New Battleships For U. S. Navy

All powerful nations of the world are planning construction of new terrorists of the seven seas. This includes the nations whose rulers have refused to pay their war loans to the United States. Uncle Sam is wise. His senators voting 55 to 18, provided \$460,000,000 for a peacetime navy, including funds for 24 new battleships. These new vessels on paper are part of the program to make the United States navy second to none by 1942. The house of representatives provided funds for only 12 ships but it was explained at the time of passage that the money for the other 12 could be provided later in a deficiency bill. Now the naval bill carrying the largest peacetime appropriation goes to conference to adjust differences between the senate and house versions.

Grover Cleveland was elected President of the United states in 1884. William C. Whitney of New York was his secretary of the navy. At that time the American nation had no naval ship worthy of the name. Whitney, who was a many times millionaire, laid the foundations of the navy of today. Now it is for another democratic administration to plan for American naval ships that will cover the seven seas should an emergency arise in future years. Great Britain will spend millions and millions for the protection of British interests in every land under the sun; Japan has a navy that is the pride of its people and an army made up of fighters who are thoroughly trained and in the near future may become the real conquerors of all oriental lands. Why not Uncle Sam?

Wallace and his sub-chiefs are redrafting a bill, which was hauled from its position on the senate floor and sent to the senate agricultural committee, there to be operated upon. All American farmers are interested in AAA legislation and the power to be carried in future by the department of agriculture. There is going to be New Deal legislation, in a certain sense, and the supreme court decision, or rather the words of the decision, will be the guide of those who are reframing the measures and the licensing power to be given to the secretary and his farm setup.



California Using Marketing Pacts

BERKLEY, Cal., June 1-Twelve marketing agreements for California speciality crops already are in effect and eight more are pending according to reports of the University of California Agricultural Extension Service. They are in addition to the socall-

ed basis crop reduction programs such as cotton, corn and hogs, sugar beets, rice and wheat, all of which are produced in the state.

Two of the 12 agreements take in territory outside the state: the citrus agreement in California and Arizona, and walnuts in California, Washington and Oregon. The other crops under controlled marketing are Gravenstein apples, asparagus, dates, fresh decidous fruits except apples, Tokay grapes, ripe canning olives canning cling peaches, dried prunes and raisins. The eight now pending are Bart-

lett pears and Royal Anne cherries, affecting California, Washington, Oregon and Idaho hops, California Washington and Oregon almonds canning asparagus, wine grapes. clingstone peaches and
