Utilities To Fight River Projects

INJUNCTIONS AGAINST PWA, WPA SOUGHT

WASHINGTON, March 6 — (U.P.) — Seven Texas power companies joined today in a suit to restrain the Public Works Administration from proceeding with hydro-electric projects on the Colorado and Brazos rivers in Texas.

The suit, filed in District of Columbia supreme court, sought a temporary restraining order and an order for PWA to show cause why a permanent injunction should not be issued.

The projects which power companies seek to halt are on the Lower Colorado Authority and in the Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation District.

Companies bringing the suit are Community Public Service company, Dallas Power and Light company, Gulf States Utilities company, Houston Lighting and Power company, Texas Electric Service company, Texas Power and Light company, and Texas Utilities company.

Defendants named in the suit were PWA Administrator Harold Ickes and his assistants, WPA Administrator Harry Hopkins and assistant, Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau Jr., W. A. Julian, treasurer of the United States, Secretary of War George Dern, and Maj. Gen. Edward Markham, chief of the army engineers.

The power companies contended plans for a unified series of dams on the two rivers, "are conceived designed and intended primarily for development of electric power."

Completion of the program, it was alleged, would cost the companies millions of dollars in loss of business, property, and franchises.

13 BILLED BY GRAND JURORS IN 88TH COURT

Thirteen indictments have been returned to date by the eighty-eighth district grand jury, District Attorney Grady Owen told the Daily News in a telephone conversation today.

The four indicted for murder in the H. L. McBee "hanging skeleton" case led the list, which included also three for chicken theft, two for forgery, two for burglary, and two for fence cutting.

Those indicted in the McBee case are Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Henry, and Jack and Lynn Smith.

Those currently arrested include Jimmy Curtis, Altus Fox, and H. E. Smith, indicted for chicken theft, and Boyd Stewart, indicted for fence cutting.

Possibility of further indictments was seen today, when it was pointed out that the jury has recessed and has not yet made its final report.

CCC PROJECT REJECTED; ASK BLANTON AID

Aid of Congressman Thomas L. Blanton was again asked today as it appeared that the CCC camp sought for building the proposed state park here is about to be sidetracked by the Emergency Conservation Works.

In a letter this morning Robert Fechner, director of the Emergency Conservation Works, said that the government "could not justify the expenditure of additional money to build and equip new camps."

The letter was addressed to Dr. Hubert Seale, vice president of the Cisco Boosters. It said: "I have your letter of February 27, in further reference to the proposed development of a state park at Cisco by a Civilian Conservation camp. I have carefully read your letter and I wish it were possible for me to assure you definitely that we would place a Civilian Conservation camp at Cisco to undertake this work."

Camps Already Built "Unfortunately we have a very large number of completely built and equipped camps that have been temporarily closed before the work project was finished. It is our intention to reoccupy these camps as rapidly as possible for the purpose of resuming and completing their work projects. Under these circumstances we could not justify the expenditure of additional money to build and equip new camps."

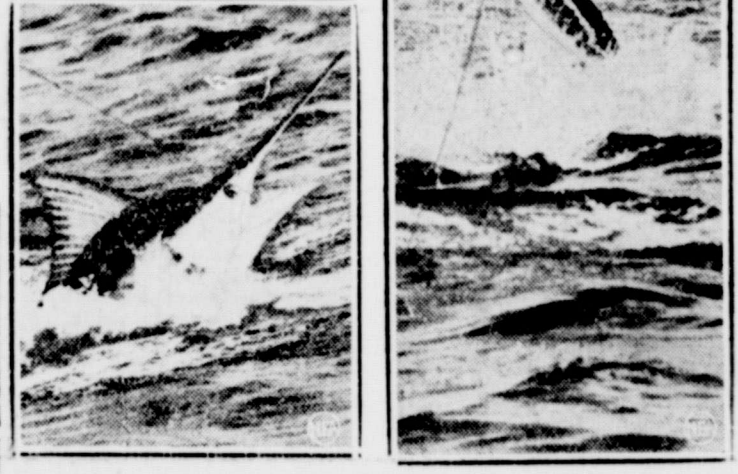
Dr. Seale said this morning that he was writing Congressman Blanton immediately to ascertain if anything could be done to secure the camp. In a recent letter to the editor of the Daily News, Congressman Blanton promised his cooperation to secure the camp. His letter at that time read:

"Replying to your letter just received, I herewith enclose a copy of letter which I have filed with Director Fechner. You may rest assured that I will do all I can to help in this matter."

