege" is used as an excuse by many legislators to talk their way out of a bill. They would keep their silent otherwise. Sen. Wally K. Hopkins, Gonzales, used "personal privilege" in its true sense last Friday.

At 4:45 p. m. he had an amendment pending on a bill before the senate. Long winded senators dropped in with no indication when they would vote on the amendment. Hopkins glanced anxiously at the clock.

"Mr. President," he said, "I want to speak on personal privilege. I have just fifteen minutes to get a bath, a shave, dress and get to my wedding rehearsal. I wish the senators would vote."

Sen. Clint Small of Amarillo, also asserted personal privilege to speed a vote on his bill to stop natural gas waste. He got the senators to hold a night session and vote upon it, so he could return home in time to appear in an important law suit.

**International Road Survey Is Started**  
McALLEN, May 2 — Engineers from the state of Nuevo Leon, Mexico, are at work here surveying the road, which will give McAllen a fast highway to Monterrey and other interior points of Mexico.

The International Reynosa-Monterrey highway committee set up by the McAllen Chamber of Commerce, expects to have the all-weather road completed to Monterrey by the end of this year.

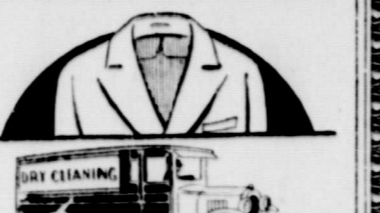

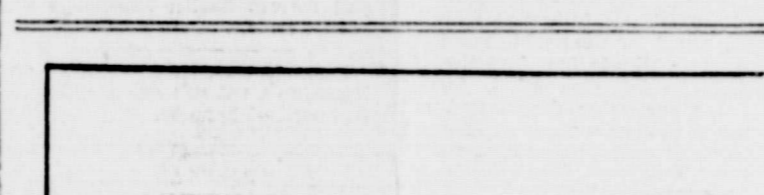
### RAIN FROM BOMBING SUGGESTION RAISES BIG ARGUMENT AT DALHART

### Valley Onion Crop Is Badly Damaged

LAREDO, May 2 — Because of heavy thrip damage, estimated at between 25 and 30 per cent, the Bermuda onion crop in this region is estimated at 900 carloads, 400 carloads less than 1934.

Peak of the movement from this territory is expected to be reached about April 25, approximately five days later than last season.

More than 230 cars have been shipped out in spite of the strike of onion workers which has impeded shipments.

**Expert Urges Study For Married Life**

"Most marriages are reasonably happy," Father Reilly believes, "because most persons learn how to make compromises with difficulties. Preparation for matrimony and family life is necessary because marriage is the most important natural institution on earth."

Education for marriage should not have an exaggerated emphasis on physiological sex education, he said. Objectives in education for wedded life outlined by Father Reilly are correct ideas, habits and attitudes relative to marriage; a judicious choice of a life partner; and correct health knowledge and health habits.

# RELIEF LOADS FOR COUNTIES ARE LIGHTER

AUSTIN, May 2 — April relief loads in the various counties of Texas are lighter than those carried during March, statistics compiled on the basis of estimates submitted by county administrators to the Texas Relief Commission reveal.

Although only four counties have less than five per cent of their population on the rolls, the number in the respectable class—those having between five and ten per cent of their population on the rolls—increased from 14 in March to 20 in April.

Counties with less than five per cent of their people on relief rolls were Crockett, Kenedy, Lavaca and Winkler.

Counties with from five to ten per cent of their population receiving aid included Hays, Pecos, Hutchinson, Carson, Crane, Upton, Reagan, Glasscock, Terrell, Cameron, Hidalgo, Kieberg, Nueces, San Patricio, Bee, Karnes, Gonzales, Fayette, Austin and Fort Bend.

"Most cheering fact from this study is that only four counties, all of them in drought-stricken West Texas, have more than 40 per cent of their inhabitants on the rolls," said E. A. Baugh, assistant director of the Relief Commission. "Last month, there were 12 counties in this unfortunate condition."

Counties in this "over 40 per cent" group are Stonewall, Kent, Yoakum and Cochran. All other counties in the state have caseloads ranging from 10 to 40 per cent of the population.

The estimated caseload for April is 270,739; the estimated number of persons, 1,110,029, the percentage of the state's population on relief rolls, 18.88.

The first fact to be revealed is that fewer persons nowadays are living to be 100, in spite of the fact that many more get past the 20's, 30's and 40's. The second is that women live longer than men.

The figures on which these state- ments are based are the following: In 1901, there were 313 persons 100 years or more old in France, 214 women and 99 men. In 1911, there were 107, 82 women and 99 men. Since then there has been no census of aged persons, and French gov- ernment records lump all those over 80—of whom, according to the 1926 census there were 164,295 men and 275,360 women, or 132 women and 83 men to every thousand in- habitants. A private census, believed to have caught two-thirds of the centenarians reported 56 women and 10 men 100 or over, divided thus: Women: 100, 39; 101, four; 102, 3; 103, six; 104, two; 105, one; 106, one.

**SAY OIL MEN HAVE WASTED 62 MILLIONS**

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., May 2.—Careless and ruthless oil men have wasted \$62,877,000 worth of Arkansas' oil and gas supply Dr. George C. Branner state geologist has computed.

The orgy of waste began when the Dusey discovery well was drilled in west of El Dorado in 1921. Operators went wild with the boom town mania and worked feverishly with but one objective—to get oil out of the ground as fast as possible and on the way to market.

Natural Gas Wasted  
No one cared how many thousand cubic feet of natural gas it took to raise a barrel of oil through the casing to the surface. That disregard appeared with wanton sameness throughout the 10 production areas discovered around El Dorado up to 1928.

Then came the day of reckoning. No new sands could be discovered, natural flow stopped in the wells and the fields "went on the beam." Each stroke of the pumping beams has punctuated a rebuke of wasteful operation.

Oil men have learned their lesson now but perhaps too late. Natural gasoline plants — "cracking" plants — are piping gas from Louisiana to supplement the deficient Arkansas supply. The operators have learned economy too. After they extract the gasoline from the gas they return the gas to the producers to use as fuel.

**Huge Losses Incurred**

"It is difficult, if not impossible, to calculate with any degree of accuracy the losses incurred by the wasteful operation," Dr. Branner said, "but they may be classified as follows:  
(1) Loss of the gas itself; (2) the loss of the gasoline vapor carried by the gas, and (3) the material reduction in the quantity of oil recoverable from the oil sands by present production methods due to the reduction of gas pressure in these sands."

The latter is the greatest loss. South Arkansas produced 407,881,000 barrels of oil during the period 1921-1934 inclusive, Dr. Branner computed. Ultimate economic production under present methods is 480,000,000 barrels. If the gas had been conserved, he said, the recovery might have been increased 10 per cent, or about 48,000,000 barrels with an estimated value of \$43,900,000.
