Oklahoma Prison Under Quarantine

McALLISTER, Okla., Dec. 21—The Oklahoma state penitentiary was placed under quarantine by health officials today when the illness of a convict was diagnosed as spinal meningitis. The convict was isolated outside the main prison. There are 4,200 convicts in the penitentiary.
Authorities said that the convict suffering from the dread disease which has claimed a dozen lives in Oklahoma in the last two weeks is trustworthy and had returned to the penitentiary Thursday. He was ill then.

NEW HOPE OF PARK HERE IS GIVEN CISCO

New hope for an early location of a CCC camp here to build the proposed Cisco state park in the area south and east of Lake Cisco was seen yesterday, following receipt of two letters from the state parks board, assuring Cisco of the board's approval and cooperation.
The first of the two letters, from Chief Engineer R. O. Whiteaker, in addition to promising the board's cooperation for an early location of the camp, said that the chief engineer will be in Cisco in a few days for a study of the area.
The other letter, from former Chairman D. E. Colp, president of the Cisco Boosters, who recently sent a brief of the park project to former Governor Pat Neff, chairman of the parks board.
Following is the text of Colp's letter:
"This will acknowledge receipt of copy of your letter to Chairman Neff with reference to your proposed state park and to start with I want to tell you the writer has been especially interested in your project since 1924 when the parks board accompanied by Governor Neff visited this site because we appreciated the fact that it was one of the best projects that we had seen in the state. We are still of that same opinion.
"You can rest assured we will make application for a camp as soon as the National Park Service advises us that they are ready to receive applications. They set aside certain periods for these things and if we send in an application out of season they send it back to us and tell us to hold it until they are ready for it. This, of course, we know is good business because it keeps everything in its proper place. By having all of the applications on the desk at the same time enables them to make a much more intelligent selection of the sites that are

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21—The late Thelma Todd's private life—her marriage, her romances, her friendships, her enemies, her business activities—will be on parade before the Los Angeles grand jury when it meets Monday to examine possibilities of murder in the death of the blonde screen comedienne, Deputy District Attorney George Johnson said tonight.
The inquiry will be the most searching of the several investigations which followed the mysterious death of the actress in an automobile in a garage near her Santa Monica cafe Sunday or Monday.
"If there has been a murder, we must find the motive," Johnson said.

Young Milne, heir to a textile fortune, was said to have collapsed soon after arriving at his mother's home here and was ordered to bed by a physician.
The physician said the youth was not in a serious condition.
Asked to confirm these reports, he replied: "I don't know anything about that. The condition is entirely satisfactory. That's all I can say."

CONVICT WILL GET FURLOUGH ON CHRISTMAS

CHICAGO, Dec. 21—Christmas, 1935, promises to be the happiest Richard Cough ever had.
It's strange too, because he's in the penitentiary.
But one of his Christmas presents is six months furlough from prison. That in itself would be enough for him, but there's more.
Cough's eyes have been dimming and he faced the prospect of spending the remainder of his life in blindness as well as behind prison walls.
To him the holiday season, with its joy and happiness was a mockery until his case was brought before Governor J. M. Fretwell of Arkansas.
Cough has been serving a life term for murder but the family of his victim signed a petition asking the governor to free him for six months so he can undergo an operation to restore normal vision to his eyes.
Cough's case was typical of the Christmas spirit that moved chief executives and pardon boards throughout the nation to act in worthy cases.

WAGNER LAW HELD INVALID IN TEST CASE

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 21—The Wagner labor act enacted at the last session of congress, was declared unconstitutional tonight by Judge Merrill Otis in federal district court.
It was the first court test of the National Labor Relations act.
In his opinion Judge Otis attacked a resolution pending in congress to amend the constitution. If enacted, the resolution would make the Wagner act constitutional, he said, but in that event the "citizens will have become a subject."
Judge Otis held that act violates the "commerce clause" of the constitution because it attempts to extend the power of congress to regulate industries whose operations do not affect interstate commerce.

