

Renewal of Welfare Services

President Roosevelt opened the 1935 "mobilization of human needs" meeting with the assertion that "in spite of definitely brighter economic strides, the problem of welfare services demands the best of both the government and private agencies." Speaking to delegates of welfare organizations of the nation he reiterated "the government is withdrawing as rapidly as possible from the field of emergency home relief." He emphasized that the government was moving successfully toward "a substitution of work." In other words the substitution of work for the dole.



Lucrezia Bori To Be On Air Sunday

Lucrezia Bori, the great soprano who has been called "the savior of the Metropolitan," will be presented as guest soloist with the Ford Symphony Orchestra and Chorus under the direction of Victor Kolar in the Ford Sunday evening hour of Sunday, October 6. The program is heard from 9 to 10, Eastern Standard Time, over the complete coastto-coast network of the Columbia Broadcasting System.

Although Miss Bori is Spanish by birth and Italian by training, few artists in this country enjoy the universal affection and esteem which er given to her by American public. She was born in the romantic Spanish city of Valencia, and began to sing in childhood as naturally as other little girls begin to play with dolls. Her musical training in Spain began in the pig-tail era, and continued until she had reached the age of seventeen when she transferred her activities to Italy. There he studied under great Milanese masters, and made her debut with tremendous success in the part of Micaela in "Carmen." Two years at La Scala followed, after which she achieved one of the greatest triumphs ever known at the Teatro Colon in Buenos Aires. Her next step was to the New York Metropolitan, where she made her American debut opposite Caruso. She has been with Metropolitan ever since. When the depression was at its

worst, and the Metropolitan opera threatened with extinction through lack of funds, it was Miss Bori who was appointed chairman of the committee for saving Metropolitan opera. So successful was the campaign supervised by the committee that \$3,000,000 were raised in a comparatively short time and what is perhaps the world's greatest operatic institution was enabled to continue operations without interruption.






