



The Peanut Market

A peanut market giving a "fair price" to producers of this area likely will be created in the next few days. That is the view taken by the men who are most closely associated with the efforts being made to secure the market under government contract.

Producers of this area have sold very little of their crop this year. They have been forced to hold it until a better price than the 65 to 75 per cent price could be obtained, or lose perhaps an average of \$100 to the smaller peanut farmers.

The mills have made bids to handle between 5,000 and 10,000 tons and likely some contracts will be signed in the next few days. That means that peanut growers about Cisco will have a fair price for their peanuts in a booming January market. It means that they will receive long delayed crop money that can be quickly turned into the things which the farmers need.

Uncle Sam Ready for Pension Plan

Director Orville S. Carpenter of the Old Age Pension commission has returned from Washington. He has let it be known that the Social Security board would match old age pension funds dollar for dollar and this early in February. He predicted the federal board would approve the Texas law before it become effective Feb. 14. Now he is on his way to California to study the pension system of that state.

To date the lawmakers of Texas have failed to supply the revenue for the state pension fund. They will be called together in the near future and the promise on the part of the public is that Austin will be crowded with representatives of all industries, including agriculture and all organizations "that declare taxation in Texas shall be equal and uniform" and that "the neediest" shall be cared for first, provided they qualify to the restrictions of the law and the constitutional mandate for pensions over 65 years of age. There will be many lobbyists here and many of the crowd holding important positions in the federal service and other agencies of minor government. There promises to be merry war in the senate and the house by those who are preparing to tap ne of revenue and many others who will do their level best to tax the other fellow and let those paying the freight for a great portion of it "squawk like a goose losing its feathers."





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Trade Pacts with Netherlands

Uncle Sam continues to make overtures with friendly nations and to sign joint pacts of reciprocal trade agreements. Now the Netherlands and the United States are in agreement.

Their representatives signed a reciprocal trade agreement aimed at restoration of trade between the two countries which fell from \$431,000,000 in 1929 to \$155,500,000 in 1934. If a nation or the people of a nation refuse to buy from other nations, it is a cinch they will do but very little selling of their wares and products to foreigners.

Why should the American people buy from those who refuse to return the favor? An A. P. dispatch from San Francisco is a trade sermon in stores: "A permanent injunction to prevent flooding of the American market with Japanese made incandescent lamps was upheld Friday by the federal circuit court of appeals.

Japanese are large buyers of American cotton. The Japanese are large buyers of all American junk iron and steel scraps. Very wise and very thrifty are these Yankees of the Orient. In their mills and shops they turn the iron and steel junk into useful articles of commerce. Then they ship their products not only to Asia, but to South and Central America, North America and Europe and reap a rich harvest for their home producers and wage workers.


