ST. LOUIS, Dec. 5—A report was made in the spectacular St. Louis court of the "gift of God" baby case today, commending the child be awarded to Anna Ware, an unwed Newton, domestic.

The report was signed by Special Commissioner Rush Limbaugh and sent to the St. Louis court of appeals which had taken the child in Dr. and Mrs. Ludwig Muench, Louis, after Miss Ware claimed as her own.

Miss Ware came here in August to give birth to an illegitimate child to her husband and child. The Mrs. Muench went to the hospital to give birth to a "gift of God" son. Miss Ware had surrendered her son for adoption a few hours before the Muench announcement.

Commissioner Limbaugh's report asserted the belief that Mrs. Muench "did not give birth to a child in August."

The best window displays and merchandising events in Cisco in years will add to the interest and aid in increasing the crowd for the Trades Day here Saturday.

The Trades Day event will be featured by a turkey throw, similar to that two weeks ago, with merchants and business men giving away turkeys to anyone who can catch them.

The turkey throw will begin at 2 p. m. in front of the Skiles Grocery company, moving north, with a turkey thrown in front of the place of business of each firm participating.

A record breaking crowd is expected to attend the event, due to favorable comment all over the Cisco trade territory on the last turkey throw and Trades Day sponsored by the Cisco Daily News and American and with Cisco business firms participating.

Judges will be stationed in the crowd and will make prompt decisions upon the ownership of the turkeys the moment they are captured, in order to avoid any roughness or disputes and to keep the turkey throw as orderly as the last one.

HOWELL CASE IS RESET FOR DECEMBER 18

EASTLAND, Dec. 5—Case of Mary Lou Howell, charged by indictment with the murder of L. F. Three, Aug. 14, 1934, was passed and reset for Dec. 18 after defendant's motion for continuance had been overruled by 88th District Judge B. W. Patterson today.

Frank Jenkins, attorney for Miss Howell, pleaded former jeopardy because of a previous conviction of the defendant for robbery growing out of the same transaction, which case was pending an appeal, and sought a continuance to await the decision of the court of criminal appeals.

Miss Howell's appeal arguments were heard by the court of Criminal Appeals at Austin yesterday.

She was convicted of robbery in the case. Clifford Doggett was convicted on both robbery and murder charges and is awaiting a decision by the appeals court on the latter charge.

Elmer Van Cleave, defendant indicted with the other two on similar counts, is yet to be tried.

Work Relief Costs Over Six Billions

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5—The \$4,000,000,000 drive to end the debt is costing American taxpayers a grand total of \$6,090,000,000.

Congress appropriated an extra \$880,000,000 to use for direct relief between April 8 and December 1, when the program listed 3,500,000 needy at work and closed down the Federal Emergency Relief Administration.

In addition, a United Press survey of the nation revealed states counties, and municipalities have been forced to contribute \$1,210,000,000 in order to receive their share of the work fund.

Forty-two of the 48 states found it necessary to adopt new forms of taxation to meet the cost. New bond issues were floated. Sales tax laws were enacted. Other levies were increased.

ARMS PARLEY IS VALUELESS IS VIEW HELD

LONDON, Dec. 5—Great Britain is ready to join in an oil embargo against Italy and feels that as long as the Ethiopian war continues "there is little to be gained by resuming the discussion of reduction of armaments," Sir Samuel Hoare, foreign secretary, told the house of commons today.

His statement was made during a debate on foreign affairs and replied to an attack on the government by Hugh Dalton, laborite, in which Dalton said:

"Stop Mussolini's oil and you'll stop Mussolini's war. He knows it."

Build Naval Base

Just previous to the debate the admiralty informed the house of commons it is spending nearly \$50,000,000 on the Singapore naval base in the far east.

The debate touched variously on the Ethiopian war, oil sanctions, Japan's invasion of China, and the movement in Egypt for independence.

Sir Samuel commented significantly that Germany evidently shares Britain's view about the futility of talking armament reduction now.

Talk Valueless

His remark was considered as cognation of the fact that the naval conference opening next week will be of little practical value.

Regardless the oil embargo, Sir Samuel made it plain that although Britain is ready to play her part in the cooperation of the United States and other neutrals is essential.

"The question still to be decided is whether the action of members of the League will render the action of members ineffective," he said.

Shakeup Is Started In Federal Reserve

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5—A drastic shakeup in personnel of the federal reserve system under the 1935 banking act, giving the administration control powers began today.

The retiring federal reserve board, which will end its duties Feb. 1, ordered terms of office of the present chairman at each of the 12 federal reserve banks, to expire March 1, thus giving the new board a chance to appoint its selected officials.

Ranger Man, Kin of Ciscoan, Dies Of Injuries in Car Accident Wednesday

Bill Dorsey, 51, of Ranger, brother-in-law of Charles Brown, died at 11:10 this morning at a Ranger hospital, following an automobile accident near Olden yesterday.

