

Cold Air or Water for Colds

Enormous harm has come from calling a "cold" by a name which seems to imply that it comes from cold weather or cold air. As doctors explain patiently, the opposite is the case. They are caused not by the cooler air of autumn, but by the overheating to which people subject themselves indoors. The starting of the furnace, the turning on of steam heat, always brings an epidemic of colds. The "common cold" is probably the most dangerous of all diseases, not in itself but because it leads to so many diseases that may be fatal. Cold air, a health officer explains again, is the very best protection against colds. Sleep as nearly as possible in the same temperature as the outside air, the year round. Open the windows and close the bedroom doors, so that the sleeping quarters are wholesomely cool and the air wholesomely moist, while the rest of the house remains warm. Use enough warm light bed clothing to sleep comfortably—there is no merit in

WELFARE FUND PLAN SUCCESS IN SHEBOYGAN

SHEBOYGAN, Wis., May 18 fund-raising plan for community welfare projects devised and put into operation by Charles E. Broughton, editor and publisher of the Sheboygan Press, proved so successful here that other communities in many sections of the country have asked for an outline

Several years ago a community welfare fund was established to supplement state and federal relief funds. Purpose of the fund was to help finance municipal welfare organizations which did not fall the category of regular relief organ-

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Fund Always Short idea was praised and generally conceded to be of benefit. The fund was to be raised by voluntary contributions. Contributions for the most part, however, were limited to cheers. The prevailing idea seemed to be to "let the other fellow donate my share, he makes more than I Hence the fund always had been at low ebb. Subscriptions had always fallen far short of their quotas until Broughton conceived

Before expounding his theory Broughton tried it in his own plant with success.

It was this: Each full-time ploye pledged one hour's pay month toward the fund. Half and part time employes contributed half hour, or quarter hour month, depending on the time employed. Broughton matched every dollar put up by his employes. Thus to their \$700, he added \$700, giving the community fund \$1,400.

Thoroughly satisfied, Broughton exploited it in his newspaper and over his radio station, urging other employers to adopt the idea. The Over Subscribed

A 10-day campaign was inaugu rated on Dec. 3, 1935, with \$45,000 believed to be an unattainable figure, set as the goal. Inside the designated time limit, 8,000 individuals had pledged \$49,000 — an oversub-scription of \$4,000. The number of contributors had actually doubled under the new plan. Previously highest number of donors was less than 4.000.

The contributions all were voluntary, Broughton said. Although all were urged to co-operate, no one was forced to contribute a penny and all employes were given to understand that their positions would be in no way affected regardless o whether they contributed or not.



DEADWOOD, S. D., May 18-The recent rise in the price of silver has focused the eyes of the mining world on Galena, center of the silver industry in the northern hills since the late '70's. The Double Rainbow Mines Corporation is expected to re-sume operations in silver and lead mines at Galena in the near future. With silver at 77.57 cents, mines can be reopened and operated at a profit according to local mining

Early prospectors searching for gold found the vein of almost pure galena which gives the town name and located the famous Sitting Bull and Richmond claims now part of the Double Rainbow holdings. It was over these two adjoining claims that Col. J. H. Davey, owner of the Sitting Bull, and Pat Duggar then owner of the Richmond, had their famous feud which finally was settled by one of the most important decisions ever returned by a minin

The ore vein had its top or Davey's claim and its apex underground on Duggan's holdings. Duggan accused the fiery Colonel of dipping into the ore vein on Daggan's property and declared that Colonel Davey under no circumtances had any right to go over the

end lines of the claims. The Colonel, however, felt that nasmuch as he was only following the vein he had found on his claim he was going to keep right on digging regardless of how much Dug-gan might object. He did. He threw up a bulwark underground placed armed guards between the lines and in this way, was able to remove most of the ore before Duggan could tunnel into his own claim from the top and drift toward the ore vein.

lowed, one of Duggan's men was killed by the Davey forces. Duggar then obtained an injunction closing all the properties involved and proceeded to bring suit against Colonel Davey for damages.

The case after months of waiting finally reached Judfe J. H. Church inthe United State District Court After a 65 day hearing the cour arrived at a decision in favor of the plaintiff, Davey then appealed to the Supreme court, but before a decision could be handed down, had exhausted his funds.

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









































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
