## WORLD WAR FEAR BEHIND PEACE PLAN

### SIR SAMUEL HOARE DEFENDS POSITION OF BRITAIN; SAYS ATTACK WILL BE RESISTED

(By United Press)  
LONDON, Dec. 19—Fear of another world war prompted the Anglo-French proposals for settling the Ethiopian war, Sir Samuel Hoare, who resigned as foreign secretary because of general denunciation of the plan, told the house of commons today in a historic speech defending his course.

"If the Italians attack us we shall retaliate," Sir Samuel said. The house was packed to utmost capacity and some diplomats could not find seats. Hoare's defense was cheered with a protracted chorus of "Hear! Hear!"

"We are entering a much more dangerous phase of a new chapter of war," Sir Samuel said. Britain, he added, has been alone in taking precautions against it. "Not a ship, not a machine, and not a man has been moved by any other member of the League. Without active cooperation, collective security is impossible, and the League would dissolve," he said.

Speed of Aggressor  
"An aggressor can strike with appalling speed." He cited reports that Italy would regard an oil embargo as an act of war against her as one of the reasons for his caution in the negotiations.

"It was clear that Italy would react violently to the imposition of such a sanction," he said. In affirming that Britain was not afraid of Italy, he explained: "But feared a lightning spark that might light a European conflagration."

"With all humility, I tell the house that my conscience is clear. I sincerely believe the course I took was the only one possible under the circumstances," he said earnestly.

League Postpones Talk Of Embargo On Oil for Italy  
GENEVA, Dec. 19—The League general staff committee of 18 today indefinitely postponed action on the threatened oil embargo against Italy.

The committee agreed that the League should continue to insure the application of the financial and economic sanctions which already have been voted. It was believed the oil embargo question would not arise again until at least after the debate on foreign policy in the French chamber of deputies on Dec. 27.

The council, formally voting down the Franco-British peace plan without debate, sought to delay further sanctions until the new year.

College President Hanged in Effigy  
AMARILLO, Dec. 19—Amarillo citizens, enroute to work today, were startled by the sight of a dummy hanging from a traffic signal on one of the busiest street intersections in the downtown district. Attached was a placard lettered: "Prexy McLemore."

Sen. Collie to Be Governor For Day  
AUSTIN, Dec. 19—Lieutenant Governor Walter Woodul said here today he will go to New Orleans for the Sugar Bowl game, thus making Senator Wilbourne Collie, Eastland, governor on New Year's day. Governor Allred will be at the Rose Bowl game between Southern Methodist and Stanford. Collie is president pro tem of the senate.

Charge 5 Policemen In Labor Lynchings  
TAMPA, Dec. 19—Five policemen who sent three labor organizers out of the police station into the hands of a massed mob were accused today of first degree murder. The organizers were tarred, feathered, and beaten. One died.

### SCHOOLS WILL CLOSE FRIDAY FOR HOLIDAYS

If the young people make Christmas worthwhile, they will be doing their part this year, for they are starting today with their celebrations which will last until the beginning of the new year. The school celebrations will begin today and will include Christmas trees and the exchange of gifts, programs, a banquet, an operetta, and the filling of Christmas stockings for the poor. The school holidays will begin Friday. The public schools will close at 3:30, to remain closed until Monday Dec. 30. This will mean nine days of vacation for the youngsters. The Randolph college Christmas holidays will begin at Callander, with students returning for classes on Monday, Dec. 30, the same as the high school, it was announced today. This evening the Randolph students will hold their annual banquet at 6:30 in the college dining hall. Students, ex-students, and friends are invited. Following the banquet the college will hold its Christmas program and Christmas tree, with the exchange of gifts by the students.

The other observance of Christmas this evening will be on the part of the colored school, which will have its program and tree now instead of on Christmas Eve in order that white friends may attend.

High School Program  
The usual routine of the high school will be changed somewhat tomorrow, Principal H. Brandon said today, in order to hold the Christmas program during the last period in the afternoon. There will be a general assembly in the auditorium, with a program and a Christmas tree. High school students are bringing gifts of toys, candies, and fruits, and will fill Christmas stockings for the needy boys and girls of the city who may not be so fortunate as they.

The public school music department will present its first program in the form of an operetta, "When Christmas Comes," at the high school auditorium Friday evening at 7:30. Grammar school pupils will be used for the various roles, with Miss Dorothy Kramer, head of the department, directing the operetta.