Dorsey, manager of the Paramount hotel in Ranger, was injured when his car failed to make a turn in the Bankhead highway a mile west of Olden about 2:30 yesterday afternoon. He was immediately rushed to the West Texas Clinic at Ranger by passersby.

Dorsey's car turned over several times, throwing him clear, it was said. He was conscious at the hospital before death occurred.

The body was sent to Midland today, where funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 3:30.

Mr. Dorsey is survived by his widow, his father and a sister, both of Albertville, Ala., a brother, H. B. Dorsey of San Angelo, and another brother, Lloyd Dorsey of Chattanooga, Tenn.

Boston Students In Demonstration

BOSTON, Dec. 5—Police dispersed a crowd of students demonstrators from Radcliffe, Harvard, and Massachusetts Institute of Technology today outside the Italian consulate in downtown Boston.

There was no disturbance and the 30 boys and girls scattered when police arrived.

One youth dropped some circulars from the top of the Park Square building, where the consulate is located, condemning Italian invasion of Ethiopia.

"Students want peace," it read, and urged an embargo on shipments of oil to Italy. "We students must join with our working youth to see that the League enforces sanctions against the Fascist warmakers."

Town Planning In Egyptian City Seen

CAIRO, Dec. 5—An entire Egyptian city, built 1,300 years before the birth of Christ, for the first time in history has been laid bare in all the splendor of its careful town planning.

It was built between Cairo and Luxor by the great Pharaoh, Amenhotep who here tried to rid the Egyptian religion of its abuses.

But the city, with its processional way, Coronation Hall and Temple of the Shinning Spirit, lasted no more than 10 years, passing with its founder.

The new Pharaoh moved the capital of Egypt to another site, and now John Peniston heads a party of British excavators who are completing the discovery of the ancient city.

FOOD PRICES OF NATION ON AN INCREASE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5—Retail food costs increased another 1.4 per cent during the two weeks ending Nov. 19, principally because of sharp advances in the price of dairy products, fresh fruits, and vegetables, the department of labor announced today.

The bureau of labor statistics said that while the price of flour fell of 2 per cent, the price of white bread rose by the same fraction. The greatest bread increase was 10 per cent in Kansas City. Meat prices rose 1 per cent and pork chops rose seven per cent. Beef and other pork cuts fell slightly.

Dairy products rose throughout the country, with a general increase of 9.6 per cent in the cost of butter. Eggs decreased 2.1 per cent.

Fruits and vegetables rose 5.9 per cent, with potatoes going up 13.5 per cent. The new AAA potato control act went into effect December 1.

Wallace Keeps Up Family Tradition

AMES, La., Dec. 5 — Henry Browne Wallace, oldest son of Henry Wallace, secretary of agriculture, is one of the 1,750 undergraduates at Iowa State College. He transferred this year from Antioch College, Yellow Springs, O., and has enrolled in the agronomy department.

Six feet tall, young Henry resembles his father and has a similar interest in corn, and agricultural economics. Both his father and Henry C. Wallace his grandfather, were graduated from Iowa State college.

ITALY SEES NO BASIS FOR OPTIMISM

ROME, Dec. 5—Italy sees "no foundation" for recent foreign optimism about the possibility of an Italian-Ethiopian settlement, an official government spokesman said today.

The Franco-British conversations in Paris, he said, are purely technical and non-political and are entirely without Italian participation.

"We do not know anything about them. We have received no communications on them and therefore see no foundation for the optimism reported in the foreign press," he said.

No Weakening

Premier Mussolini remained ready to consider any peace proposal but there was no sign of national weakening in the pursuit of the East African campaign or the fight against League penalties.

As to East Africa, there is every reason to believe the Italians will launch a spectacular drive from both northern and southern fronts. Such a drive would be intended to strengthen the government's situation diplomatically as well as to take the military campaign a stage further after the slow progress of the first two months.

Labor Relations Act Is Defended

NEW YORK, Dec. 5—Before a generally hostile audience of industrialists, the New Deal's labor relations act was defended today by its administrator as vitally necessary to lift American labor from helplessness in dealing with employers.

The speaker was Chairman J. Warren Madden, of the National Labor Relations board. His audience was composed of leaders of major industries, who, at sessions of the Congress of American Industry and the National Association of Manufacturers, have lined up to defend the New Deal in 1936.

Madden quoted a decision by the late Chief Justice William Howard Taft upholding labor's legal right to organize and asserting that "a single employe was helpless in dealing with an employer."

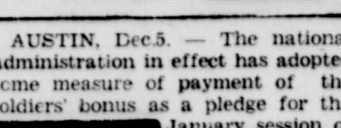

newspaper industry. There are approximately two billion people in the world and every one of them is a potential source of news. Any day or any hour either one of these two billion may become the object of the world's interest — may become in the newsmen's parlance, "front page news."

