Sunday ought to be made a day of rest for a lot of overworked speedometers.

The Monday newspaper everywhere has become a motor casualty list. One is tempted to look down the columns not for whether automobile accidents occurred but whether one's friends were among the victims.

And this situation prevails largely because speedometers have been overworking. Despite all that has been said that at times it is safe for autoists to attain high speed the facts are that it is not safe. Just where the dividing line between safety and danger lies is for others to determine, but high speed in the popular sense is nine times out of ten the cause of accidents.

A car runs off a bridge. It could not if the car were under control. One car is rammed by another. Even the victim car might have avoided the accident had its speed been lower. A child is run down. More often than not this tragedy might be averted if the automobile were going slower. In most instances speed, even speed within the law, is responsible for the bloodshed and the property damage.







#### Trench Silo Said To Prevent Losses

SHIRO, Tex., May 9 -J. E. Neaon, Grimes county farmer of this ommunity, has designed a trench ilo to prevent losses on undrained

His method of construction provides a special drainage system for the silo and he predicts that farmers will save thousands of dollars if they copy it.

Neason solved the caving problem by sealing the sides with pine boards. He placed 14-foot oak poles in four consecutive rows and formed three bins by tacking wire netting along each row of poles. He covered the insilage with six

inches of soil and constructed dirt bank on the rim of the silo to prevent surface water from running into it. Wall spoilage was reduced by this method. On feeding, he exposed only one

ection of the silo at a time, thus reducing spoilage from exposure. Neason said the three-bin silo is qual to the ordinary trench silo 120 feet long, 10 feet wide and seven feet deep. Capacity was 121 tons. Total expense of the silo was appreximately \$40.