Down in the grades, where the eyes of the youngsters sparkle as brightly as the Christmas decorations at the sight of the Christmas trees, there will be room programs and Christmas trees, singing of carols, and the exchange of gifts. Decorations of rooms will play a big part in the grade school celebrations, with the pupils making much of their own decorations.

### LANGER GIVEN ACQUITTAL BY FEDERAL JURY

BISMARCK, N. D., Dec. 19—Former Governor William Langer of North Dakota was acquitted by a federal court today in his third trial on charges of conspiracy. Political experts believed Langer would announce his candidacy for governor in the 1936 election. He was ousted when the charges on which he was acquitted were filed.

The jury also acquitted Frank Vogel and R. A. Kinzer of similar charges. Another defendant, state Senator Oscar Erickson, was acquitted on a directed verdict by Judge A. Lee Wyman.

The acquittal today was a complete triumph for the fiery executive in his long battle against government attempts to send him to prison.

Thompson Sees Oil Consumption Peak

Col. Ernest O. Thompson, head of the Texas Railroad commission, has written it into the record "the final and definite end of the threat of federal oil control is the major development in the petroleum industry this year." He has predicted the greatest producing state forecast in 1936 as an all-time peak in oil consumption—probably six per cent over 1935.

In a review of conditions in Texas and elsewhere, the Colonel said, "Withdrawals from storage continues to the extent of only about 50 million more barrels. After that current consumption must be met with current production. That will take place in 1936. Great prosperity is in store for the oil industry in 1936—in every phase."

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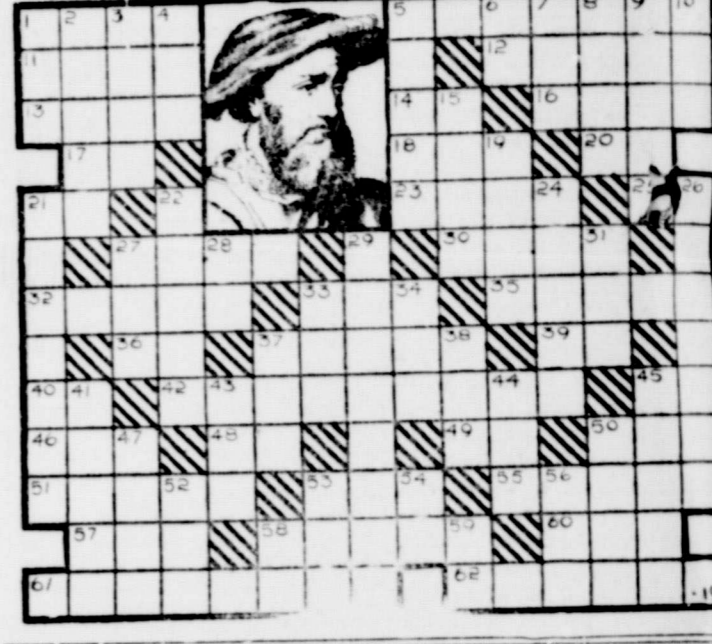

**I. Q. Is Elusive To Athletic Ability**

BURLINGTON, Vt., Dec. 19.—Intelligence and athletic ability do not necessarily have any relationship, it was discovered recently by the University of Vermont.

More than 125 freshmen, who completed the Cozens test, designed to establish the relationship between intelligence quotients and athletic ability, showed results that indicated there is no relationship. A student with a high intelligence quotient also may be a good athlete or a poor one.

A survey of those who scored high in the test showed all of them had a preparatory or high school athletic record.

### HOWELL CASE CONTINUED IN 88TH DISTRICT

Trial of Mary Lou Howell, charged with murder in the robbery and death of L. P. Threest, Cisco rancher, was continued in 88th district court at Eastland Wednesday. No date was set for the hearing. Elmer Van Cleave, charged with conspiracy to rob in the same case, was given a two-year sentence upon his plea of guilty. He still faces a charge of murder. Miss Howell was charged with the slaying of Threest on his ranch in Callahan county in August, 1934. Also charged in the case were Clifford Doggett, now facing a sentence to die in the electric chair, and Van Cleave. Miss Howell's 20-year sentence on the robbery charge recently was reversed and a new trial ordered by the court of criminal appeals at Austin. At the same time the appeal upheld the death sentence of Doggett on the murder charge.

