
### Mere Man, the Imitator





Eight republicans and four democrats voted against the bill. Forty-nine democrats, 12 republicans, one progressive and one farmer-laborite voted for it. Bailey of North Carolina, Byrd of Virginia, Burke of Nebraska and Tydings of Maryland cast the democratic votes. There are two house bills calling for the enactment of the Wagner proposal and the 50-hour work week senate bills by Black of Alabama. Organized labor will celebrate (by the largest gathering of wage-workers in history and a huge parade) in the city of New York on May 23. Of course the house has not acted on the Wagner bill, but all the representatives will be up for reeleection and 90 per cent are fence builders and are striving to save their jobs in the nationwide balloting to take place in 1936.