Youth Mutilates Brother in Fight

HUNTSVILLE, Dec. 21—Clyde Cooper, 33, who beat his brother, Bob, senseless, and then mutilated him with a crude penknife, whispered through the bars of his cell tonight that "God told me to do it."
Bob Cooper was in a hospital in a critical condition but physicians said he had a "chance to recover. He is suffering chiefly from shock of the encephalitis. The attack occurred at his home yesterday.

More Ginning Seen Than Last Season

Cotton ginnings in Cisco this year probably will be greater than they were last year, according to John Peter Huey of the Planters gin.
Huey said that 669 bales have already been ginned this year, as compared with a 692 for last season. He believed that more than 700 bales likely would be ginned.

Girl Slays Father Who Refuses To Permit Date for Christmas Program

Leona Willis, 14, another daughter, attempted to save her father's life, she said. She said she struggled with her sister over the gun, but the elder girl won the tussle.

Snow Falling Over Eastern End of State

Rain and snow chilled northeastern and eastern Texas Saturday night. Both sleet and snow were reported at Longview. A heavy snow storm continued for more than two hours at Timpson, near the Louisiana border, but the flakes melted as they fell.
The first December snow since 1921 was reported at Grapeland, where the temperature dropped to 42.
Hopes of Henderson for a "white Christmas" were disappointed as snow melted.
Traces of snow were mixed with rain at Dallas and Fort Worth. Dr. J. L. Cline, federal meteorologist, said warm weather Saturday night likely would cause the snow to turn to rain in East Texas.

Marshal Known As Farm Mob Victim

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 21—Henry L. Dillingham, United States marshal who was beaten by a farm mob at Plattsburg last summer at a foreclosure sale, received a package through the mails although the only address was a picture of the mob scene pasted to the wrapper.
In the center of the mob scene was Dillingham, and the Missouri mail clerks apparently realized the package was for him. It was mailed at Platte City.

HICKOK WELL GOOD FOR 100 BARRELS DAY

What appeared to be a 100 barrel well for Cisco was drilled in yesterday by the Hickok Oil and Gas corporation a mile and a half north-east of the city.
Drilling has been stopped and the company is busy setting flow tanks to take care of the production. The well was drilled to a depth of 3,426 feet.
Between three and five more feet of the pay sand have not yet been touched. R. L. Ponsler, Hickok superintendent said he believed Saturday night.
"Without any definite estimate, I think I can safely say we have a hundred barrel natural, maybe a little better," Ponsler said. "We haven't shot the well and likely will not shoot it."
In addition to the oil, the well is making 1,250,000 cubic feet of gas.

No Trace Found Of Missing Liquor Man

SNYDER, Dec. 21—Sheriff S. H. Newsman said today no trace had been found of Truman Cannon, 40, liquor salesman from Big Spring, who disappeared Wednesday.
The sheriff returned last night from an investigation trip to Post. He said he was convinced the person or persons who saw Cannon flash a large amount of money robbed and possibly killed him.

