

James Ramsey MacDonald, for six years prime minister of Great Britain, has retired and Stanley Baldwin has been named his successor. Baldwin is a hard-headed business man and he ranks as one of the master executives of his country. MacDonald began as the leader of the labor party and when the nationalist ministry was created he was elected as head of the coalition government. This coalition was composed of liberals, conservatives and laborites who bolted with Mac-Donald from their party organization, and it has been continued in power many strenuous years. It is announced that the government will appeal to the people in the near future when an election will be held and the labor party will put forth strenuous efforts to capture control and make the laws

For years and years the liberal party and the old Tory party battled for control. Then came the labor party. Washington has let it be known that the general default of the June 15 installment by all of the debtor governments, with the exception of Finland, is expected to follow the British note, which said, "His Majesty's government found itself unable to meet this installment for the same reason that it defaulted the Dec. 15 installment last year."

Americans furnished millions of armed soldiers and vast shiploads of supplies and munitions of war to the allied governments. It made loans running into billions of dollars. Is repudiation of war loans a national virtue or a national disgrace? It is for the British government and its prime minister to make answer.

European nations and individuals are in default to the United States for many billions. Their defense is that Germany did not pay the allied governments and the people of the United States should not expect the British empire with its vast wealth to come across with the large sum it owes the American government and the American people.






