

Col. Lawrence Westbrook, soon to visit Texas, is one of the men who have advanced most rapidly under the national recovery program. "Colonel" is his title from the World war service. He has a genius for organ-ization and detail. For years he was a member of the Texas legislature from Waco. He attracted no great attention; made no "speeches," was not a "leader." But at the end of a legislative session, it usua!ly was found he had pushed through quietly the things he wanted.

Colonel Westbrook's first welfare work was in cotton campaigning. For his activities he received as many brickbats as bouquets. When general relief needs became apparent. Westbrook had a plan ready to lay before Governor Miriam A. Ferguson. It was complete. Only a law to authorize it was needed. That quickly was passed. Under it Westbrook became Texas' first relief director. He got national recognition when President Roosevelt decided relief was getting to the needy too slowly and ordered jobs for a all at once. Texas provided the jobs quicker and in more number than any other state. Soon Westbrook was being called to Washington for consultations. Now he heads the rehabilitation program.