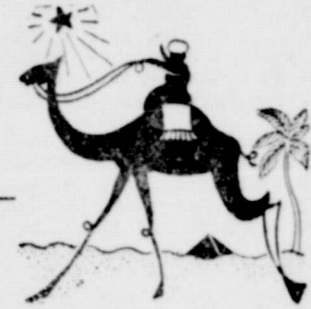

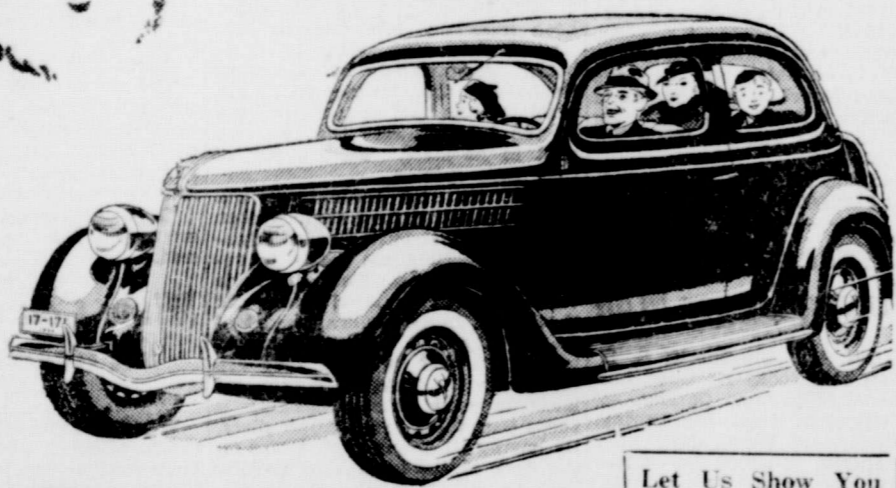

MUSIC TO AID WORLD PEACE AIM OF CHOIR

LONDON, Dec. 21 — The Royal Welsh Ladies Choir, which brought 42 years ago with "The Lord Is My Shepherd," have started out again to spread the hymn of peace.

"I am sure," said Mme. Clara Novello Davies, the choir's director, "that if we could only sing before Mussolini we would move his heart and end the war in Ethiopia."

The most brilliant singers that Wales can produce, many of those in the choir are daughters of those who in 1893 they wear Welsh costumes, tall hats and buckled shoes.

Director Is 71

"Ours is a mission of peace — peace inspired by beautiful music to a war-fearing world," the 74-year-old Mme. Davies explained as

she rehearsed the 33 girls of the choir here.

"I appeal to composers who have written or can write peace songs to send them to us."

One of the numbers on the repertoire, which will be presented first in Continental cities and later in the United States, is written by Mrs. Reginald Clarry, wife of a member of Parliament, and is dedicated to Mrs. Stanley Baldwin.

Singers Are Noted

Several of the choir singers are conductors of choirs themselves and have appeared before royalty. Others are holders of musical medals and awards.

"It is wonderful," Mme. Davies said, "how they are all willing to sink their identities and come and sing with me for peace. Many have sacrificed engagements."

During rehearsals here, which lasted for hours each day, the rosy-cheeked Welsh girls knitted as they sang. Frequently during an inspiring hymn several wept.

Big Birthday Cake For Sun Carnival

DALLAS, Dec. 21 — A huge birthday cake, in celebration of Texas' one hundredth birthday will be the contribution of the Texas Centennial Exposition to the Sun Carnival which will open Centennial year at El Paso, January 1.

The enormous cake will be placed on a float in the Sun Carnival parade. It will have one immense candle signifying the one hundredth anniversary of Texas liberty. On the float will be seated a Dallas debutante representing the Centennial Exposition. She will be equipped with a monster cake knife, ten feet long with which to slice the birthday offering.

The float will fly for the first time the flag of the Texas Centennial Exposition, its colors composite of the six emblems which have flown above Texas soil. Inscriptions on the float convey birthday greetings to Texas from its own Exposition at Dallas.

Holly Becomes Pay Crop for Maryland

CRISFIELD, Md., Dec. 21 — The bright red berries and the glossy green leaves of holly, whether fashioned into wreaths or left as festoons for decorative purposes, is only a symbol of Christmas cheer a sign of the season, to many persons.

But to the farmers of Somerset county and other communities in lower Delaware and elsewhere on the peninsula it is part of their yearly income.

New York, Philadelphia, Boston, Cleveland, Chicago, St. Louis — many of those centers of metropolitan population buy their holly wreaths casually without stopping to think from whence they came.

The eastern shore markets of Marion, Kingston and Princess Anne, Maryland, are a large source of supply, and already the holly crop, the last one of the season, is being harvested.

One dealer said that a buyer in his section told him he had contracts for one million wreaths.

And for some years past, the business has been getting better each Christmas until now holly, in-

stead of being a "sideline," represents an important item in the farmers' incomes.

Parks—city, state, and national—have done much to develop towns all over the United States. They will continue to do so as long as people travel and take vacations.

Cisco has the natural facilities for the park. There is plenty of space. The dam and Lake Cisco provide the water essential for a successful recreation spot. The swimming pool below the dam adds to the many features that will make the park one of the most attractive in this part of the country.

