### ELMO V. COOK

#### NEW AGENT OF THIS COUNTY

Eastland county has two new farm experts in the saddle today. Elmo V. Cook, successor to C. Metz Heald, involved in a quiet shift by the extension service, joined with his wife and two children from Ballinger, where he was county agent for Rannels county. Cook and family took residence at 413 South Dixie street in Eastland. H. F. Barnhardt, whose former address was unknown, will arrive by Monday to become Cook's assistant. Barnhardt's employment is the result of an arrangement with chamber of commerce at Ranger, Eastland and Cisco for a helper to the Eastland county farm expert. Barnhardt will, it is understood, devote full-time to extension service in the fields. Portion of Barnhardt's salary will be paid by the chamber, the county and the extension service. Cook has been in the extension service seven years. Heald completed 11 years in the extension service while in Eastland.

### 'Go' Signal Given On Farm Program As Act Is Signed

WASHINGTON, March 2 — (U.P.) — The White House flashed "go" to the department of agriculture today on the New Deal's broad new \$500,000,000 soil conservation farm relief program successor to the AAA. Eight weeks to the day from the supreme court's invalidation of the AAA, President Roosevelt's signature enacted the soil conservation and domestic allotment act to carry on the essential features of crop control.

## Texas Observes Independence Declaration

### 3 GOVERNORS TAKE PART IN CELEBRATION

BRENHAM, Mar. 2 — (U.P.) — Texas celebrated 100 years of freedom today... With three state governors leading ceremonies observations were scheduled at Brenham, Old Washington-on-the-Brazos, Houston, San Antonio, Huntsville, Gonzales, and other communities where Texas history was made a century ago. Washington - on - the-Brazos, 13 miles north of here was the focal point of the celebration. It was at that town, one time important Texas city but now a village of 300, that 32 Texans solemnly filed past a table and affixed their signatures to the Texas Declaration of Independence.

### Payroll Gain Seen During February

AUSTIN, Mar. 2 — (U.P.) — Employment and pay rolls in Texas during February made fair gains over those of the like month last year, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Reports from 1,368 Texas establishments covering the week ended February 15 show a total of 64,152 employees, an increase over the corresponding week last year of 3.2 per cent. Pay rolls for the week aggregated \$1,471,000, an increase over a year ago of 8.5 per cent. Cities showing year to year gains above the State average in the number of workers were: Abilene, Brownsville, Denison, El Paso, Galveston, Laredo, Port Arthur, San Angelo, San Antonio and Wichita Falls. Industries in which operations were above the average for the state were: Brick, tile and terra cotta; cement plants; foundries and car shops; laundries and dry cleaning; men's clothing manufacturing; mill work; petroleum refining; quarrying; saw mills; steam railroad car shops; and wholesale stores.

Directors of the Chamber of Commerce will hold their regular semi-monthly meeting at the Chamber of Commerce rooms Tuesday evening. It was announced to the Cisco Daily News Saturday that Miss Dorothy Hampton has been authorized to issue drivers licenses. She will receive applications and will issue license free of charge.

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### Powers of States Clarified by Court

WASHINGTON, March 2 — (U.P.) — The supreme court handed down a series of decisions today clarifying important state powers, including the right of states to exclude prison-made goods from their territory.

### Texas Independence

AN EDITORIAL  
This is the day of days to Texans. One hundred years ago today a group of Texas patriots met at Washington-on-the-Brazos and pledged themselves to a document which decreed their political separation from Mexico. Declaration of Texas Independence was made after the reciting of a long list of grievances—including the lack of educational facilities for Texas children—"which were borne patiently by the people of Texas until they reached that point at which forbearance ceased to be a virtue." The declaration pointed out that the Texans had defended the constitution and appealed "to our Mexican brethren for assistance" in vain. After many months had elapsed without a sympathetic response from the interior, the Texans at the Washington convention declared, "We are, therefore, forced to the melancholy conclusion that the Mexican people have acquiesced in the destruction of their liberty and the substitution of a military government... The necessity of self-preservation, therefore now decrees our eternal political separation."

A century has passed since the duly elected delegates met at old Washington and drew up that declaration which led to the historic battles of the Alamo, Goliad, and San Jacinto, which led to liberty, a Texas republic, and finally to the greatest state in the United States. That century has been filled with progress, along with the trials and hardships of a people struggling to reach their potential greatness.

