West Texan for a Sales Tax

Representative Robert Alexander hails from Childress, away out in the lower Panhandle. He has proposed to the house revenue and taxation committee a general sales tax to pay old-age pensions. The sales tax proposal is bobbing up everywhere in Texas. All that is necessary to obtain evidence to this fact is to interview representatives or laymen from all sections of the largest of American states. Moreover, it promises to be one of the uppermost issues in the campaign next year.



Individual wet and dry members of the legislature have made mutual covenants to fight hard whatever liquor regulatory bill they can enact, but when drawn, to join in giving it enough votes to make it effective at once. This fact confirms the thesis that the product will be a matter of compromise and mutual concessions, ending up with abandonment by the drys of the monopoly plan in order to gain the limitation of liquor sales to unbroken packages.

Plaque Has Name Of Famed Sculptor

MIAMI, Fla., Sept. 25. -A plaque from a deserted Italian monastery, bought for a few pennies as a souvenir by Dr. John T. Gifford, University of Miami professor, may be the work of Benvenuto Cellini, famous sculptor of the 16th century. Touring Italy in 1895, Dr. Gifford

visited the monastery of Valombro-, near Florence. Alone there was a boy who earned a few coppers by securing occasional visitors behind the crumbling walls.

In one dark corner, Dr. Gifford picked up a small object, crusted with sediment. Wiping it off, he found elaborate designs of knights in armor and fine ladies on its face. It intrigued him and he gave the boy a few cents for it.

Dr. Gifford only recently gave the plaque close scrutiny. He scraped away the crust and this inscription was found:

"Cellini — 1541." An effort is being made to establish the plaque's source. According to Dr. Gifford, an offer of \$100,000 has been made for the piece, should it prove to be an authentic Cellini product, by Homer St. Gaudens, director of the Carnegie Art Institute of Pittsburgh

MINIMUM AGE FOR ENLISTING IN CCC LOWER


AUSTIN, Sept. 25 - Minimum age limit for CCC enrollees has been lowered from 18 to 17. State Enrollment Supervisor Neal E. Guy announced Saturday.

The ruling will apply for the Crtober enrollment, when every eligible person in the state is expected to be given a chance to enlist in the CCC. Enrollment will be open for all unmarried men between 17 and 28 whose families are on relief rolls The date are inclusive, and a person who has passed his seventeenth birthday is eligible, as is one who as not reached hi stwenty-ninth. Manatory discharges have been

discontinued, and enrollees may stay in camps indefinitely. Also, persons honorably discharged may re-enlist provided their previous service was not less than four months. Eligible enrollees, however, henerably discharged prior to October 21, 1933, may be re-selected without regard to length of previous

Guy advised persons in the lower age brackets, particularly the 17-year-olds who are in school, to continue their schooling rs long as possible, with the hope of enlisting later. For those who cannot continue school, the CCC conducts an educational program in each camp, he pointed out.
