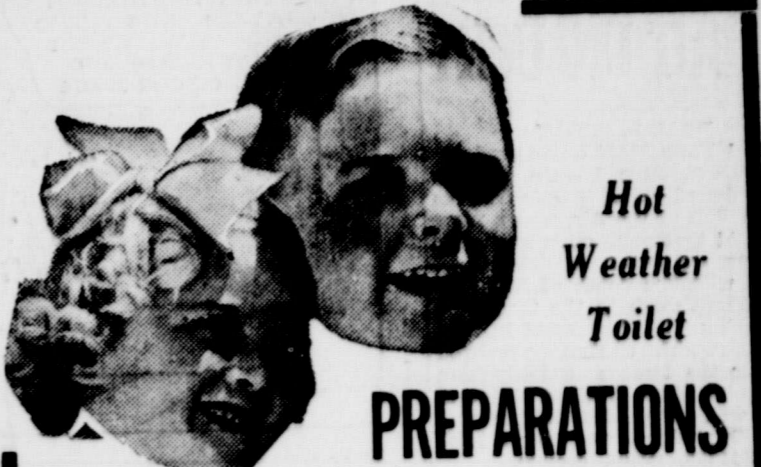
Judge Davenport Explains Action Of District Court On Marble Machines

KING IS GOOD HORSE JUDGE BUT UNLUCKY

LONDON, June 1—On the day King Edward VII of Britain died his filly, Witch of the Air, won a race. It is said that some of his last words were an expression of delight.

And with the death of King Edward there came to the throne a sailor king, little interested in the racing world. Men wondered whether the famous Sandringham stud, established by King Edward, which won for him \$730,640 in stakes and with stud fees and sales a total of \$2,463,115, would decline.

They need not have feared, for even if King George is not very interested in racing, he has at least maintained the Edwardian tradition. It has been said that he is even "a better judge of a horse than his father," but what he has lacked has been his father's luck.

Three Derby Winners
King Edward won three Derbies with Persimmon, Diamond Jubilee and Minora. King George has never had a horse good enough even to show in the big classic, and, in fact, he has only had one classic winner in his racing career—Scuttle, who won the One Thousand Guineas in 1928.

The King has had few big winners and he still has a long way to go before he equals his father's record. Among his best have been Weather-vane, which won the Royal Hunt Cup in 1923, Runnymede, London Cry, Aloysia and Limglight, who won the Hardwicke Stakes at Ascot in 1933. It was a great race. Ridden by the King's veteran No. 1 jockey, Joe Childs, Limglight and two others were battling it out a hundred yards from home.

At fifty yards Limglight wobbled. The heavy weight of 136 pounds was beginning to tell. But Limglight had a big heart. He answered his jockey's calls and flashed past the post a winner by the merest margin.

Has Small Stable
The King cannot afford a big stable. He has only seventeen horses in training at present, but the best horse he has ever had was Friar Marcus, some twenty years ago. He was the perfect model of a sprinter. He was never beaten as a two-year-old, winning all his five races. It was hoped to train him up to classic form, but he proved to be nothing more than a sprinter.

Cheap Phone Call Time Is Increased

Reduced long distance telephone rates on night "station-to-station" calls for years available only between 8:30 p. m. and 4:30 a. m. hereafter will be in effect between 7:00 p. m. and 4:30 a. m. and hour and half earlier. This advance in the time for cheapest long distance service was announced by the Southwestern Bell Telephone company today.

Tariff revisions for this change on interstate calls were filed voluntarily a month ago with the Federal Communications Commission and became effective today.

Reductions apply when the day rate is more than thirty-five cents. "Person-to-person" calls are unaffected by the change.

A new reduced rate not offered heretofore is also effective today on transatlantic telephone service. Between 5:00 p. m. and 5:00 a. m. calls will cost \$9.00 less than formerly.

CONNECTICUT'S EARLY BLUE LAWS PROVIDED DEATH FOR BLASPHEMY

HARTFORD, Conn., June 1—One by one, during the 300 years that Connecticut has out-grown its original settlement founded by a small band of pioneers from the Massachusetts Bay Colony, the "Blue Laws" which ruled with an iron hand have been erased from the statute books.

The tercentenary celebration of the state sent many poring over the pages of history. They found in early days that the death penalty could be inflicted for: Stealing an ear of corn from a neighbor's garden. Blaspheming God. A youth of 16 years or more to strike or curse his parents. To be a stubborn or rebellious son.

Return to the colony after being banished as a Quaker, or a Roman Catholic priest. Witchcraft, treason, adultery or rape.

And, it also was found that they were called "Blue Laws" because they first were written upon blue paper.

Blue Sundays
The Sabbath was strictly observed. One was not permitted to saunter about in his garden, kiss his wife, or a mother kiss her child, all household duties were abandoned, except eating, and all food had to be cooked at least the day before. The Sabbath began at sundown Saturday night.

The General Court dealt severely with scandal-mongers. Early offenses were punishable by fines.

Repeaters went to the stocks and chronic offenders faced a magistrate's court after a public whipping. The magistrate's court invoked the death penalty.

Announced by Crier
Before the laws were reduced to writing, the town crier announced them in a public place at regular intervals.

In case it was found a law had not been made for some specific offense, the violator was judged under this concluding clause in the fundamental law of the colony: "For want of a law in any particular case he shall be judged by the word of God."

There is no record of such judgments.

California Using Marketing Pacts

BERKELEY, Cal., June 1—Twelve marketing agreements for California specialty crops already are in effect and eight more are pending according to reports of the University of California Agricultural Extension Service.

They are in addition to the so-called basis crop reduction programs such as cotton, corn and hogs, sugar beets, rice and wheat, all of which are produced in the state.

Two of the 12 agreements take in territory outside the state: the citrus agreement in California and Arizona, and walnuts in California, Washington and Oregon. The other crops under controlled marketing are Gravenstein apples, asparagus, dates, fresh deciduous fruits except apples, Tokay grapes, ripe canning olives, canning cling peaches, dried prunes and raisins.

The eight now pending are Bartlett pears and Royal Anne cherries, affecting California, Washington, Oregon and Idaho hops, California, Washington and Oregon almonds, canning asparagus, wine grapes, canning clingstone peaches and apricots.

MAY 21 is the 54th birthday of the American National Red Cross. Organized in 1881, under the leadership of Clara Barton, this society has grown fast, until today it has more than 3700 chapters throughout the United States and its possessions, with a membership of nearly 4,000,000.

The inadequacy of army medical staffs in early wars led to organization of the Red Cross. The international society was formed in 1864 and almost immediately nations agreed to respect neutrality of the Red Cross workers in battle. The United States joined this agreement a year after the American Red Cross was formed.

In 1931, the United States issued a stamp commemorating the 50th anniversary of this society. It illustrated "The Greatest Mother in the World," from a Red Cross poster painted by Laurence Wilbur.

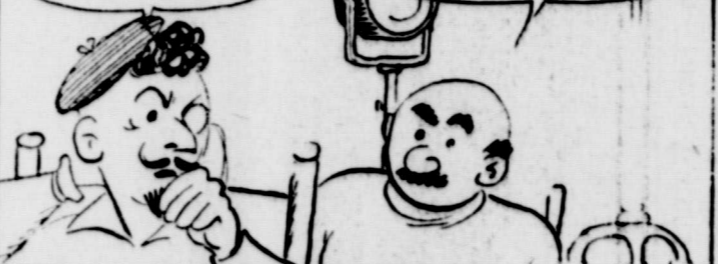