Correspondents Everywhere

The Cisco Daily News is a small town daily published in one of the best sections in the world and read by the finest people of these two billion yet it is a member of a news gathering agency that reaches into all parts of the world. Do you realize that the Daily News, a paper published in a small city of less than 7,000 inhabitants has its own correspondents wherever there is anything doing that is or will be of interest to the people of its territory — on the battle fields of faroff Ethiopia; in the lusty turbulent republics of south America and in frozen reaches of the land of perpetual snow.

I will just call to your mind just a few instances to illustrate the far reaching ramifications and the closeness of the net work which has been worked out to serve the readers of the Daily News and American Roundup. Just a few days ago the Daily News carried the story of an outbreak in Brazil when an attempt was made to overthrow the government. One of our own correspondents at the risk of his life, one man being killed at his side went to the top of Sugar Loaf Mountain world famous peak that commands a view of the harbor and city of Rio de Janeiro, and took notes of the battle that raged for hours in the streets of that great city. Even before the battle ended this correspondent was telephoning to our New York office a vivid account of the battle and just a few hours afterwards the subscribers of the Cisco Daily News was reading an account of this battle.

Fast News Service

Another instance of how the Cisco Daily News serves its subscribers was in giving the news of the death of Will Rogers and Wiley Post at Point Barrow, the farthest north of Continental United States, just a few weeks ago. 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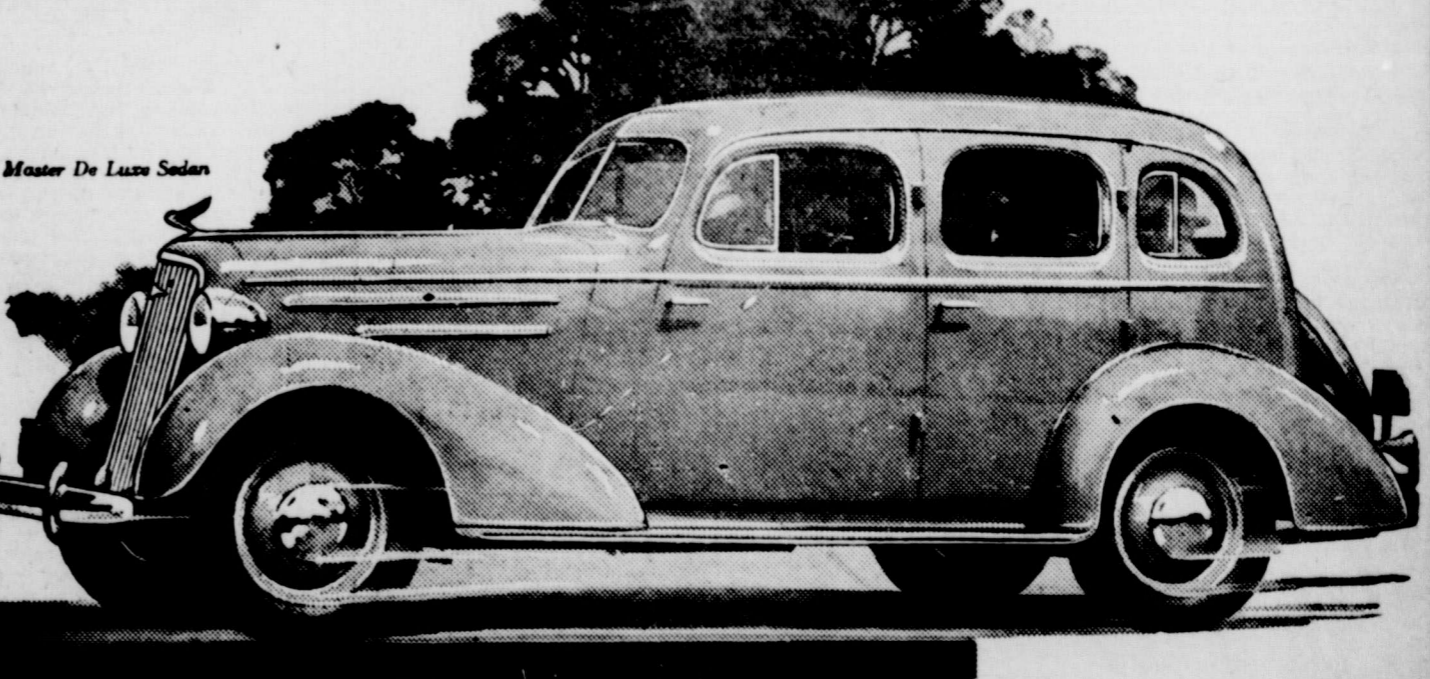

TEXAS FARMS SET PROGRESS PACE OF U. S.

