### Act Is Defended

NEW YORK, Dec. 5-Before generally hostile audience of indus-trialists, the New Deal's labor relations act was defended today by its administrator as vitally neces-sary to lift American labor from helplessness in dealing with em-

The speaker was Chairman J Warren Madden, of the National Labor relations board. His audience was composed of leaders of major industries, who, at sessions of the Congress of American Industry and the National Association of Manuufacturers, have lined up to defend the New Deal in 1936.

Madden quoted a decision by the late Chief Justice William Howard Taft upholding labor's legal right to organize and asserting that "a single employe was helpless in dealing with an employer.
