### SIX MEN FROM COUNTY FACE U. S. CHARGES

Cases of six Eastland county residents, originally charged in the Abilene division, and indicted by the grand jury at Fort Worth, have been transferred back to Abilene and docketed for the April term of federal district court.

The cases against the Eastland county residents were among 12 transferred from Fort Worth to Abilene.

Cases against the Eastland county residents as charged by the federal grand jury follows: George L. Ingram, Nov. 4, possession and custody of distilling apparatus, registered, carrying on the business of a distiller without first giving bond, which is in violation of section 1184, title 26 of the United States code, and production of quantity of liquor with taxes due on 640 gallons.

Quenville Ingram, Calvin Ingram and Ed Ingram, Dec. 12, possession and custody of still not registered, production of a still without giving bond, possession of liquor with intent to defraud the government of the taxes, making and fermenting of mash and possession of 500 gallons of same, and possession of distilled spirits and non-tax paid.

Fred Tarver, Nov. 14, possession of an unregistered still, making and fermenting of mash and possession of 1,000 gallons of mash in violation of section 1185, title 26 of United States code; Claude Ingram, Nov. 14, possession and custody of still, unregistered, feloniously engaging in and carrying on the business of a distiller without first giving bond, possession of 180 gallons of whiskey, subject to tax, with the intent to defraud the government, and making mash.

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### GUS WENDE 1 PIPE SET FOR OIL PRODUCER

Drilling in of the Gus Wendé Number One well six miles south of the city is scheduled for early this week. Oil was standing 1,299 feet in the hole as A. A. Wisdom and E. E. Parson Saturday began setting 6 3/8 inch pipe.

The Wendé well is said to have all indications of a producer. It is near the Schuur well which has for many years provided gas for Humbletown here.

The Wendé well already has been drilled to a depth of 3,226 feet. Last week the States Oil corporation's Number One S. H. Huckaby near Gorman was completed for a producer estimated conservatively at 30 barrels a day.

Ray T. Hoff was scheduled to spend in today's Number One Mrs. S. A. Higgins, block 43, leagues 3 and 4. McLennan county school lands, near Staff. The operator hopes to reach the sand from which the Number One sand obtained pay at the 1,451 depth.

Arab Gasoline corporation is scheduled to spud early this week their Number One G. W. Thorpe near Leary on approximately the Stephens-Eastland county line.

Location of the new test is in the southwest section of the S. P. R. R. company survey. Operators intend to drill 3,000 unless gas or oil is found in paying quantities at a lesser depth.

### Dentist Benefactor Dreaded Drill Too

A touch of nature, they say, makes the whole world kin. Boiled down, this presumably means that you feel a lot more chummy and intimate with some famous man if you can just discover that he suffers from bunions, can't get along with his son-in-law, and likes to put cream and sugar on his apple pie. It's those homely, intimate little touches that do the trick.

Anyhow, long-suffering humanity might pause in its task of laying a wreath at the feet of Columbia University's Dr. Leroy L. Hartman and celebrate the discovery that he is just one of the boys, after all.

Dr. Hartman is the dental specialist who made a chemical discovery that makes the dentist's drill painless. It is a sort of goo which, when mopped on the tooth, enables the patient to lean back in the chair and think about something else while the dentist goes ahead and carves out one of those hideously sensitive cavities.

Now the point to all this is that Dr. Hartman did a magnificent thing in giving this invention to the world; he refused to take out a patent on it except any money on it, with the result that the ordinary patient will be able to enjoy the boon at little if any, added cost.

And in taking this attitude, Dr. Hartman refused to make any solemn remarks about the duty of the scientist. Instead, he simply said:

"I myself have suffered in the dental chair."

There, of course, is this touch of nature about which we were speaking.

Taking the pain out of a toothache probably isn't a discovery that would rank with, say a cure for infantile paralysis, in importance. But a man's teeth can give him some miserable moments on his trip across this vale of tears, and the sum total of discomfort which Dr. Hartman is abolishing from the record of human experience is something pretty massive.