COLLEGE STATION, Dec. 5.—Texas Extensioners taking a swift backward glance at 1935 find that great things have been accomplished by Texas rural citizens, according to an advance report sent to Washington, D. C. by Director H. H. Williamson.

A huge surplus feed and food crop, nearly three times as much as grown in 1924, has been harvested and saved. More than 1,800 new trench silos have been reported as filled in 1935 to save this crop.

About 47,000 home demonstration club women and girls have a record of 28,119,424 containers of food already on their pantry shelves. In 127 counties, 37,349 club women and girls were enrolled as bedroom demonstrators and club operators. In 61 counties, 21,253 club women and girls have worked at landscaping the farmstead. More than 24,000 club women and girls in 107 counties are working as wardrobe demonstrators and co-operators in making their own clothes.

More than 4,000 horticulture demonstrations and 25,000 cooperating men and women influenced other rural citizens to increase the value, productivity and profits of truck crops, orchards and home gardens.

Meats work went forward with continued enthusiasm with the most specialists visiting five districts and aiding 30 agents in conducting farm butchering demonstrations. Meat schools were held, and seven meat shows conducted in the state, where home cured and canned meat products were on display.

Hide tanning demonstrations and leather schools have been held in 50 counties and attended by 150,000 citizens from approximately 130 counties.

The Extension entomologist reports that the extermination of cut ants is being carried forward by county agricultural agents and that an estimated value of last winter's work in this field ran at \$27,000.

Turkey demonstrations were stressed in 1935 with the result that more than 100 turkey demonstrators improved their methods of growing, dressing and marketing their birds.

Erosion Programs. The wind erosion programs, an effort to check the blowing of soil in 22 northwestern Panhandle counties, occupied the agricultural agents in northwest Texas in the early months of 1935. Several million acres were treated and checked for the blowing and drifting of soil and saved much of the moisture that fell later.

Enrollment of Texas boys in 4-H club work in 1935 increased, bringing the total enrollment up to 13,968 boys actually engaged in productive demonstrations under supervision of the county agricultural agents.

Reports of Extension district agents show that 19,000 Texas farmers kept accurate record books of their enterprises during 1935.

Texas Will Start 2 New Dormitories

AUSTIN, Dec. 5.—Two dormitories to cost nearly \$450,000 will be built at the University of Texas starting this month. One will be for boys and other for girls, supplementing two new dormitories now under construction.

The men's dormitory will cost \$218,647, financed with \$119,000 federal grant and a \$135,000 loan. The women's building will cost \$225,000 when completed, with a \$178,000 PWA loan and a \$72,000 grant.

General contract on the men's dormitory is let to J. E. Morgan and Sons of El Paso at \$172,203, and the women's building to H. H. Moecker of San Antonio at \$128,393. University regents said other applications for federal aid are pending. Included are those for a women's dormitory at the Galveston Medical School, and hospital for cripple children and a negro hospital at Galveston, and residences at Mount Locke Observatory in West Texas.

Dalhart Superintendent Raises Question Why Texas High Schools Play Football

DALHART, Dec. 5.—L. H. Rhodes, superintendent of Dalhart schools and president of the Panhandle Plains Superintendents' association, is embarking upon a campaign throughout the Texas Panhandle asking the question, "Is high school football on the way out?"

The question, he said, came to mind after talking with a railroad man who for years has been one of the Panhandle's most enthusiastic football fans. "My last boy is finishing his college football career this year and I'm glad of it," the railroad man said. "There's so much danger—so many injuries."

Rhodes asked a number of parents and fans why high school football is played. Answers ranged everywhere. One reply was that so far it has been the smaller of a number of evils. Schools, like communities, have failed so far to plan adequately for the proper recreation of the individual. Football and other athletics have met, at least, part of a need not otherwise provided for.

MORE TURKEYS TO BE SHIPPED FOR CHRISTMAS

CUERO, Dec. 5.—Turkey shipments during the Christmas season are expected to be the largest in the history of DeWitt county, famous as a producing center.

More than 125,000 sleek gobblers and turkey hens were witheld from the Thanksgiving market because of low prices.

Growers refused to ship their 1935 crop until prices were raised to 18 cents a pound. This caused flooded markets during the last two days of the Thanksgiving season.

As a result they were able to ship only a minor portion of top-grade, top-quality birds. Thanksgiving shipments were the lightest in many years, less than 25,000 turkeys being moved.

Packers had expected to ship 1-2,000,000 pounds. Indications were that the 1936 crop in this section will be the largest in history.

Thad Lane, one of the county's leading growers, said flocks of turkeys here contained 50 to 600, would be held back this year as a breeding stock for 1936 because of low prices.

The average grower usually holds back a dozen hens to be used as laying stock.

