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SENATORS DELAY PATMAN BONUS BILL

SEEKING FULL STRENGTH FOR VETO VOTING

WASHINGTON, May 8. — The Patman bonus bill was tied up in the senate today by a maneuver designed to protect it from a speedy presidential veto that might catch its supporters off guard.

Senator Elmer Thomas, democrat, Oklahoma, directed the movement as a means of delaying action until several who favor the bill can be present for a vote to override the almost certain veto.

WASHINGTON, May 8. — President Roosevelt indicated today at a press conference that he might not wait his allotted 10 days to veto the Patman bonus bill.

Do you think the president will veto the Patman bill? he was asked. "President Roosevelt is too clever a politician to veto the bill," Father Coughlin retorted.
