The Labor Disputes

When there are strikes and labor troubles, look forward to a brighter future for labor.

That is an old saying which generally has held true. Strikes and labor disputes have generally been the forerunners of better times.

That apparently means that something is developing which may mean a further measure of recovery both in this nation and in other countries.

Strikes over much of the world have halted business operations in the last few days. Most important of all perhaps is that of the meat employes in the London area, whose walkout left more than eight million persons as temporary vegetarians. In New York an even larger number of vorkers-20,000 elevator operators-awaited a walkout order, while 20,000 milinery employes had already received "their call to close shop. In Chile and Curação there were other violent upheavals, and it was feared that there might be trouble in Illinois.

Then labor realizes that capital is facing a serious a situation as it is, it generally removes its coat and goes to work uncomplainingly. But when it believes that capital is getting a little breathing spell, it wants one too. It may be that the present labor troubles over the world mean that labor is going to find a little smoother sailing as soon as these differences are adjusted.

Desperate Italy

Italy is desperate. The fate of the nation hangs in the balance now, with the chief weight lying in the campaign

Italy has been bluffing on the diplomatic front, while cold steel and high explosives have meant business on the actual war front. But while Mussolini has been warning the world what he intends to do and what any action to stop im will mean, he has been trying to fortify his position and

Balked at every turn by Great Britain, notably in regard France and Greece, he now faces the problem of fighting it out alone. The League of Nations has been doing a lot of bluffing too, and likewise has been trying to strengthen position. While the powers have hemmed and hawed and appointed this and that commission they have been "exchanging cards under the table" as well. Now a commission of experts is at work studying the possibilities of enforcing an embargo on oil.

Italy knows very well what that will mean. It will mean that Italy will have to end the war in Ethiopia and laugh it off the best way possible, or else-

That other possibility is the most desperate measure of all. It is that Italy can suddenly attack another nation, one which is a leader in the oil embargo movement-which is obviously Britain. If Italy could win a great victory in such a sudden move, the future of the Ethiopian venture might be assured. If not, then Italy would have to sink back to a very minor position indeed.

Italy realizes all these possibilities. That is why the most important meetings of the Fascist forces since the beginning of the African campaign were held yesterday. Upon those meetings may rest the immediate future of