The patriots who drew up the Texas Declaration of Independence had a vision of a greater Texas. They faced the future bravely, knowing that they might well die for their belief in their ideal. Today it is for us to catch a special of that ideal, that vision of a greater Texas, of an empire within the greatest nation on earth. It is for us to reconsecrate build the Texas of the future.

### Another Reprieve Is Indicated For Bruno Before Death Date of March 30

TRENTON, N. J., March 2 — (U.P.) — Bruno Hauptmann on the basis of "present indications" will receive another reprieve before he is scheduled to go to the electric chair for the murder of the Lindbergh baby the week of March 30, a high state official said today.

### OLD VALUE ON PANAMA DEBTS WILL BE PAID

WASHINGTON, March 2 — (U.P.) — The United States today acceded to Panama's protest over devaluation of the American dollar by signing a new treaty which will continue annuity payment to the Central American republic at approximately the same level as prior to the devaluation movement. A new general treaty with Panama carried clauses settling the dispute which arose after Roosevelt ordered devaluation of the dollar. The treaty provided the annuity beginning with the 1934 payment shall be on a basis of 340,000 balboas (Panama currency) instead of \$250,000 American gold dollars. The balboa has a nominal value of \$1.

### Officials Discuss WPA Camp Project

FORT WORTH, March 2 — (U.P.) — Maj. George Newgard, U. S. army professor of military tactics in Dallas school, conferred today with George Dickey, district WPA director, on the proposed WPA project at Camp Dallas near Minerla Wells.

Spring training for the 1936 grid season will begin this afternoon after school, it was announced today by Coach Dexter Shelley. There will be several members of last year's squad back for practice but there will be only two letter men. These are Joe Slicker, quarterback and Royce Rainbolt, guard.

### Man Waits Trial In Nightmare Stabbing

FORT WORTH, March 2 — (U.P.) — George Price, 30, was bound over in an examining trial today to await action of the grand jury on a murder charge in the "nightmare stabbing" of Earl Stevens, Feb. 23. Bond of \$5,000 was continued.

### PUPILS HIKE 10 MILES

MARION, Mich. — (U.P.) — Marion high school students are not "softies." Among the student body are six who walk from 10 to 15 miles a day to continue their education. Prize marathons are Donald Cook, an eleventh grader, who hikes 15 miles.

### AFRICAN WAR TO END SOON IS PREDICTED

ROME, March 2 — (U.P.) — Italy expects Emperor Haile Selassie to abdicate shortly in favor of the young crown prince, who will make peace with Italy, unofficial but usually reliable sources said today.

GENEVA, March 2 — (U.P.) — The League of Nations steering committee of 18 on sanctions convoked the peace committee of 13 today to meet tomorrow for a new peace effort in the Ethiopian war before an oil embargo or other new penalties are applied to Italy.

Captain Anthony Eden, British foreign secretary, informed the committee of 18 that if an oil embargo is voted Britain is ready to apply it regardless of the attitude of the United States. Eden also indicated to the committee Britain favors a prohibition on transportation of oil to Italy as well as on exports of the vital commodities.

### ONLY EMPERORS ARMY FACING BADOGLIA

(Copyright 1936 by United Press) Italian General Headquarters, Northern Ethiopia, Marshal Pietro Badoglio, Italian commander-in-chief in East Africa, has smashed all but one of the Ethiopian armies that faced him—the force under the personal command of the emperor in the Dessye region some 160 miles south of the present military front line.

### Countess Babs Is Reported Improving

LONDON, March 2 — (U.P.) — Countess Barbara Hutton von Haugwitz - Reventlow, American heiress was reported out of danger in a bulletin issued by her physicians at 12:30 p. m. today. She began yesterday to show real improvement after a grave abdominal operation which caused fear for her life.

### Centennial Stamps On Sale Tomorrow

First of the Texas Centennial stamps were shown today by Postmaster Luther McCrea. The stamps will go on sale here tomorrow morning. The three-cent stamps, the size and shape of the special delivery issue, are printed in purple ink and have the pictures of Sam Houston and Stephen F. Austin in the upper corners. In the center is the Alamo, with a Lone Star above it. Ten thousand of the stamps have been sent to Cisco. The stamps went on sale at Gonzales today, with many collectors, some from Cisco, clamoring for them, McCrea said.

