The Mysterious Rays—What Next?

The X-ray started it. Then radium rays and radio rays and various others, each wonderful in itself and working wonders. Mysterious rays, controlled by man, are used to cure disease and measure the distance of the stars and make atoms visible and tell the secrets of creation. Now we have a "cathode ray" which among other things kills bacteria and insects, turns sugar to acid, promotes hair growth, solidifies liquids, makes solids luminous without heat, turns invisible gases into visible powder of unknown nature, creates an enamel harder, tougher and more heat resisting than any yet known—and the discoverer has hardly started experimenting with it. "Everything is electricity." Scientists are now verifying that old guess. They find matter itself made up of electrical particles in inconceivably rapid motion. Moving and combining in many different ways, they make all the visible variety of the universe and throw out all the waves and rays that science has discovered, and doubtless many more. It will be ages before we exhaust the possibilities of these rays. It seems that Kipling in his prophetic romance, "With the Night Mail," foretold a reality of this sort when he had his imaginary airship, powered by a mysterious "U-ray," for now we power our airships by radio control. And we have just started the possibilities of the radio wave, long and short.

The Stronger Sex—Which?

With women breaking all these long-distance swimming records, including the long, hard pull from Albany to New York, it seems silly to speak any more of women as the "weaker sex." There is no harder exercise than swimming, and women are beating men at it right along. Men may still show a higher average of strength; but pound for pound and inch for inch, the women may outdo them in many another physical test. It is just as well, though, for women not to boast too much of this physical prowess. It is a case where a "decent reticence" is good policy. Civilized man has almost forgotten how, in the old savage and semi-savage days, the women did nearly all the hard work. The example set by the American aborigines in that respect is overlooked. If women rub it into their foolish "lords and masters" about their respective athletic ability, the male sex may wake up again, take them at their word and let them do all the work as of yore.

However, if woman takes over the job of family support it will likely be by means of a job calling for intelligence rather than muscular strength. That actually seems on the way now and very evident. Cold Air or Water for Colds

Enormous harm has come from calling a "cold" by a name which seems to imply that it comes from cold weather or cold air. As doctors explain patiently, the opposite is the case. They are caused not by the cooler air of autumn, but by the overheating to which people subject themselves indoors. The starting of the furnace, the turning on of steam heat, always brings an epidemic of colds. The "common cold" is probably the most dangerous of all diseases, not in itself but because it leads to so many diseases that may be fatal. Cold air, a health officer explains again, is the very best protection against colds. Sleep as nearly as possible in the same temperature as the outside air, the year round. Open the windows and close the bedroom doors, so that the sleeping quarters are wholesomely cool and the air wholesomely moist, while the rest of the house remains warm. Use enough warm light bed clothing to sleep comfortably—there is no merit in

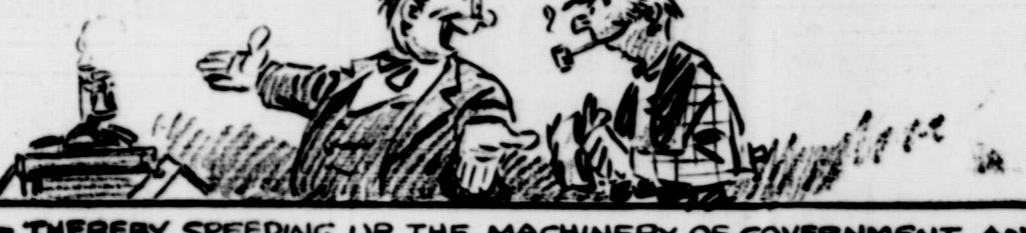

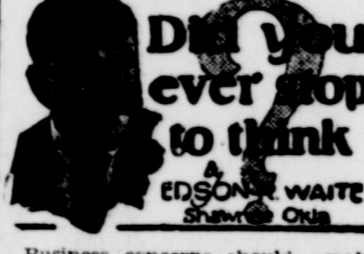
discomfort. Keep the house temperature at 68 to 70 degrees. Spend as much time as possible out of doors, regardless of the weather. But in doing so, keep dry, or else keep warm by exercise while wet and then put on dry clothing as soon as you get home. Cold air or cold water never gives anyone a cold. It sets up resistance against susceptibility to colds. But weakening one's body by living in an overheated atmosphere, or getting into a perspiration and then letting oneself be chilled by inactivity in cold air—that gives the cold germs and pneumonia germs and bronchitis germs the chance they are looking for.

Some of our more hardy Ciscoans practice cold baths and outdoor swimming through the coldest weather. We have not heard of their having colds.

Perhaps later our fine swimming pool will be used all winter and colds in Cisco will disappear almost entirely.

The Inactive Ph. D.'s

The American Historical association is trying to find out why men and women who have taken the advanced collegiate degree of "Doctor of Philosophy" do not produce. It wants to know why all these young people devote from three to five years apiece to original study and research, write the required theses, pass the examinations and are never heard from again. It thinks more of them ought to engage in "productive scholarship." It is plain, said Prof. Dana C. Munro of Princeton, that the main fault resides in the financial value of the Ph. D. degree. Most students in graduate schools are after the academic prestige of the degree, so they can get higher incomes when they embark on teaching careers. Theoretically, at least, the person with the degree has put into himself the extra knowledge required to get it, and is by so much better fitted to teach. Practically, however, the student who shuts himself away from life to the extent necessary to become a doctor of philosophy is apt to unfit himself for handling the necessary human contacts of the teaching profession. He is apt to "bear his eyes with books," to acquire a belief that scholarship is valuable for its own sake, without relation to life. If productive scholarship means the writing of more abstruse tomes or wordy commentaries on unimportant matters, the ordinary citizen would just as soon the Ph. D.'s continue to disappear leaving no trace. But if productive scholarship means turning results or research into ordinary living, then the more productive our philosophers are, the better.

