PENSION BILL IS PASSED BY TEXAS HOUSE

By United Press AUSTIN, Oct. 24 - An old age pension bill was passed finally by the Texas house today by a vote of

It differs materially from an old age pension measure passed by the senate. Leaders for the house bill did not expect the senate to accept the changes. But rather to ask for a conference committee to armonize

In general, the house bill follows the federal securities requirements for federal participation. It allows pensions not to exceed \$15 a month for persons over 65 years of ago. Single persons with \$720 annual income or owning \$4,000 worth of property and couples with \$1,000 income or \$5,000 worth of property are

excluded. Payment of the pension is proposed out of a special fund revenue bills to be passed later are count-ed upon to provide the money. Administration is placed in a director and five assistants all to be appointed by the governor.

Like all of Mussolini's offers, however, it did not go far enough to satisfy Great Britain. It was said at London that removal of only one division would still leave the Italians with four times as many troops as Britain has in Egypt. Britain also was opposed to grant-

ing Mussolini's request that the League's application of penalties be postponed beyond October 31, the date now set. The British want sweepinng concessions and pledges from Mussolini before penalties are even temporarily suspended.

The French government, meanwhile, continued desperately anxious to please both sides. A typical "trial balloon" was issued in Paris by an inspired report that the British government is prepared gradually to withdraw the home fleet from the Mediterranean, beginning with a few ships, "pro-vided" Mussolini removes all menace against Egypt and gives certain other guarantees to Britain.

City or Ghost Town?

(An Editorial)

City or ghost town? That is the future that faces Cisco today.

Will Cisco reject the only real offer to become an important city that has been made since the coming of the railroads, and sink back to the status of the little towns that once existed but are no more?

Or will Cisco take advantage of the offer, plunge in, and grasp the opportunity, and become a city of the future rather than a town of the past?
Whether it would be better for the Highway

Number One to come through Cisco as it now does or to come along Eighth street is not the question. That has been settled by the indication from the highway department that either now or in the very near future the routing will be changed. The Sixteenth street route has been found unsuitable. The only ways left are the one along Eighth street and the one entirely out of the city on the south.

The order to begin work on the road south of the city will be the death warrant for Cisco.

The state highway commission has dropped the Eighth street project, after what was apparently a misunderstanding of the attitude of the citizens of Cisco. It is believed that a reconsideration could be obtained if it can be shown in a strong enough manner that the citizenship and the city commission representing it want the road.

The citizens of Cisco this morning urged the commission to take a strong definite action on the road. The mayor has called a meeting of the commission tonight for that purpose.

In the hands of those five commissioners tonight rests the future of Cisco. Will it become a city of the future or a ghost town of the past?
