### Thompson Sees Oil Consumption Peak

Col. Ernest O. Thompson, head of the Texas Railroad commission, has written it into the record "the final and definite end of the threat of federal oil control is the major development in the petroleum industry this year." He has predicted the greatest producing state forecast in 1936 as court decision in the oil case and the effected enforcement come up again. It should not.

In a review of conditions in Texas and elsewhere, the Colonel said, "Withdrawals from storage continues to the extent of only about 50 million more barels. After that current consumption must be met with current production. That will take place in 1936. Great prosperity is in store for the oil industry in 1936-in every phase." He expressed the opinion no new legislation is needed, either state or national, and that the interstate oil compact commission is fully organized and functioning.
