While the specialists down at Washington grope about among the wreckage of the NRA to see if any of the pieces can be patched up and used again, the rest of us might properly take time out to meditate over the underlying issue which the U.S. supreme court's decision brings in promi-

That issue is nothing less than the question. How far can the original American attitude toward the functions of the central government be preserved in the face of modern conditions?

The confusion of thought which resulted in erection of an NRA framework so completely unconstitutional that the court was unanimous in knocking it down comes straight from the fact that we tend to look on the federal government in a light entirely different from that in which its founders viewed it.

The men who founded the American government repreagreement on one point: they distrusted a strong central government as an enemy of democracy.

The Pink Slip and What May Happen

Congress repealed the pink slip provision requiring publicity of income tax returns. Now a correspondent with a nose for news is responsible for the charge that the national lawmakers overlooked something in the enactment of the law. Indeed, it is alleged that "the blackmailers and the snoopers are all smiles since the enactment of the measure. A movement is on foot to put before the houses of congress for vote, the question as whether the treasurer's report on income tax returns should be made public. It has been suggested by the Philadelphia Bulletin that the law be amended "to provide that the returns of each year shall be made public only when congress so provides by joint resolution." Furthermore it is said at present the law requires a corporation to reveal every individual to whom more than \$1,000 a year has been paid so that all the information is already in the office of the bureau of internal revenue. Notice has been given that the list of those receiving in excess of \$15,000 probably will be ready during the summer "when congress is not in session."

Surface indications and the political signs of the times are that congress may be in session until late in the fall. If the law is to be amended, "to provide that the returns of each year shall be made public only when congress so provides by joint resolutions," why wait until the fall months for the decision?

Washington Sees Campaign Issue

Washington observers agree that the question raised by the president, if pressed, may easily become the chief issue of the 1936 campaign. They believe President Roosevelt plans no stop-gap legislation until he gets a reaction from the people indicating their likelihood or otherwise to favor an amendment to the Constitution to broaden Federal powers. 

FEDERAL LAND **BANK INTEREST** TO BE REDUCED

The interest rate on all Federal Land Bank loans made through National farm loan associations will be reduced to 3 1-2 per cent for all interest payable in the one-year period commencing July 1, 1935 and to 4 per cent for all interest payable in the two-year period com-mencing July 1, 1936, according to Claude Strickland, secretary-treasurer of the Cisco National Farm Loan association. This announce-ment was made June 8, 1935 when Strickland was notified of the new loan rate by A. C. Williams, presi-dent of the Federal Land Bank of Houston and general agent of the Farm Credit Administration of

This temporary reduction of interest on Federal Land Bank loans having installments due prior July 1, 1938 is the result of new legislation, the Farm Credit Act of 1935, which was signed by President Roosevelt June 3. Interest payable on installment dates occurring after July 30, 1938, will be at the original contract rate, which is 4 1-2 per cent on loans now being made through National farm loan associations and varies from 5 to 6 per cent on loans made prior to April

The Farm Credit Act of 1935 also provides for another important in-ovation. Under its terms, the Land Bank Commissione now may make loans to finance the purchase of arms by deserving tenant farmers. Formerly, commissioner loans could be made only for the purpose of refinancing debts, for epurchasing farms lost through foreclosure and for working capital. The Act ex-tends to January 1, 1940, the time in which the Land Bank Commissioner may make direct loans to farmers on first and second mortgages. The commissioner loan plus any prior encumbrances on the property may not exceed 75 per cent of the appraised normal value. Commenting on the new provisions, Strickland, said: "The new provi-sion enabling the Land Bank Commissioner to make loans for the purpose of purchasing farms provides a new opportunity for young farmers and deserving tenants to become farm owners and home owners in their own right. We shall be glad to talk things over worthy tenants who wish to farms of their own." Since May 12, 1933, when

Administration was established, the Federal Land Bank ousiness carried on the books of the week bank on May 1, 1933 after 17 years of operation. The interest rate rection provided by the Act will affect only Federal land bank loans, all of which are first mortgage loans. The interest rate on Land Bank Commissioner loans, which are made on either first or second mortgages on farm property, will unchanged at 5 per cent

DIVIDENDS IN PLACE OF TAX IN MOUNTAINS

By JOSEPH D. RAVOTTO United Press Staff Correspondent PARIS, June 7 — Just the spot we have been seeking all our lives Towns where no taxes are paid and where on the contrary one is paid

to live there. It may sound like a fairy tale. Yet it is a fact, confirmed by official documents, that 24 French com-munes in the Jura mountains on the Swiss border, with a populaton of about 10,000, pay no local taxes. Instead each inhabitant receives a searly dividend, ranging from 100 to

The explanation is quite simple In years gone by, these communes became the proprietors of spruce and fir woods in the vicinity. These woods are exploited in business like fashion by each commune so that there is a profit after al lthe communal expenses have been paid. This profits is divided between the

Mountain Resort
La Chaux des Crotenay, one of

these communes which is an attractive mountain resort, may be taken as one of the best examples. During the present century, nobody has paid any local taxes. Instead, each inhabitant, including women and children, has received a yearly check averaging 150 francs.

Further, each family has been furnished with free firewood, and since the allowance has been quite generous, half of it has generally been sold, adding to the dividend

Whenever a citizen of the com-mune desires to build a house he is given a free plot of ground. Also free stone and sand. Finally the village doctor is subsidized by the commune, and according to the contract, he has reduced his fees.

Owned by Communes Many square miles of Jura forestland are owned and exploited by the commune, and the villages have literally gone into the woodcutting and wood-selling business. The profits are devoted to municipal

The dividend-paying villages are naturally proud of this unusual distinction. Naturally newcomers who seek to become permanent in-habitants to get their share of the booty are not welcomed cordially.


