

Texas In Debt But Generous

Texas, in the red eleven million dollars for state administration, its subdivisions owing a billion for public improvements, is lavish to prodigelity in giving away the natural resources, common heritage of its people, to those who have vested titles, regardless of whether acquired for much or little value or none.

Texas has been giving away a billion cubic feet of natural gas a day, worth a quarter of a billion dollars a year on final sales, and getting in return about \$300,000 from taxes.

The state is producing 400,000,000 barrels of oil a year. This oil is paying about \$8,000,000 in taxes. Of course Texas users of oil products pay a vast sight more taxes; but about four-fifths of Texas crude oil goes to consumers out of the

Texas sulphur pays approximately 2 per cent in state production taxes. All the resources pay ad valorem taxes besides production levies. But there are, among lawmakers, those who believe producers of Texas natural resources, such as oil, gas, sulphur, timber, potash, cement, pay only onetenth of one-fifth what the state should get out of the permanent depletion of these resources. These lawmakers recall that other states collect four or five times as much as Texas in severance levies, and that production nowhere is stilled by taxes.

Brazil as Cotton Growing Nation

All the great mouth-pieces of propaganda have been telling it to the American world that the South has lost the market for the greatest American , farm staples-meaning cotton. Crops Saved From Mawaii Moth Borer

detective work, tedious as tracking a criminal, was credited today with saving Hawaii's sugar cane from invasion by one of the deadliest plant "killers" — the giant moth borer. Several months ago a resident imported 12 bulbs of Heliconia, an ornamental plant, from Panama They were fumigated, inspected and 325 Rare Goblets passed quarantine, and about to be released when Dr. H. L. Lyon, head of the pathology department of the Hawaiian Sugar Planters association suggested fumigation might not

The bulbs were kept under observation and recently Lyon discovered a large moth flying about the quarantine room. It was identified as the Heliconia. The stalks were destroy-

Unwitting release of the moth upon Hawaiian cane fields might have proved disastrous, since no effective parasite for it is known.
