Freedom of the Press

Very near and very dear to the hearts of Americans and all Anglo-Saxons—are freedom of speech and freedom of the press. The people of Great Britain and the United States have long looked upon it as their inalienable right to think for themselves and to express their thoughts. Very seldom have they been challenged in this view and when they have been they have protested so strongly that they immediately set forth again not only the doctrine of free speech and free press but that of the sovreighty of the people as well.

One of the latest challenges to freedom of the press was invoked by the Louisiana state legislature upon the request of the late Senator Huey Long, in which a gross receipts tax upon newspapers was levied.

In invalidating the tax law, which the newspapers of the nation had looked upon as a "gag law", the supreme court yesterday held that the statute was "not an ordinary form of tax but one single in kind, with a long history of hostile misuse against the freedom of the press.

Ine supreme court went further than that in pointing out that the newspapers, magazines, and other forms of periodicals of the country, "have shed and continue to shed more light on the public and business affairs of the nation than any other instrumentality of publicity, and since informed public opinion is the most potent of all restraints upon misgovernment, the publicity afforded by a free press cannot be regarded otherwise than with grave concern.'

The newspapers of the nation have jealously guarded their freedom and will continue to do so. There have been times when this freedom has been abused, yes, but for the most part it has tended to act as a check upon misgovernment through informing the people and allowing them to

taink for themselves. There is not a nation in Europe with a dictator at the head of its government that has a free press. There is not a nation anywhere with a free press that has a dictator.

As long as the people of the United States have as their right freedom of speech and freedom of the press, they will continue to rule as a sovreign people. To destroy that right is to destroy the freedom of the people.

Los Angeles was named for the angels. There are times when its people are not angelic by any manner of means. Police Chief James E. Davis has organized a patrol to block every highway and railway entrance. It has been given orders to take into custody all persons who "have no definite purpose for entering the state." Chief Davis declared it an effort to keep "our unemployment and crime to a minimum. Hordes of indigents have flooded the state and in Los Angeles a majority of them settled. They not only increased the already perplexing problem of caring for the unemployed but were responsible for crime outbursts in the city and county. 



STATE DUE TO **GIVE LICENSE** FOR DRIVERS

By GORDON K. SHEARER United Press Staff Correspondent

AUSTIN, Feb. 11 -(U.P.) - Texas is cing to give away scmething valuable and is worrying how to get people to accept the gift. Beginning Febt. 14, any person old enough to drive an automobile and physically able to do so can get a three-year licerse to drive absolutely free.

There are no strings to the gift. The state is an "Indian giver" only to the extent that it takes back the license if it is abused. It is revoked. then only after a driver has had three court convictions.

John Smith, living anywhere in Texas, can get the license if he has enough arms and legs to operate an automobile and isn't so obviously blind or deaf that anyone can tell off-hand that he is a road menace The license law of the last

sion of the legislature will become effective on Feb. 14. At any time between that date and April 1, Smith can go to his county tax collector and ask for a application blank. He also can get applications blanks for other members of his family or for acquaintances. The application must specify the driver's name, sex, age residence and description, including physical height, weight ,color of hair and eves. He also must reveal whether he has held a driving license in ome other state. If he has, he must tell if the license was revoked, and if revoked, why.