Texas Topics

AUSTIN, May 18 — Editors, law-yeers and farmers will just for a place in the Texas senate as successor to Sen. Clint C. Small, representing one of the largest districts in the state. Rep. H. K. Standfield, Amarillo, lawyer and Rep. B. L. Rogers, Ochiltree farmer and merchant already have disclosed their purpose to be in the race. Deskin Wells and widely known Wellington newspaper editor, also will run. John Sturgeon, Pampa lawyer, is expected to be a candidate; and former Rep. Clyde Warwick, Canyon newspaper editor-publisher, is a likely candidate. Friends will urge James O. Guleke, Amarillo lawyer, now member of the state board of education, to offer for the place.

Sen. Small will retire at the end of this session; and his friends have understood there is a strong likelihood he may resign after the special session, to accept one of several important law connections proffered to him in San Antonio and Houston. If he resigns a special election will fill the vacancy. Rep. Bob Alexander of Childress, whose district is partly in Sen. Small's senatorial district, will not be a candidate for the senate. Mr. Alexander has stated. Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Dabell, Deaf Smith, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hansford, Hartley, Hemphill, Oldham, Hutchinson, Lipscomb, Moore, Ochiltree, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Roberts, Sherman, Swisher and Wheeler.

Cong. J. P. Buchanan will be urged to cause the nationwide inquiry to be started in Texas under U. S. Sen. Norris' resolution to investigate the source of litigation attacking, obstructing and delaying municipal and public operation of utilities services. Sen. Norris charged that the utility companies had prompted or filed numerous suits designed to prevent or delay cities and public agencies of government from building, taking over or operating water and light plants and other utilities. His resolution calls for an investigation and report on the source of all such litigation, the expenses forced upon cities, districts and governmental agencies, the amount of money spent by the utilities in conducting the suits, and the effect of these expenditures on the rates the utilities charge consumers.

Two such cases have developed recently. Clarence R. Wharton, Houston utility lawyer, filed a "friend of the court" plea in the mandamus test suit of Lower Colorado River Authority to establish validity of its interstate bonds. Mr. Wharton did not disclose the name of his client, it was pointed out in the answer of the Colorado attorneys in the supreme court case.

Recently, suit was brought in the name of individuals seeking to restrain U. S. Secretary Ickes from making a loan to the city of Terrell and to prevent Terrell officials from receiving it, for the improvement of municipal utilities. The Wharton attack upon federal financing of interstate public projects would, the answer said, strike down loans to the University of Texas and numerous colleges, and to cities, would invalidate the relief grants and state planning board law, the Brazos and all public water control, navigation and improvement developments, where federal money was sought for projects not of an interstate nature.

French People See Marie's Prayer Book

CHALONS-SUR-MARNE, France, May 18 — What is perhaps France's most famous prayer book has attracted more than a million visitors here during the past half century. It is the prayer book of Marie Antoinette, and contains the farewell message which she wrote to her children on October 16, 1793, a few hours before she mounted the scaffold. The message reads: "At 4:30 o'clock in the morning, My God! Have pity upon me! My eyes are filled with tears, as I weep for you, my poor dear children. Farewell! Farewell! Marie Antoinette."

Then, with a serene conscience and a stalwart heart, she went to her death. Thousands admire her courage which probably explains why such large numbers of visitors come to behold and admire this volume. It was printed in 1757 and came into her possession 20 years later. Following her execution, Robespierre hid it in his bed, but after he became a victim of the Revolution, it passed into other hands. Finally in 1885, it was given to the Chalons Library. It is a fine example of the book-binder's art, and has an intrinsic value which is increased by the last words that Marie Antoinette ever wrote.

FORTUNE AWAITS MAN

WELFARE FUND PLAN SUCCESS IN SHEBOYGAN

SHEBOYGAN, Wis., May 18 — A fund-raising plan for community welfare projects devised and put into operation by Charles E. Broughton, editor and publisher of the Sheboygan Press, proved so successful here that other communities in many sections of the country have asked for an outline.

Several years ago a community welfare fund was established to supplement state and federal relief funds. Purpose of the fund was to help finance municipal welfare organizations which did not fall in the category of regular relief organizations.

Fund Always Short
The idea was praised and generally conceded to be of benefit. The fund was to be raised by voluntary contributions. Contributions for the most part, however, were limited to cheer. The prevailing idea seemed to be to let the other fellow donate my share, he makes more than I do. Hence the fund always had been at low ebb.

Thoroughly satisfied
Broughton exploited it in his newspaper and over his radio station, urging other employers to adopt the idea. The idea caught on immediately.
Over subscribed
A 10-day campaign was inaugurated on Dec. 3, 1933, with \$48,000 believed to be an unattainable figure, set as the goal. Inside the designated time limit, 8,000 individuals had pledged \$49,000 — an over-subscription of \$4,000. The number of contributors had actually doubled under the new plan. Previously the highest number of donors was less than 4,000.
