### Another Public Enemy Slain

Arthur (Dutch Schultz) Flegenheimer is dead. Before the repeal of the eighteenth amendment he was the beer baron of New York and neighbor states. He was shot down by underworld gangsters and two of his henchmen were shot out of existence to give him company on his long, long journey. He was one of the most powerful of all the beer barons engaged in the liquor traffic of bygone years. He had a great organization. He amassed millions for the leaders of his gangsters and successfully defied the laws of the nation and state. He was the principal in two famous trials in the federal courts for the evasion of federal income tax. He won an acquittal in one case and a mistrial in another. His assassins shot him down without warning. Early in October, another notorious character of the underworld was assassinated and his body found in an automobile in the New York metropolitan district. He was an enemy of the famous beer baron and the police are convinced that he was put away by underworld desperadoes who fought under the flag of King Dutch Schultz.

Well, the only good gangster is a dead gangster. Why worry about the passing of the beer baron who was not only a public enemy but a public outlaw? Why worry about the rival gangster who was sent to his grave? Crime is a non-paying business. Criminals may be successful for a time, but at the finish they are caught in the net and must pay the price. "Law enforcement" is the order of the day in America, but as eternal vigilence is said to be the price of liberty, strict enforcement of laws made for the protection of the public should be the demand of all good citizens.

### New Law For Drunken Drivers

Gov. James V. Allred signed House Bill 93 by Morris of Hood county increasing the punishment for driving a car while intoxicated. The old law provided punishment of not less than two years, a jail sentence of 90 days and a fine of not more than \$500-while the Morris act authorizes penitentiary sentences of not more than two years and jail sentences of not less than 30 days nor more than 90 days and a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$500. Now for a drastic drivers license law which will prohibit inefficient drivers, dumb drivers, drivers who never heed the laws of

#### High Court Knocks Out Tax Discounts

"We think we have said enough to demonstrate that it is absolutely and wholly unconstitutional and void," wrote the state supreme court in striking down the act of the regular session of the Forty-fourth legislature attempting to accord discounts to those who pay taxes before aJnuary 1 of each year. As a result of the court's findings, the law failed and all Texas tax-payers will be required to pay the full amount of their taxes and cannot receive discounts.
