





# STATE RAISES 'TARIFF WALL' WITHIN U. S.

OLMPIA, Wash., Oct. 24 — A bill passed by the State Supreme Court within the bounds of Interstate Commerce laws, Washington's new tax — a 2 per cent "compensating tax" on merchandise "imported" into the state to avoid the 2 per cent retail sales tax — is being attacked with interest by tax authorities over the nation.

The tax was enacted by the 1935 legislature to protect cities along Washington's border which would suffer from large purchases being made from Oregon merchants instead of in Washington.

To get around federal constitutional bars against taxing interstate commerce, the legislature levied the compensating tax on the "privilege of using" these purchases like automobiles and washing machines within the state.

The Supreme Court held the tax unconstitutional on grounds it was not a tax on interstate commerce, but on the article after it had come to rest in Washington.

The idea of such a tax was conceived by the Washington State Tax Commission, which asserts it is the first of its kind in United States. Since the Supreme Court upheld its validity, numerous states especially those also having retail sales taxes, have begun studying the tax closely with a view of adopting it to protect their own merchants.

The Washington tax exempts all purchases under \$20 a month and any article which has been subjected to a tax equal or larger than the 2 per cent compensating tax either by the federal government or other states.

**Scope Not Fixed Yet**  
The exact scope of the compensating tax has not been established. The Northern Pacific Railroad asks the Supreme Court not to rule on the tax as it affected engines, rails, cars and other equipment used in this state and purchased elsewhere. A separate suit may be filed to test just how far the state can go in taxing railroads, telephone companies and others in interstate commerce.

The tax commission also has a suit before the Supreme Court testing whether it can levy the state's business tax on gross revenues of Mason - Walsh - Atchinson - Keir company, contractors now engaged in building the \$63,000,000 Grand Coulee dam.

The company contends it is an agent for the federal government and not subject to state taxation. Should it lose the business tax suit, the way might be opened for the commission to require the company to pay the compensating tax on machinery, cement and the millions of dollars worth of other materials brought into Washington for the dam.

## WHITE CHIEF FOR INDIANS OF THE STATE

LIVINGSTON, Oct. 24 — The only Indian tribe in Texas, the peaceful Alabamas, has a white chief.  
Nekko Si or Little Chief, known to his business associates here as Clem Fain, Jr., became director of the tribe at Indian Village following the death of Big Chief Sun-Ke, 75, on Sept. 2.  
Fain has been a friend and adviser of the Alabamas for many years and was so loved that he was given the title of Nekko Si.  
Affairs of the tribe, which drifted from the land east of the Mississippi a century ago, greatly interested Fain.  
Chief's Adviser  
Sun-Ke became chief of the

tribe 25 years ago upon the death of his predecessor, Chief John Scott. Fain became his friend and adviser him upon many matters.  
When adversity struck the very foundation of the band of 250 Indians in 1928, Fain advised Chief Sun-Ke, then 68, to organize the tribe formally and present a plea to the government for aid.  
The tribal Braves, numbering 49, formally elected Sun-Ke, then called Charley Thompson, as chief. Immediately Chief Sun-Ke left for Washington where he was granted an audience with Calvin Coolidge, then president. The chief asked for aid and obtained it.  
Before the trip to Washington, Chief Sun-Ke was grieved deeply over the poverty-stricken condition of the tribe. His band found it a scul-killing task to eke out a bare living from the sandy loam near Indian Village, their home.

## Wind Erosion Job At Hereford Begins

HEREFORD, Oct. 24 — Work on the 25,000 acre wind-erosion control project was underway here with preparation of engineered tree stakes being carried on steadily. The project which will supplement work being done near Dalhart, is the first

tree acreage plant to be started in this section.  
Trees will be planted on watersheds and along roadways where moisture is available and where wind cutting begins during dry periods. Tentative plans are to extend the area along roadways to include a territory 11 by 14 miles, with the 25,000 acre plot as the center.