### Insufficient Evidence

In ordering a continuation of the case this morning District Judge B. W. Patterson held that unless the state could offer additional evidence in the case, it would be thrown out of court. The state's case in the robbery trial of Miss Howell and the two trials of Doggett was based chiefly upon testimony of Van Cleave, who told of being approached by Doggett and being told that a girl was going to take a man to his pasture. He said that he and Doggett went to the pasture and found the man and ordered them to put up their hands, and shot Threest when he failed to obey.

Jobe Thursday morning was making preparations to advertise the seized liquor for sale. Under new state law, seized liquor must be advertised for sale to wholesale dealers 10 days after the seizure. Nearest wholesale dealers were believed located in Fort Worth. Mrs. King paid a fine of \$38.10 and King a fine of \$29.65.

### U.S. Promises Action Upon Peanut Market

Hope for a new market for peanuts at a substantially higher price for farmers of this area was seen Thursday when action was promised by the department of commerce within the next 48 hours. The present price is from 65 to 75 cents a bushel, due to a break in the market after the government contracts expired Nov. 15. It was believed that if a solution would be worked out whereby the bonus demand of peanut crushers could be met, a price of around 90 cents a bushel, based on 70 per cent sound nuts, could be established for this section of the country, including all the territory west of the Mississippi.

### Mystery Death Of Thelma Todd To Get Inquiry

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 19.—A searching inquiry into the death of Thelma Todd will begin Friday, it was announced today from headquarters of the Los Angeles grand jury. The complaint committee of the grand jury prepared to enter a special session to consider the Todd case. The body of the actress, clad in blue satin lounging pajamas, lay in state today. Thousands of movie fans and friends passed by her coffin in a seemingly endless line. A crowd gathered before the funeral chapel at 7:30. Police stood by to prevent riots which have marred the last rites of other film stars. When the doors opened a steady stream filed slowly through the room. The body lay in an orchid satin coffin. Beside it was a large portrait of the comedienne whose dimpled smile and sparkling eyes had captivated countless theatergoers.

### F.F.A. Chapter's Aims Are Listed For School Year

Aims of the Cisco high school chapter of the Future Farmers of America, adopted recently by the club were announced Saturday by T. G. Caudle, faculty sponsor. The aims of the local chapter follow those of the state organization, as outlined in the Lone Star Farmer. Under the aim of developing a competent, aggressive rural and agricultural leadership, the Cisco club will have its officers attend at least three district officers training schools, cooperate with other government agencies in helping make successful the AAA and soil erosion programs, and sponsor and carry out an FFA improvement contest. To increase interest in the intelligent choice of farming occupations, the club will spend representatives to regional fairs or visit outstanding farms and ranches, and sponsor supervised farming programs so as to lead the boy to "grow into farming" rather than just "prospecting around."

### Improve Homes

In order to create and nurture a love of country life and to improve the rural home and its surroundings, the chapter agreed to hold a father and son banquet, have 75 per cent of the members beautify their farm homestead, have 75 per cent of the members make needed repairs on home and farm buildings, cooperate for successful exhibits at the Texas Centennial in agriculture, livestock, poultry, or FFA work.

### Scholarship

Under scholarship, the organization aims at having local officers meet Inter-scholastic League standards and having district officers average 75 per cent in all subjects. Under its recreational activities, the chapter will have 25 per cent of its members attend a summer FFA encampment. To supplement the regular systematic instruction offered to students in vocational agriculture, the chapter members will enter at least one district literary contest and have every officer win a certificate of merit in parliamentary procedure. In order to advance the cause of vocational agriculture in public schools, the chapter will hold a project show or set up three educational booths and enter a project exhibit (FFA history in Texas) in a local fair. 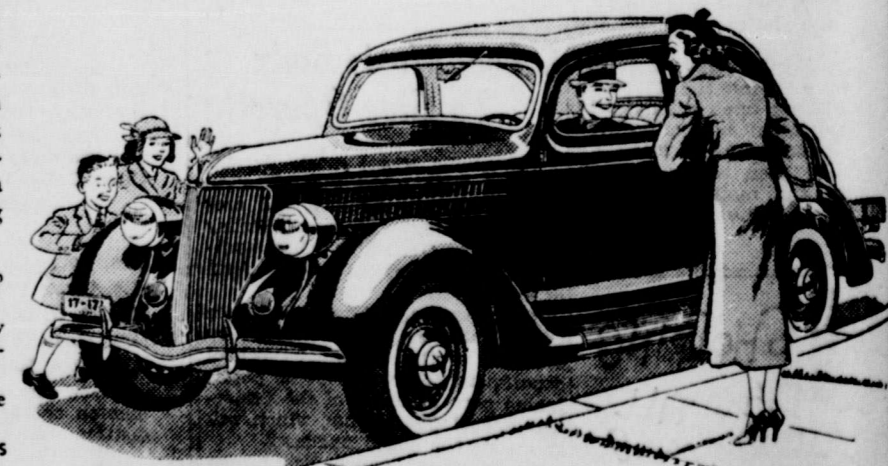