### Roosevelt Working Upon Tax Message

WASHINGTON, March 2 — (U.P.) — President Roosevelt cleared his schedule of afternoon engagements today to devote himself to preparation of his tax message expected to be submitted to congress tomorrow. An advance outline was given by Mr. Roosevelt last week when he revealed he would ask taxes to plug a \$1,139,000,000 gap left in the 1936-37 budget by the supreme court's AAA decision and passage of the immediate bonus payment bill. Mr. Roosevelt was expected to confine himself to outlining the need for taxes, leaving it up to congress to determine the type of levies to be imposed.

### Texas Program Is Given at Chapel

Mrs. Alfred Irby's library staff of Cisco high school gave a chapel program on Texas this morning at the assembly period. Several talks on Texas were made and six students representing the six flags which have flown over Texas displayed the flags and gave short talks on them. The auditorium was decorated by flags owned by James Haynie.

### C. A. Davis Ill Of Pneumonia at Home

C. A. Davis, seriously ill of pneumonia, today was reported to have rested well last night. His parents arrived from Sweetwater last night to be with him at his home.

### EMERGENCY IS DECLARED FOR ENTIRE CITY

NEW YORK, March 2 — (U.P.) — Mayor Fiorelo La Guardia today declared a "state of emergency" because of the elevator strike which disrupted service in much of Manhattan and ordered city employees to operate elevators in residential buildings more than six stories high. The mayor's decree held stoppage of elevators and other services on tall buildings was a menace to safety.

Scattered violence was reported as Strike Leader James Bambrick declared 70,000 men in 6,000 buildings would be out by nightfall, including many in the Wall Street district. The entire police force of 19,000 men and additional thousands of fire, sanitation, health, tenement, and building department employees were ordered by the mayor to be deputized to provide essential services in buildings in which owners were unable to replace strikers. Mayor La Guardia acted after the strike spread over most of Manhattan north of Fifty-ninth street. This is the main residential area of the metropolis most crowded borough. In many of these the residents, unaccustomed to walking, had to make their way up and down 20 or more flights of stairs.

### 17 ARE KILLED TRAIN LEAVES TRACK IN MUD

DOWNIE, B. C., March 2 — (U.P.) — Seventeen men were killed and 7 injured a few miles east of here today when the locomotive of a Canadian Pacific train rolled off the track on a group of laborers who were clearing away snow and a mud slide. The laborers, employees of the railway, were removing mud and debris carried onto the track by recent slides. Apparently they had stepped aside to let the train pass. Suddenly it wobbled on uneven tracks and crashed over on them.

### Suicide List Of Jap Revolt Grows As Another Dies

TOKYO, March 2 — (U.P.) — The list of "honorable suicides" growing out of last week's army revolt was increased today when the army announced Maj. Takesuke Amano had killed himself. Amano took his life because he was the superior officer to a leader of the revolt, who also committed suicide. It was believed several other suicides had taken place but the list was not announced. The surviving officers of the approximately 20 involved were in awaiting trial.

Maple Syrup Yield Due to Grade High

HARRISBURG, Pa., Mar. 2.—(U.P.)—An exceptionally good yield is expected this season from Pennsylvania's maple trees as time for "tree-sapping" nears. Extreme cold, deep snows and sudden thaws combine to make a first grade product, forest observers point out. During the brief season of gathering sap from the "sugar bushes" which usually begins late in February or early in March, the sap is boiled down into maple sugar and syrup. **Winings of Horses Go on Gold Standard**

PARIS, Mar. 2.—(U.P.)—Winings of race horses henceforth will be calculated on gold standard rates for comparative purposes.

Therefore, fluctuations of exchange rates and devaluation or deflation of currencies will have no effect on the registered winings of thoroughbreds on foreign courses.

At least this is the outcome of the international agreement race governing institutions such as the English Jockey Club and the National Hunt Committee in Great Britain, and the Societe d'Encouragement for flat racing and the Societe des Steeplechases for jumping events in France, as well as similar organizations throughout the world.

So that a uniform classification of the winings of race horses may be followed, the amounts they receive in one country, when calculated in other currencies, are converted at arbitrary rates, regardless of the actual value of the currency.

Thus by general agreement in France for winings abroad, the following rates are to be applied: sterling, 125 francs; dollar, 25 francs; reichmark, 6 francs; lira, 130 francs; Belgian franc, 0.80 franc; peseta, 4 francs, and Austrian shilling, 3.50 francs. These are approximately the values of the currencies before gold standards were abandoned.