And the point is that Dr. Hartman knows about all this from bitter experience. Like the rest of us he has lowered himself gingerly into one of those padded-skeleton chairs, winced as the attending dentist (unscrupulous falsifier) remarked gaily, "Now this isn't going to hurt," and then numbly endured the one sure-fire torture which the inventive American Indians never managed to think of.

No man ever forgets his hours in the dentist's chair. Dr. Hartman didn't; and, unlike the rest of us, he resolved to do something about it. The result is an achievement for which all the ages will call him blessed.

Best of all, he didn't present his gift to humanity with a solemn face. He had been there himself, and he said so. And that makes us like him just twice as much.

### FDR Orders Bonus Machine Speeded

President Roosevelt lost the bonus fight. He had two-thirds of the senate and the house against him. They smashed his veto message. He is a game sportsman. He accepted the verdict without the batting of an eye and sent orders down the line to pay off the \$2,491,000 soldiers' bonus as quickly "as accuracy will permit." The vote in the senate was 76 to 19. The house previously had voted 324 to 61 to over-ride the veto. It is said a total of 38 million separate bonds will be needed. Legionnaires and members of other veteran organizations will be beneficiaries of the huge appropriation to be distributed between this time and the coming month of July. It is all over now except the payment. A republican president, immediate predecessors of President Roosevelt, vetoed the bonus. Roosevelt vetoed it twice. It has been estimated by accountants that \$3,000,000 in baby bonds will fall into the pockets of Texas legionnaires in which will be new money so to speak in Centennial year of Texas independence. These bonds may be cashed at post office but not at banks. On with the Passing Show and ever the slogan, "Texas first."

### Roosevelt Will Track the Courts

A close adviser of President Roosevelt "advised his friends in Washington that the administration will avoid proposals for amending the constitution" during the coming campaign. "The administration," he added, "will seek to accomplish new deal purposes within the language of the majority opinions of the supreme court of the United States." Well, let the future speak for itself. The American congress enacts laws; the president has the right to veto or the right to attach his signature to the enactments. This is a swift moving world and the struggle in America years even if it is necessary to amend the constitution. AUSTIN, Feb. 3—(UP)—Mrs. Clara Driscoll Sevier of Austin and Corpus Christi, has been national democratic committeewoman from Texas for 12 years. During part of that time she was in Santiago, Chile with her husband, Hal H. Sevier who served as ambassador to Chile. She has rendered distinguished service to the democratic party, and given high eminence to the office of national committeewoman, originally created merely to keep women democrats from complaining at discrimination against the sex.

In May, a Texas state democratic convention will nominate a committeewoman for the next four years. There may be a number of individual aspirants for this chief recognition of the party, as such, can live the woman voters. It will be an interesting slant of the state convention, whether Mrs. Sevier is given her fourth term, or some other woman of distinction is given a chance at the honor of the office.

Two points stood out in a report by State Auditor Orville S. Carpenter on an audit of the state banking department: Carpenter has recommended that more adequate and detailed public reports of the financial condition of all state institutions supervised by the banking department be made than the periodical reports published pursuant to the calls for condition reports. "These statements," he said, "should be in such detail as to afford the reader thereof an accurate and complete picture of the financial condition of that institution."

Really, the periodical statements are considerably in detail at least sufficiently to show that most banks keep from 60 to 80 per cent of their assets in cash, instead of lending the money out on good credits to serve one of the purposes for which money was devised.

