CURTIS GOADE INDICTED IN RICHARDSON'S DEATH

BAIRD — A 42nd District Court grand jury in Baird last Thursday indicted Curtis Sherman Goad Jr., 26, of Cross Plains, for murder with malice aforethought in the July 2 fatal shooting of Cross Plains City Marshal Byron Richardson.

Richardson died Aug. 1 in Hendrick Memorial Hospital where he had been a patient since the shooting.

Goad's 21 year old wife who was with him at the time of the shooting, was no-billed in connection with Richardson's death.

District Judge Raleigh Brown ordered that Goad be held without bail until the trial, set for Nov. 10 in Baird.

Goad has been held in jail here since his arrest a few hours after the shooting in Cross Plains, charged with shooting Richardson in the abdomen and elbow after being issued a traffic citation.

Agreement To Benefit Tuberculosis Patients

Callahan is one of 27 Texas counties in Region VI, Tuberculosis Control Division, Texas State Department of Health, which will benefit from a contractual agreement signed last Thursday by the health department and the Tarrant County Hospital District.

The agreement between the two organizations provides for medical care for indigent tuberculosis patients in the 27-county region at Fort Worth's John Peter Smith Hospital.

Health authorities said 192 new active cases of tuberculosis were reported in Region VI in 1968 and 24 cases of arrested tuberculosis were reactivated during the year. There currently are 823 cases recorded in the state register which are being followed in the 27-county region.

The contract between the State Health Department and the Tarrant County Hospital District will provide medical care to those tuberculosis patients who otherwise would be unable to afford the care.