Cisco will be waiting for the location of a CCC camp to build the park.

"Dana's at a party," Scott said. And told his story.

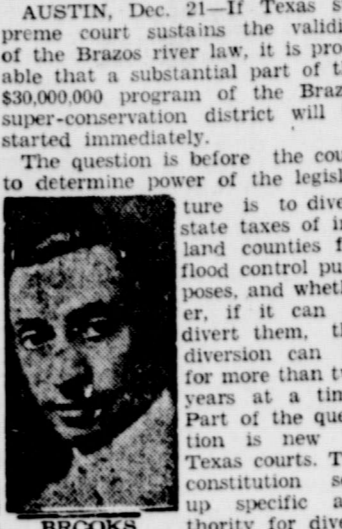
"Well then, you come. Sallie and Bart Hildreth are on their way. Please do, Scott. I promise we'll stop early."

Texas Topics

By RAYMOND BROOKS



AUSTIN, Dec. 21—If Texas supreme court sustains the validity of the Brazos river law, it is probable that a substantial part of the \$30,000,000 program of the Brazos super-conservation district will be started immediately.

The question is before the court to determine power of the legislature is to divert state taxes of inland counties for flood control purposes, and whether, if it can so divert them, the diversion can be for more than two years at a time.

Part of the question is new to Texas courts. The constitution sets up specific authority for diversions to coastal counties, to provide for seawalls and flood protection, and several counties have such grants in operation.

Just as soon as a go-ahead signal for the Brazos is given, it is probable that John A. Norris, tendered appointment as general manager, will take up the new duties and harness all the forces that together are to get the construction going. Mr. Norris is now chairman of the state board of water engineers and in that office has labored long in behalf of success of the all-Brazos development.

Governor James V. Alford will have the appointment of one state official in February, and most like another before that time. He will name a new state auditor to succeed Orville S. Carpenter, who will become director of the old-age assistance administration.

If Chmn. Norris of the board of water engineers resigns to become general manager of the Brazos river development—at a proffered salary three times as large—then the governor must name a new chairman of the water board.

Other appointments effective at this period have been made: Claude D. Teer was reappointed to the state board of control, and the new boards for pension and liquor control administration have been named.

The pension and liquor control laws gave Texas two major administrative executives: Mrs. Carpenter director of the pension system, and C. R. Miller, director of the liquor control system.

Former Senator A. E. Wood of Austin was governor of Texas for five seconds once upon a time, but didn't know about it until he read it in the newspapers. Dan Moody was governor, Barry Miller lieutenant governor and Wood president pro tem of the senate. Moody and Miller, were on the international bridge at Laredo, Miller, bantering Moody, pushed the governor across the middle marker. Moody held on to his arm and pulled Berry across the line too. For the interval until they stepped back, all the power and authority of the governor's office was in Sen. Wood's hands.

Sen. Wilbourne B. Collier of Eastland will become Texas sixth governor in a little less than 12 months, when Gov. Alford and Lieut. Gov. Wood will be out of the state Dec. 31 and Jan. 1. Senators Ken Regan and John Reddick, both have served this year in the absence of both the governor and lieutenant governor. Mrs. Ferguson was governor until mid-January.

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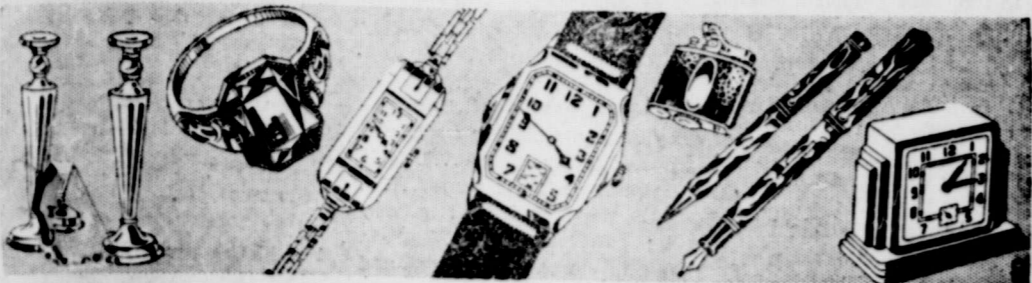