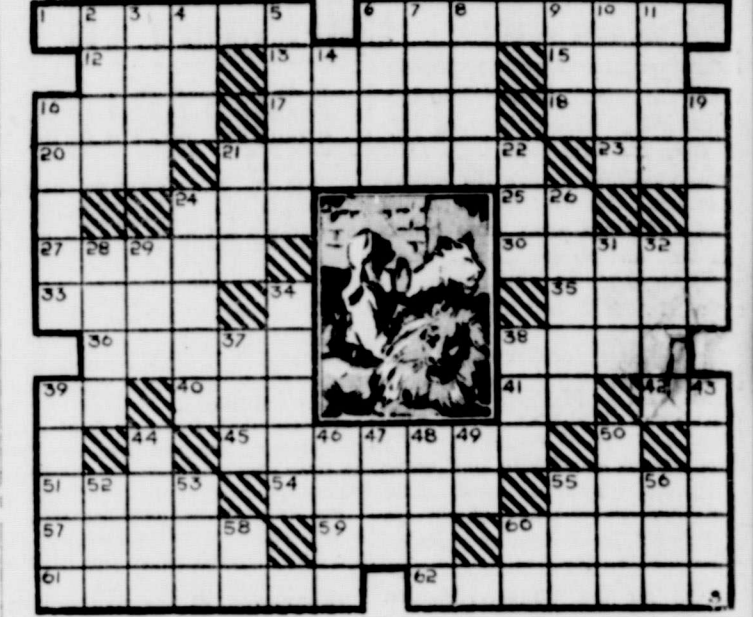

U. S. China Chose 'Between 2 Evils' HOUSTON, Feb. 3—The United States has only two courses to follow in the Orient... "a choice of two evils," according to Nathaniel Pfeffer, lecturer who has spent a large part of his life in the far East. The United States either must declare war and drive Japan out of China or must get out itself and loose a lucrative trade, Pfeffer said. "There is no middle ground," he said. "I have sought some other solution that would satisfy her, but I can't find one. "If you decide to drive out the Japanese," he said, "then don't get sentimental about it. Get down to business and build a navy. If you decide you do not want war, then get out of China. "For my part, I favor getting out although it is a rotten choice," Pfeffer said. Pfeffer pointed to failure of the London naval conference, resulting in a ship building race between Japan, the United States and England—finally culminating a war.

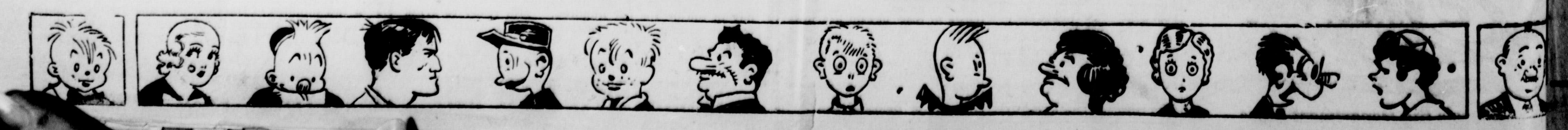
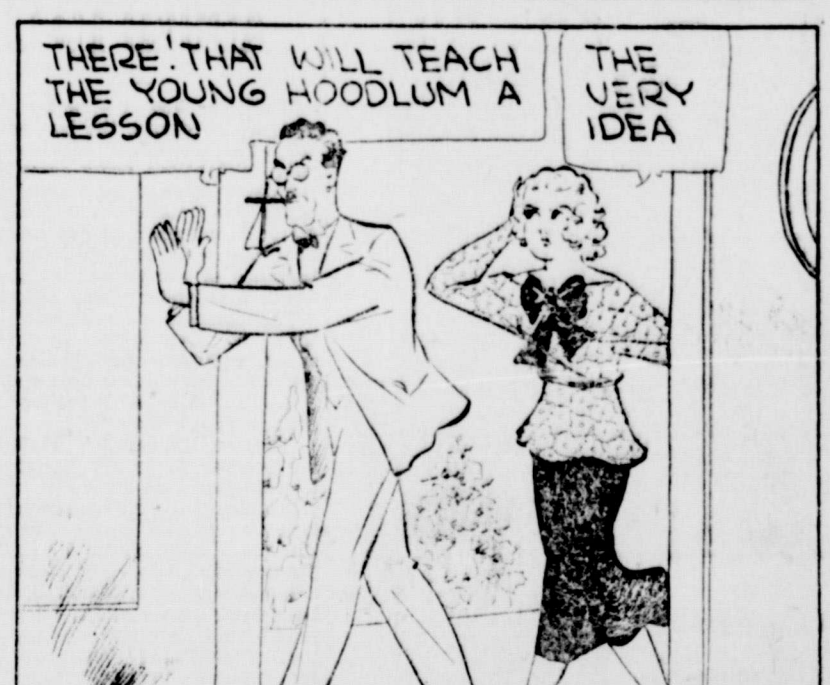
