were turned off for 30 seconds and that crowd was made to feel for this short duration something of the meaning of that Bible expression "outer darkness." The darkness was so intense that it could truthfully be denominated "thick darkness." At this juncture a few lights were turned on at the opposite end of the "Big Room," 4,000 feet away, and a male quartette began a very pleasing rendition of that familiar hymn, "Rock of Ages," and as they progressed more lights were turned on, coming slowly toward us, until at the close of the hymn all the lights were on. The effect was so delightfully exhilarating that a sensitive imagination might truly experience a foretaste of the ecstasies of eternal bliss. After this memorable occasion we wound our way back to the Lunch room, some to begin their ascent on foot, others to ride out in the elevator at the rate of 1,800 feet per second. Thus ended four hours in the lives of five hundred and seventy nine human beings, the memory of which will never be erased by the ravages of time or the duration of eternity. This story would not be complete if I failed to tell you something of the museum at White's City, near the entrance to the cave, and Jim White the 50 year old cowboy, to whose inspiration and courage we are indebted for the revelation of this marvelous wonder of wonders. Jim has collected a number of different things, common and uncommon to the mountains of New Mexico. Among the uncommon things is a family of mummified human beings supposedly pre-historic beings and known in archeology as "basket makers." Every evening at 8:30 the guests of White's City are permitted to view this interesting collection and listen to a lecture detailing their discovery and supposed history. While the minds of the people composing this crowd seemed to wander in a maze of uncertainty and speculation concerning the spectacle before them, I sat in serenity and satisfaction and pondered the facts concerning the fate of a people whose ancestry, habits and life had been recorded by the poet and served by the painter and given into my hands that I may be prepared to receive the confirmatory evidence presented by the gloomy monuments before me. Thrice over I thanked God that I had been counted worthy to receive this superior knowledge of God and His purpose regarding the history of humanity past, present and future. My mind and spirit soared to sublime heights and breathed the ozone of Life Eternal.

the King's Palace to the Queen's Chamber, particularly famous for its elephant ears or draperies, and helectite formations. Then follows the Papoose's Chamber a beautiful little room leading back to the King's Palace, whence the winding terraces lead to the lunch room, 750 feet below the surface, where lunches are served. This lunch room is the beginning of what is termed the "Big Room," so termed because of its immense dimensions, being 4,000 feet long and 625 feet wide, with ceiling arches at one place 300 feet high. It is in this room we have the giant stalagmite formation 60 feet high and 16 feet in diameter, and denominated "Rock of Ages." Here the visitors stop each day to hear a brief talk on the park. It so happened the day we went through that there were 579 in the crowd, and three hundred and two were from Texas. The speaker in announcing the number from each state commented pleasantly upon Texas, and that Texas crowd clapped vehemently. He continued his complimentary remarks upon Texas by stating that last year ninety seven thousand people were conducted through the caverns, and 52,000 of them hailed from Texas. Then that Texas crowd encircled with almost vociferous vehemence, until the speaker's voice arose with the startling announcement that at that rate it would take 100 years to show the cave to all Texas. That Texas bunch was so quiet that one could almost imagine they were in the Mormon Tabernacle at Salt Lake City waiting for somebody to drop a pin. Tarleton Gets Rare Old Texas Volumes

STEPHENVILLE, June 19 — A collection of early and rare books connected with Texas history, begun in early spring at John Tarleton college already includes several prized volumes.
 Miss Margaret Bierschwale, librarian, who is directing the collection, names among the best books secured to date a Thrall's "Pictorial History of Texas," "A Journey Through Texas," by Olmstead; William Carey Crane's life of Sam Houston; "The Republic of Texas," by Anson Jones; Smithwick's "Evolution of a State," and William F. Connally's "Doniphan's Expedition." Officials anticipate that before the opening of the centennial next year the Texas collection will be placed in an appropriate case together with numerous relics of pioneer days in Texas. Miss Bierschwale is trying now to locate certain rare volumes, old maps, and other incunabula. She states that the value of the collection has been greatly enhanced by gifts of books and documents.