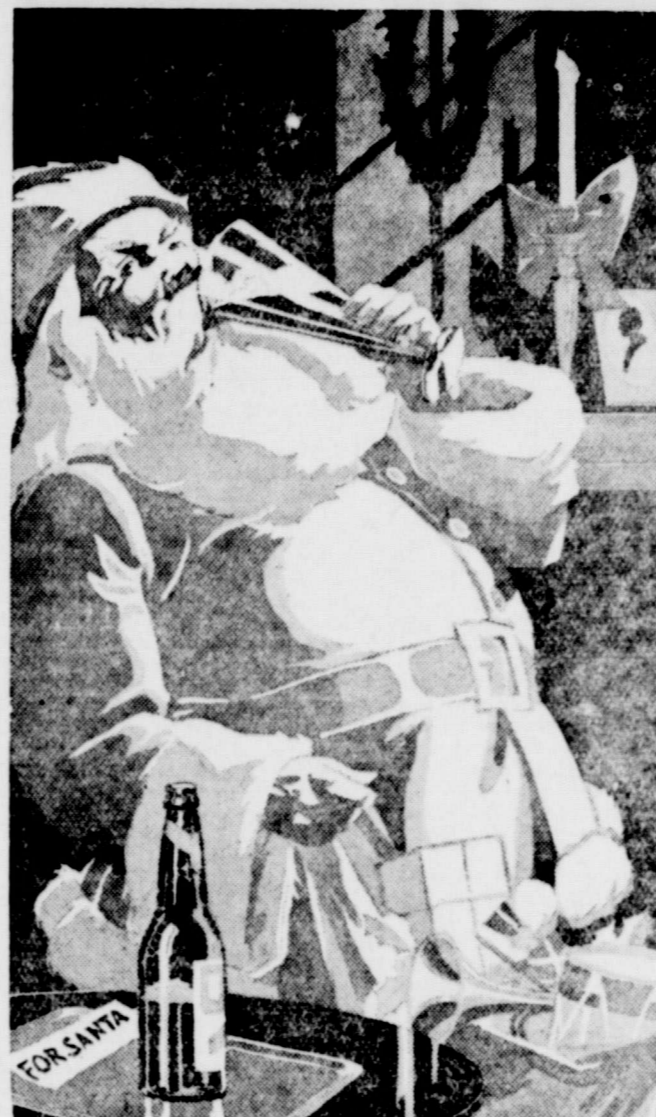
Chinese Women Ask To Become Soldiers

CANTON, Dec. 21 — Chinese women in Kwangsi province, shattering the age-old tradition of exclusion from the workaday world, have scored a victory in their campaign against the rules which have kept them out of military service. Modern, emancipated women of the province, participating in almost every other masculine occupation, have chafed at the restrictions which barred them from the military life. A governmental order providing that only men are eligible to enter military training schools drew strong opposition from various women's groups in Kwangsi, who in a joint petition addressed to the Kuomintang (political party) headquarters demanded the rescinding of the rule. Pointing out that it is "no less a duty of women than of men to take up arms to protect their country in time of foreign aggression," the women indicated the new emphasis on physical culture in China by declaring that women are "physically more urgently in need of military training than are men." An order from the Kwangsi military headquarters, opening the military schools to women, is expected shortly.

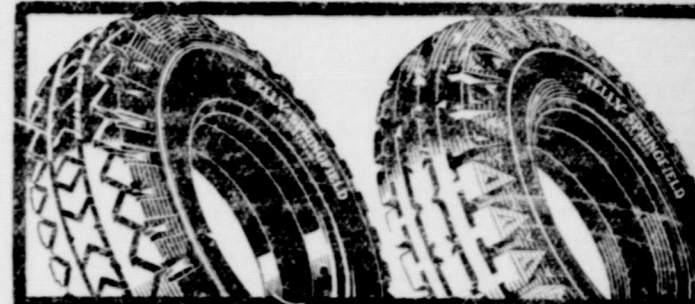

Malachi Foretells a New Day

Text: Malachi 3:1-12
The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Dec. 22.

