Secy. Ickes and the Oil Industry

Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes is never out of the picture. Truth is, "he is ever in the picture," speaking of the petroleum industry, which is one of the largest in the

He declared flatly from his Washington headquarters that "the industry could not regulate itself by voluntary agreements to continue provisions of the oil code "and then endorsed the pending Thomas oil bill in principle.

He recalled President Roosevelt's suggestion "that additional legislation was needed if the petroleum administrative board or other agency were to continue on a legal foundation in view of the supreme court invalidation of NRA." And then disclosed that his lawyers were studying the Thomas measure in the light of the NRA decision.

The NRA decision rendered by the court of last resort speaks for itself. It was a flat announcement that the congress could not delegate its powers or authority to the executive branch of the government. This ruling spoke the downfall of the NRA as it existed before the blow was delivered by the court of last resort.

Governor Alf M. Landon of Kansas, a republican stalwart and an advocate of the state compact, petitioned Governor Marland of Oklahoma to call a meeting of oil states governors in Oklahoma City "probably late this month in an effort to reach an agreement on voluntary oil conservation.' Texas led off through its governor in the movement launched for the state compact plan of control. It has not been given an opportunity to function to date. Druggists Desire To Handle Liquor

Texas has a state Pharmaceutical association. Its convention voted at its closing session in the city of Dallas to recommend that "drug stores would be proper agencies for trol through taxing powers such as for \$25,000. distributing liquor in the event repeal is voted August 24." Also, if repeal is voted that the association should be represented when legislation is drawn to control liquor distribution. The committee also recommended that the association press its fight for a fair trade practice act.

There are two constitutional amendments pending. First, for repeal of the constitutional inhibition of the sale of liquor and second, the control of the traffic should repeal come. These issues have been passed on to the qualified voters who will cast ballots in the referendum to take place late in the month of August. Now, the people are said to be the masters. It is for them to return their verdict as to the fate of the important amendments submitted in the dog day season of the year. If they are not concerned as to the legislation of the future, then they are shirkers of responsibility and regardless of what may happen they should be willing to carry the load as they have carried it since the creation of the American republic and the annexation of the state of Texas by the sisterhood of the federal union.



By REYNOLDS PACKARD United Press Staff Correspondent PARIS, June 11 — The first international organization to fight cancer throughout the world by the concerted action of the medical forces of all countries has been formed in

The inaugural congress of the organization, which is composed of representatives from 42 nations, the Papal See and the Knights of Malta, will be held in Brussels at the beginning of next year. New discoveries and the result of research work will be announced at this session in an effort to coordi-

nate the struggle against cancer. Dr. Francis Carter Wood, director of the Cancer Institute of Columbia university, who is one of the founders of the organization, stated that its aim is to facilitate the education of the public and the medical profession in newer details of the disease as they are uncovered.

Statistics Far From Complete Dr. Wood pointed out that one of the most mystifying features concerning cancer is the paradox pre sented by its statistics.

"Where do you find the most cancer cases? Where you find the best doctors," he said .
