

The Christmas Baskets The distributing of Christmas baskets this year was perhaps the best and most systematic that it has ever been

in Cisco. Although there were several organizations, including churches and fraternal bodies, at work on the basket idea, each working independently, the distribution was placed on a systematic basis that insured all the known needy families Liquor Violations

Texas Meningitis Scare

The spinal meningitis fright in Oklahoma apparently has spread to Texas, with eight deaths reported in the central part of the state during the last two weeks. Twelve cases, including four which were fatal, were reported by the county health officer of Milam county,

The meningitis epidemic, if it should gain a strong foothold in the part of the state where it was reported, might become a real menace, due to the fact that living conditions in much of that section and especially in the colored population, are far from desirable.

The Oklahoma epidemic appears to be somewhat checked, following the mass quarantine clamped down in Kiowa county. The success of the quarantine might lead such a measure to be taken in Texas if it became necessary in order to stop the spread of the disease.

Meanwhile, the Christmas holidays in the public schools likely will aid in preventing the spread of meningitis. If necessary, the schools of the central part of the state, where the disease has been reported, can extend the holidays until the medical authorities think it safe to resume classes.

Mussolini on the Spot

Premier Benito Mussolini is on the well known spot in Italy. He is an absolute dictator. But dictators hold their jobs by being able to show that they can do so by force or by producing some definite, constructive results. Just now it looks very much as though Signor Mussolini might not be doing either very well.

With the Ethiopians starting their long delayed counter offensive on the African battle lines and the prospects of a new rainy season staring him in the face and nothing appreciable accomplished in his colonial adventure, the rumors are getting around that Il Duce is going to have to make peace soon or he will be out looking for a job.

With plenty of home cooperation and little outside interference almost any nation can carry on a war of one sort or another. But when the home folks become dissatisfied and the outsiders positively "get in the hair" of a dictator, he has a tough time concentrating on the war prob-

The League of Nations has placed sanctions or penalties upon Italy as the aggressor nation in the Ethiopian war. That makes it hard for Il Duce to buy anything, especially armaments, from any outside nation. At the same time, he is having just as hard a time selling his own Italian products. The net result is that he has to draw upon the country's gold supply, while unable to dispose of home products, and pay high prices for almost unobtainable materials.

Now there is a limited supply of gold in the world, and the United States has a great quantity of it in proportion to the other nations. Italy is in bad shape financially. Ordinarily when a nation needs money it borrows it, either from the people at home or from other nations. But in this case the sanctions prevent Mussolini from borrowing money abroad. So he has to borrow-or confiscate-when he can from the Italian people themselves. They are like any other people. They are patriotic, but they are not particularly wealthy. They will give until it hurts, but it is already huring badly

That is the reason that Mussolini is having to think of something new to do to please the people. England is the nation which has been foremost in the enforcement of sanctions against Italy. Mussolini could listen to England and the League and make peace-possibly on a ground of compromise now, or he could turn upon England as his chief enemy and start a sudden suprise war. That is what England has been fearing and has taken steps to prevent.

But whatever Mussolini decides to do, he is certainly

on the spot at present.