MALACHI, last of the Old Testament prophets, sounds a message alike of warning and of hope.

It is difficult for us to put ourselves back into the times when Malachi lived, and it is, therefore, difficult to interpret his message in the light of his age and environment. No one, however, could read this lesson without realizing that it has a significance far beyond the situation of any one time or of any one nation.

It is the picture of the coming of one who will save the nation. But salvation cannot come without purification of the national life and without the sweeping away of all that is false and untrue.

This social savior is as a refiner and purifier of silver and gold. Men are to be put in the crucible, and the refining fire is first of all to purify the priests, or the sons of Levi.

The age of salvation is an age of judgment, of "swift withal" against the doers of evil, not only those whose lives are vicious and false, but those who oppress the workers and who rob the widowed and the fatherless.

MALACHI brings against the nation the charge of perverting the truth, of turning aside the ordinances of God, and of robbing God through their failure to make to Him an honest return of tithes and offerings. He calls upon the people to turn from this robbery and pretense to sincerity, to

bring the "whole tithe into the storehouse."

The language he uses is as intense as it is full of appeal and hope. The devourer and the destroyer are to be rebuked and overthrown, but the nation that yields itself in full offering to God and in full reliance upon Him will find the windows of heaven open and a blessing poured out so great that there shall not be room enough to receive it.

It is sad to realize that, between the time of Malachi and the coming of Jesus, nearly 400 years later, a period of darkness and suffering settled down upon Israel. But it is worth while to remember that out of this period there emerges the story of heroic souls and of their sublime sacrifice in the struggle against oppression.

LIKE other prophecies of the great prophets of Israel there is a timeliness about the moral judgments of Malachi. Here he sets forth with great clearness the way of salvation and blessedness in the life of the nation, as well as the way that inevitably makes for weakness and destruction.

Malachi has a profound and practical message for America and Americans today. Let us seek to read the lesson not merely as a document that comes out of the past, but as a plain message of a clear-seeing social and religious leader who, being dead, yet speaks.

The robbery of God means the robbery of man. Falseness and insincerity in religion are the counterpart of social hypocrisy and oppression.

Honesty in life and purpose is the foundation stone of all true building, both in church and in state.

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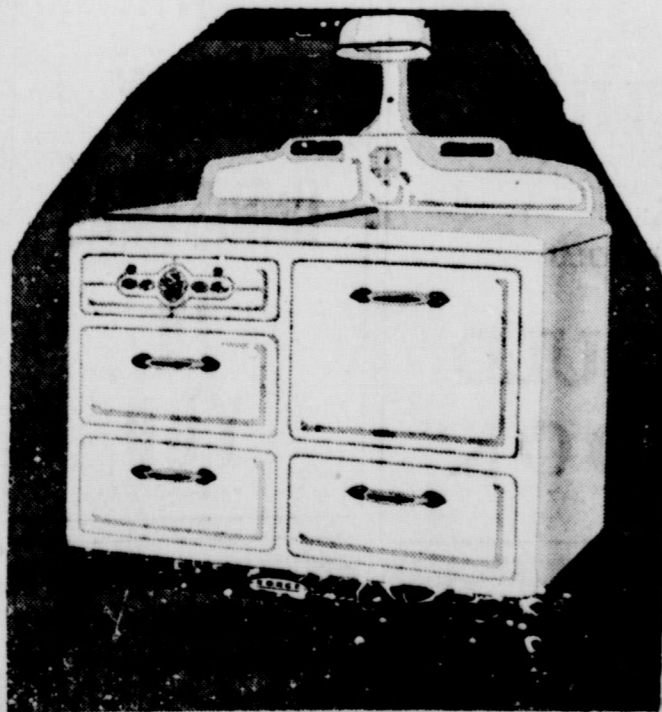