Drunk Driving War Is No Idle Threat

DALHART, Dec. 5.—Announcement by Sheriff Harvey D. Foust several weeks ago that Dalhart had declared unrelenting war on drunk drivers, was no idle threat.

They have already been indicted during the current district court term. Leniency on a former indictment was revoked, a fine imposed, a suspended prison sentence pronounced and the man prohibited from driving a car for a year.

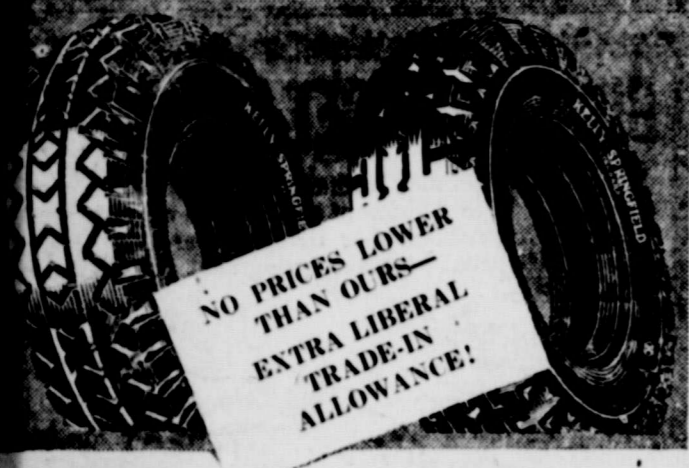

More Money Seen In Not Raising Cotton

CUEBO, Dec. 5.—DeWitt county farmers are convinced there is more money in "not raising cotton" than there is in "raising cotton."

They planted more than 70,000 acres in cotton during 1935 and produced less than 9,000 bales. Gross return was approximately \$5 an acre net return of less than half that amount.

More than 26,000 acres were devoted to federal crop control, for which the farmers will receive \$175,000, or almost \$7 an acre.

98 MEN TO BE GIVEN JOBS IN WPA PROJECTS

EASTLAND, Dec. 5 — Ninety-eight were to receive employment on Works Progress Administration projects this week under requisitions for workers announced Saturday by Crigler Paschall, director of the National Re-employment Service at Eastland.

First employment of unemployed "white collar" residents under the WPA was shown in requisition for 20 to revise tax records of Eastland county. The work will start Thursday.

Forty men will be used on a road project from Rising Star to Carbon. Thursday is set as the date of the work to start.

In commissioner's precinct Number three, 32 men will be employed on a road project. Work was scheduled to begin Wednesday.

Total employed in the county's five sewing room projects was boosted to 150 when six additional workers started Wednesday, Paschall stated.

Applicants for the new project were to be interviewed "all this week," the NRS director advised.

Britain Ready To Join Oil Embargo

LONDON, Dec. 5.—Great Britain is ready to join in an oil embargo against Italy and feels that as long as the Ethiopian war continues "there is little to be gained by resuming the discussion of reduction of armaments," Sir Samuel Hoare, foreign secretary, told the house of commons today.

His statement was made during a debate on foreign affairs and replied to an attack on the government by Hugh Dalton, laborite, in which Dalton said: "Stop Mussolini's oil and you'll stop Mussolini's war. He knows it."

Build Naval Base
Just previous to the debate the admiralty informed the house of commons it is spending nearly \$50,000,000 on the Singapore naval base in the far east.

The debate touched variously on the Ethiopian war, oil sanctions, Japan's invasion of China, and the movement in Egypt for independence.

Sir Samuel commented significantly that Germany evidently shares Britain's view about the futility of talking armament reduction now.

Annual Red Cross Meeting Saturday

The annual meeting of the Eastland county chapter of the Red Cross will be held at the Cisco Chamber of Commerce building Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. It has been announced by J. E. Spencer, county chairman.

Purpose of the meeting, Spencer said, is to elect officers and transact other business of the county organization.

The county chairman stressed the importance of the annual meeting and urged a large attendance.

"Every member of the county is eligible to attend and is invited to be present. We urge as large an attendance as possible."

The annual roll call for the chapter was completed last week.

Skeletons Found In Suits of Armor

VENICE, Dec. 5.—Skeletons fully arrayed in medieval armor have been found in excavations in this region, all in a perfect state of preservation.

Workers engaged on excavations for the new great canal which is now under construction not far from here in the picturesque district surrounding Stra, came across what undoubtedly must have been the scene of a great battle in the days of the ancient Venetian Republic.

One of the many skeletons in armor was found to have a sword still between the ribs. Presumably the man fell in battle and has lain undisturbed all these centuries.

Police this week warned against what appeared to be "wilful destruction of property" which has been occurring during the last week in increasing volume.

"We want to ask the parents of Cisco to keep a little closer track of their youngsters," Police Chief M. L. Perdue said.

