### Texas Road Money and Limitations

Texans are on the road to Washington, meaning Texans who are interested in road building and an allocation of \$100,000,000 for the program outlined for the Centennial year, as well as the year 1935. The Associated Press carried an interesting story on the morning of June 12. This was the foreward. Read it:

The bureau of roads said Tuesday most of Texas' \$11,989,350 allocation from the relief administration for roads probably would have to be spent for preliminary work such as grading and draining. A spokesman for the bureau said projects under this allotment undoubtedly would be. subject to the relief administration estimate that not more than \$1,400 could be spent to keep one man at work for one year and added this stipulation likely would prevent inauguration of new construction or heavy improvement work. Regarding Texas' desire to obtain \$100,000,000 for highway work from the federal government, the bureau said the only possible route would be an application to the old public works administration or possibly through an application through the bureau of applications and information in the work relief administration. Since the road allotments from this huge fund already have been made, however, the bureau said it was not likely Texas could get more money from this source.