## COTTON MEN DUE TO ELECT NEXT FRIDAY

EASTLAND, Dec. 19.—There will be a general election of cotton committeemen for 1936 held at Eastland county Friday December 20, 1935. These committeemen will be elected by the producers who signed contracts in 1935 and only those producers will be eligible to vote. Notices are being sent to each contract signer as to the place of meeting to hold these elections for the specified day.

Any cotton producer who has a contract in 1935 and will sign a contract in 1936 is eligible to serve as a committeeman representing his district in securing information from producers who desire to make contracts. In turn, the local committeemen will have a general meeting and elect a county committee. These committeemen elected by the producers will have full control of the contract for the year 1936.

At these meetings the high points of the contract will be discussed with the producers by the representatives who are to hold the elections.

## UNDER THE DOME AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, Dec. 19—The third special session of the 44th Texas legislature is expected to start on Jan. 13 or 14. Governor James V. Allred has not fixed definitely upon that time, but indications point to it. He has ordered a special election for Jan. 11 to fill a vacancy in the membership of the house of representatives caused by the death of Representative W. W. Fitzwater, Bonham. Unless a session were contemplated shortly after that time, it is unlikely the county would be put to the expense of the election.



Shearer reported that the Texas legislature will be the sole matter submitted to the legislature—at least until that topic is well on the way to settlement.

Without governor's submission, however, the session will have other matters of turbulent possibilities. Reports will be due from the house of representatives committees named to investigate the state department of safety; enforcement of motor truck law, and enforcement of oil regulations. Confirmation of the liquor and pension boards named by the governor under acts of the last special session will come before the senate.

Governor Allred is quite proud of his appointments. In fact he thinks that he has done a good job at picking state officials. Allred's first year of his administration. Particularly is he pleased with the record of Orville Carpenter, state auditor, and scheduled pension director. Shortly after the World War Allred and Carpenter roomed at the same bachelor boarding house in Wichita Falls. Allred was a law stenographer with ambition. Carpenter was a glass cutter studying accounting at night. Both got their certificates—Allred as a lawyer and Carpenter as a certified public accountant. When Allred, as governor, looked about for a state auditor and efficiency expert, he asked Carpenter to take the job.

Carpenter demurred. He had built up a good practice in Dallas. "Take it and get the system organized. When it is organized, I'll let you go," Allred promised. But old age pensions were voted and Allred called a conference of his advisers to pick a man to inaugurate pension administration. Unanimously they named Carpenter. Carpenter was sent for. Again he demurred. "I am asking you to take it as a service to the state," Allred said. "Then I can't refuse," was the answer.

The late Dave Nelson of Orange was another member of Allred's administration of whom the governor has been especially proud. It was Allred's urging that Nelson was had been on the Livestock Sanitary Commission, accepted a state prison board appointment as prison manager. His death from exposure followed shortly after his first tour of prisons.

Fred E. Nichols, labor commissioner, has piloted that department through a successful year without any major flare-up in the department's annex duty of supervising boxing and wrestling. "I made one mistake," Allred said recently in discussing his official family. The person he mentioned no longer is in the staff service.

Many of the governor's appointees have been men he tested as assistants when he was attorney general. R. B. Anderson, state tax commissioner, had been an assistant attorney general. Besides his tax duties, Anderson has been an advisor and negotiated the plan for a natural gas pipe line from the panhandle to Detroit, only to see it defeated by a narrow margin in the legislature. R. G. Waters went from the attorney general's department to casualty insurance commissioner and Charles Miller, recently selected as liquor administrator, was formerly chief enforcement officer of the attorney general's department.

Two men have been appointed secretary of state within one year and both have made good. Gerald Mann, Dallas, first appointee, has become the state planning board's contact man at Washington. He was succeeded by R. B. Stanford, Waco. H. F. Martin, Dallas printer, was given the employe place on the industrial accident board when Mrs. Espas (Stanford) resigned to take up