"If they don't, they need not be surprised if they have to come down here to find them in the city hall. This destruction of property has to stop."

Street Lights Broken
He pointed out that during the last week many street lights have been shot out, as well as other damage done. "From Third street on over to Avenue N nearly every light was shot out," the chief said, adding that "it's boys with air rifles and 'nigger-shooters' that are making the trouble."

So far there have been no lights shot out in the business district, involving the big globes about the electric lamps, the chief said.

One church window and that of a residence were reported broken a few nights ago, the police reported.

It was pointed out that the shooting of lights is not only costly but dangerous as well. The breaking of street lights leaves dark places in the city, which would necessitate extra police protection if not eliminated.

Cluck Commended On Adult School Work

Superintendent R. N. Cluck Tuesday received a telegram from A. A. Bullock, state director of the adult section of the Texas State Teachers association, upon election to the presidency of the Adult Teachers association.

Cluck was elected to the position at the state teachers meeting at San Antonio during the Thanksgiving holidays. Last year he was vice president of the organization and served as its head following the resignation of the president.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—A drastic shakeup in personnel of the federal reserve system under the 1935 banking act, giving the administration control powers began today.

HOWELL CASE IS RESET FOR DECEMBER 18

EASTLAND, Dec. 5.—Case of Mary Lou Howell, charged by indictment with the murder of L. F. Threet, Aug. 14, 1934, was passed and reset for Dec. 18 after defendant's motion for continuance had been overruled by 88th District Judge B. W. Patterson today.

Frank Judkins, attorney for Miss Howell, pleaded former jeopardy because of a previous conviction of the defendant for robbery growing out of the same transaction, which case was pending an appeal, and sought a continuance to await the decision of the court of criminal appeals.

APPEAL ARGUMENT HEARD BY COURT
AUSTIN, Dec. 5.—Arguments were presented to the court of criminal appeal here Wednesday in the appeal of Mary Lou Howell, from a 20-year robbery conviction at Baird.

