Some believed the trio might be members of the O'Malley gang which yesterday shot its way out of the Muskogee jail... The name of the farmer was not learned immediately... The O'Malley gang last night was believed to be in the mountain foothills in southeast Oklahoma near Clayton... If the men hunted were members of the fugitive band they passed through a cordon of officers during the night and made their way into northeast Oklahoma before 3 a. m... SPANS 22 LEAP YEARS... COURT HEARS ARGUMENT IN HOWELL CASE

AUSTIN, Dec. 4 - Arguments were presented to the court of criminal appeals here today in the appeal of Mary Lou Howell, from a 20-year robbery conviction at Baird... She is charged also with murder in a companion case set for trial Dec. 5... Both charges were filed after L. F. Threet, Cisco rancher, was found robbed and fatally wounded in his pasture in Callahan county... Threet died in a Cisco hospital... Clifford Doggett was convicted of Threet's murder and given a death sentence in December, 1934... His appeal from the death verdict is pending... Doggett received a 99-year sentence at an earlier trial in the same case... Elmer Van Cleave, also charged on two counts in the case is yet to be tried... He was a state witness at the trials at Baird of Doggett and Miss Howell... Frank Judkins, Eastland, presented the argument for Miss Howell, contending there was insufficient evidence to support accomplice testimony... Errors in admission of testimony and in the judge's charge also were alleged.

Two Arrested At Ranger in Robbery

RANGER, Dec. 4 - Two Ranger men, one said to be Ranger circulation manager for the Fort Worth Press and the other said to be a washing machine salesman, were held after an arrest here Monday night, on a charge of conducting a daylight holdup of the Reagan Real Estate company in Fort Worth last Saturday morning... The two men, Charles Holden, 31, and W. Brewer, 23, were returned to Fort Worth Tuesday morning... According to detectives, the two men entered the office and robbed the owner at the point of a shotgun, escaping with several hundred dollars in cash... The detectives got a tip that Holden lived in Cisco and spent most of Monday there investigating... On their return to Fort Worth they stopped in Ranger and with the aid of police here, located and arrested the two men.

Leeray Cutoff Paving Due to Begin Within Few Days; Crushed Stone Laid

Work of paving the Leeray cutoff is expected to begin within the next few days, according to J. E. Spencer, secretary of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce... Spencer, who has been keeping in close contact with the various highway projects affecting the city, said that a state highway engineer had made a statement to that effect... The crushed rock base for the highway has already been laid and everything is in readiness for the paving to begin... The nine miles of the cutoff, when paved, will form an excellent connecting link between Cisco and the Breckenridge highway proper and will give the city a much better road to the Stephens county seat... Work on the relocation of Highway One through Cisco along Eighth street is expected to begin shortly after the first of the year... State highway department engineers have pointed out that their work on plans is complete and that the plans now must be checked in detail by the federal engineers before work can begin... A complete change in the plans was made, it was said.

Industrial East and Farming West In High Court Battle Over New Deal

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 - The industrial east and agricultural west figuratively grappled over the New Deal farm program in supreme court today when they joined in the "battle of briefs" being waged on an unprecedented scale before the tribunal... They alternately assailed and defended the AAA and its processing taxes in a brief filed as "friends of the court..." "Down east" was represented in a book length document filed by Boston attorneys of the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers which condemned the law as invasion of state rights... The west was represented in a brief filed in the court by the Western Feed Growers association and the Mountain Feed Growers Marketing association... It energetically defended the law as giving agriculture the same aid a protective tariff gives industry... The cotton manufacturers assailed the AAA as putting into effect the constitutional doctrine of Alexander Hamilton and extending the power of the federal government over state affairs... It denounced the processing tax and farm program of the New Deal as "gigantic combinations in restraint of production..." The brief urged the court to adopt instead of the Hamilton theory the doctrine of James Madison, who, it was argued, held the right of congress to impose taxes and spend money for the general welfare must be restricted to the enumerated powers given the federal government in other parts of the constitution.

Ickes Clears Up the Oil Situation

'Clarification' of his statement on oil shipments to Italy and Ethiopia by United States oil men by Secretary Harold Ickes yesterday leaves the American people more or less in a middle over just what the secretary does want done or not done by the oil producers.

First of all Ickes was quoted as calling upon American producers to withhold shipment of oil to belligerents. Apparently the newspapers of the nation published this statement in good faith, believing that the secretary had made it in this form and meant it as it sounded.

Then yesterday he said that what he had said in the first place was that "oil producers ought to cooperate in letter and in spirit with the government's efforts to halt shipments of munitions of war to belligerents."

The latter statement certainly is more general than the former, and could be taken to mean almost anything. Maybe the secretary said that in the first place. But if he did and was misquoted, somebody certainly got in a jam and everybody waited long enough to straighten out the tangle.

On the other hand, there are many people who will be ready to seize this opportunity to say that "Ickes was talking when he should have been listening" and is now being forced to back up on his position. It is not the first time that the plain spoken secretary of the interior has talked the administration into a jam.

If oil is declared a "munition of war," as it may well be before long, shipment of it to the warring nations could be barred easily enough. If it is now, however, control of shipment of oil to the belligerents will have to be voluntary, at least for the time being.

Secretary Ickes has clarified his statement on the shipment of American oil to Italy and Ethiopia. All that remains now is for him to clear up the clarification.

The King's Message

There was no beating about the bush when King George yesterday told the British House of Lords that the Empire would stand firm on the present government's foreign policy.

The British monarch, in his statement to parliament, outlined three principal parts of the policy, to which he pledged the Empire. They are firm support of the League of Nations, fulfillment in cooperation with other countries of the League covenant, and exertion of influence in favor of an Italian-Ethiopian peace acceptable to the three contenders, Italy, Ethiopia, and the League of Nations.

The former British naval officer, with the directness characteristic of his earlier occupation, plunged to the heart of the situation, spending no time in the indirections of diplomatic language. He made it certain where Great Britain stands.

Great Britain is a limited monarchy. Some persons have predicted that George is the last king who will ever grace a British throne. But yesterday the ruler of the empire upon which the sun never sets, was not a shrinking puppet yesterday who delivered a message, but the emperor of the great nation that Britain is. Other nations, following that address, need have no doubt as to Great Britain's position in the war. The king outlined it very clearly.