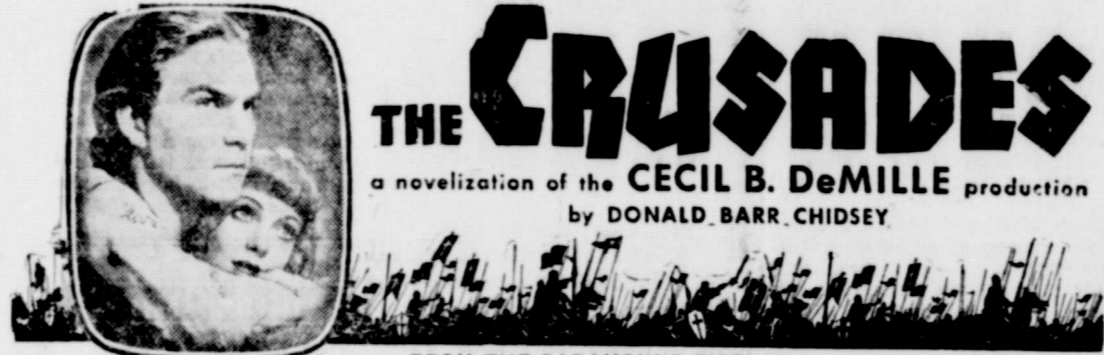

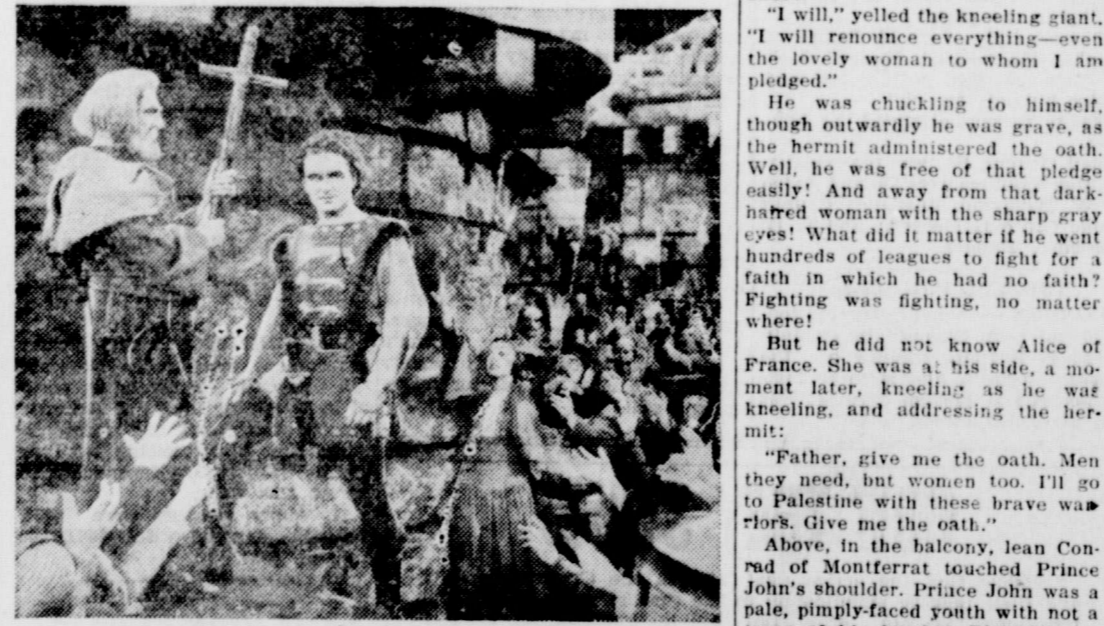

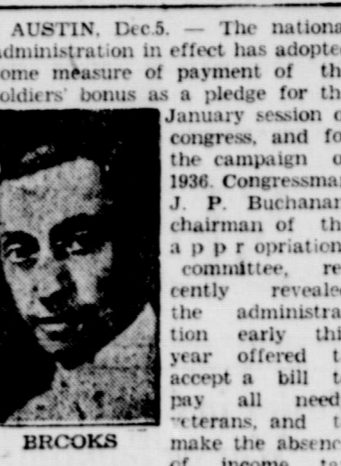

AUSTIN, Dec. 5 — The national administration in effect has adopted some measure of payment of the soldiers' bonus as a pledge for the January session of congress, and for the campaign of 1936. Congressman J. P. Buchanan, chairman of the appropriations committee, recently revealed the administration's intention early this year offered to accept a bill to pay all needy veterans, and to make the absence of income tax payment the criterion of eligibility.

Effect of this step will be to draw the powerful teeth of the Patman and other bonus sponsors' campaign. Relief will go on in Texas a long time. Some small amounts of federal relief for December and January will probably be found, in view of the decision that the national administration will ask one billion dollars — nearly half the 1935-36 allotment, for direct relief in 1936-37.

It will be impossible to shut off payments at the time the government is asking a future appropriation for the same purpose — and having to call upon a Texas congressman to sponsor the program. Congressman Buchanan, appropriations chairman, vigorously is urging that direct relief be cut off throughout the nation as quickly as possible, but he has never broken with the administration on the reservation of "as quickly as possible," but rather is in agreement that the sum must be cut as low as possible and the number of recipients trimmed by every possible means including the artificial creation of employment from government sources.

The men who fought the last war in the trenches — rather than in Washington offices — have demanded of the nation that future war shall not be for the financial profit of the oil trusts or anybody else — that conscription shall apply to wealth, factories, economic resources, the same as to farm boys. That demand has had telling effect so far, and the results prove the economic truth that war without profit to powerful groups has far less appeal.

CUERO, Dec. 5 — DeWitt county farmers are convinced there is more money in "not raising cotton" than there is in "raising cotton." They planted more than 70,000 acres in cotton during 1935 and produced less than 9,000 bales. Gross return was approximately \$8 an acre net return of less than half that amount. More than 26,000 acres were devoted to federal crop control, by which the farmers will receive \$17,000, or almost \$7 an acre.

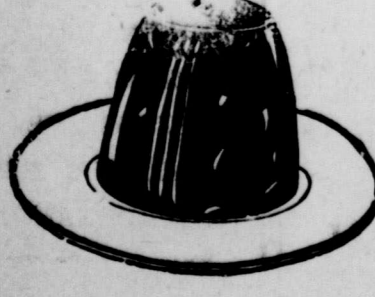

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Before a generally hostile audience of industrialists, the New Deal's labor relations act was defended today by its administrator as vitally necessary to lift American labor from helplessness in dealing with employers. The speaker was Chairman J. Warren Madden, of the National Labor relations board. His audience was composed of leaders of major industries, who, at sessions of the Congress of American Industry and the National Association of Manufacturers, have lined up to defend the New Deal in 1936. Madden quoted a decision by the late Chief Justice William Howard Taft upholding labor's legal right to organize and asserting that "a single employe was helpless in dealing with an employer."

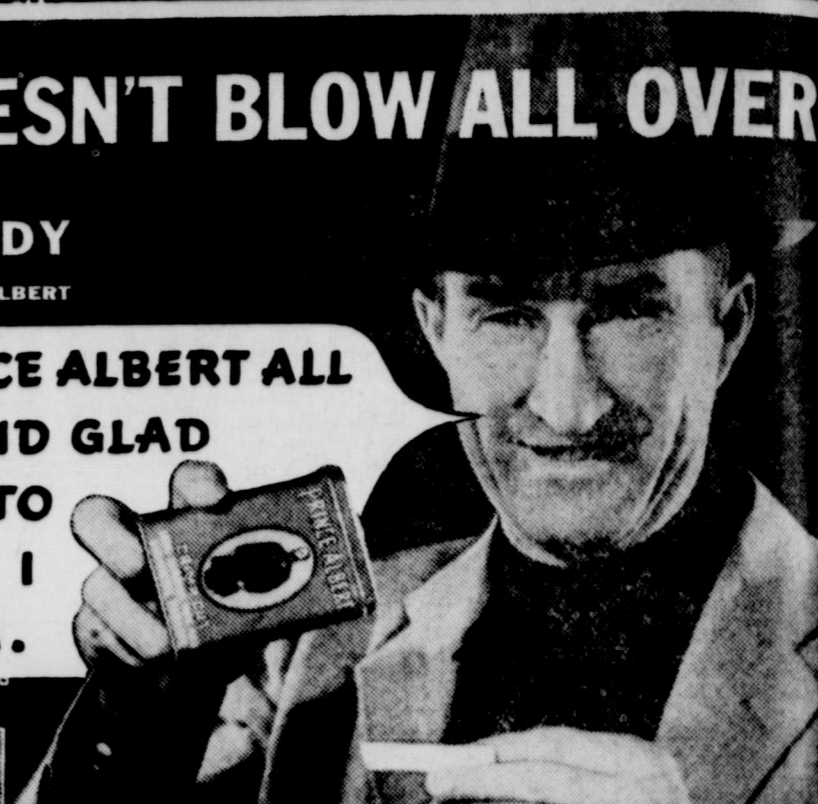

Lower Grade Cotton Shows Big Increase

AUSTIN, Dec. 5 — Cotton classed last week from Texas ginnings includes a larger proportion of cotton below middling (white and extra white) than any previous week this season. About 43 per cent of the cotton classed this week consists of grades below middling, compared to 41 per cent last week and 30 per cent for the previous week. However, for the season up to this time, only 26 per cent of the total samples classed from Texas ginnings has been below middling. The remaining 74 per cent consists of 17 per cent for strict middling and better grades, 36 per cent for middling, and 21 per cent for spotted cotton. The proportions for colored cotton, other than spotted, are negligible.

For each of the past three weeks, the proportions representing cotton shorter than 7-8 inch have been considerably smaller than for the several weeks prior to the past three weeks. The proportion for this designation has ranged from 9 per cent to 15 per cent during the past three weeks. For a number of weeks prior to this period, the proportion for cotton shorter than 7-8 inch held a level around 20 per cent. Up to this time this season, 14 per cent has been shorter than 7-8 inch, 39 per cent 7-8, 36 per cent 15-16 inch, and about 11 per cent has been 1 inch and longer lengths.

Large Meteor Seen Here Tuesday Night

A large meteor that created a bright flash as it raced across the skies near here early Tuesday evening "lighted up the heavens enough for reading," it was reported today by Ciscoans who saw the "shooting star." One said the meteor appeared to be very near and to have "landed" on Harrell hill but it may have struck in New Mexico.

The rounded roof lines of the car remain unbroken, while the listener has the benefit of ear-level reception introduced in the Ford radio a year ago. The set continues to be of six tubes, with a number of chassis improvements. The chassis case has been shortened and made more compact, fitting underneath the instrument panel and above the steering column. It is invisible to those sitting on the front seat. The set has slightly increased sensitivity and external noises have been lessened. It is claimed internal circuit filtering now keeps out more external interference, such as from high tension wires and street cars, improving reception, especially in cities. The speaker is of entirely new design. It is mounted flush on the

header bar above the windshield. When installed it is covered by the car trim, completely out of sight. In the manufacture of the speaker, parts are held to tolerances as close as seven ten-thousandths (.0007) and one ten-thousandth (.0001) of an inch. The speaker cone has been redesigned to insure good reception right through the scale including high notes and bass notes. Instead of having a three-point tone control, a constantly variable tone control is now used.

MORE TURKEYS TO BE SHIPPED FOR CHRISTMAS

CUERO, Dec. 5 — Turkey shipments during the Christmas season are expected to be the largest in the history of DeWitt county, famous as a producing center.

More than 125,000 sleek gobblers and turkey hens were withheld from the Thanksgiving market because of low prices.

Growers refused to ship their 1935 crop until prices were raised to 18 cents a pound. This caused flooded markets during the last two days of the Thanksgiving season.

As a result they were able to ship only a minor portion of top-conditioned birds. Thanksgiving shipments were the lightest in many years, less than 25,000 turkeys being moved.

Packers had expected to ship 1,000,000 pounds.

Indications were that the 1936 crop in this section will be the largest in history.

Thad Lane, one of the county's leading growers, said flocks of turkeys here containing 50 to 600 would be held back this year as a breeding stock for 1936 because of low prices.

The average grower usually holds back a dozen hens to be used as laying stock.