"Gentlemen will use the doors and staircases at the western end of the university building, and the ladies those at the eastern end."

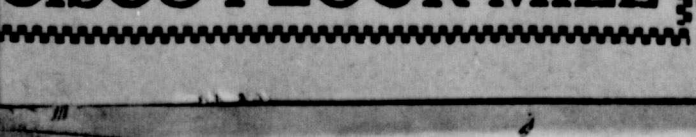
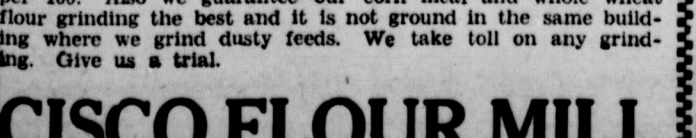
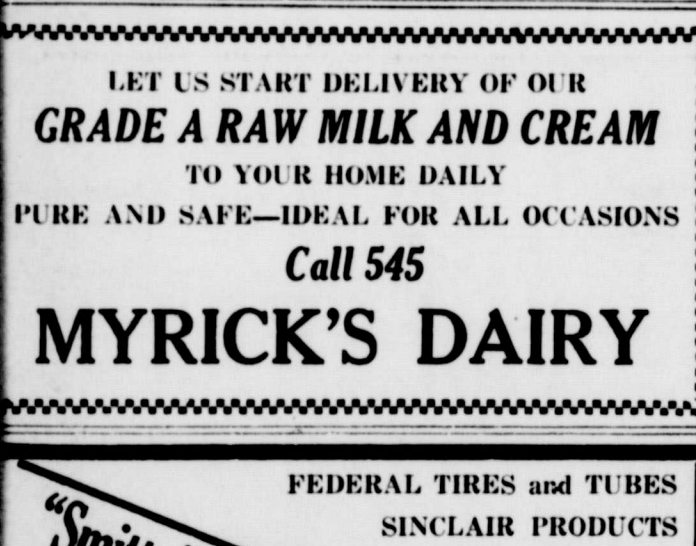
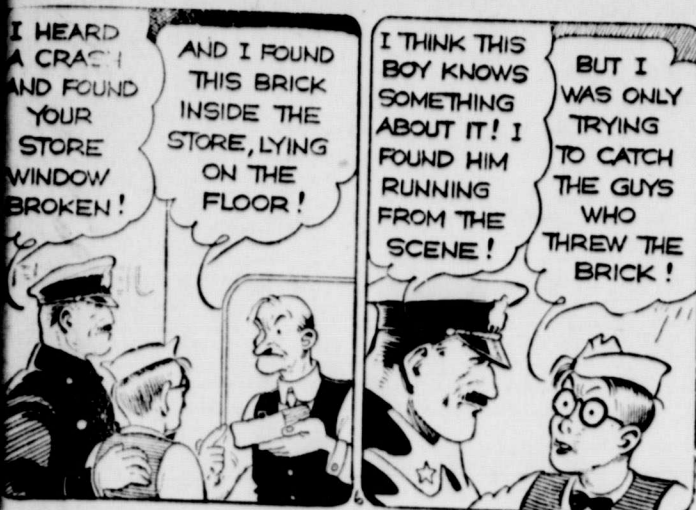
"Gentlemen and ladies must not visit each other's rooms."

"Ladies will not be permitted to receive calls without the permission of the preceptress. No callers will be received on Sunday."

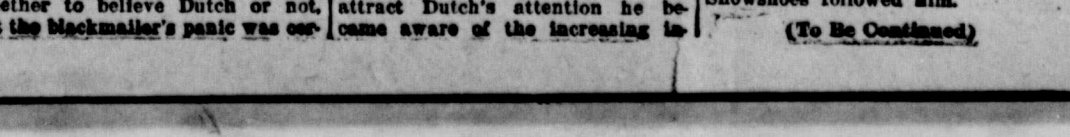
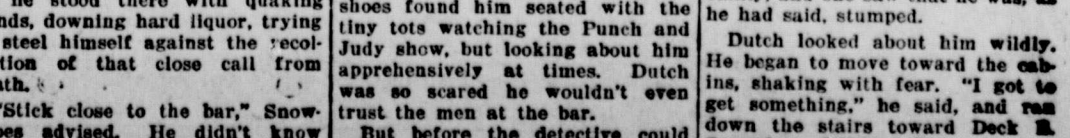
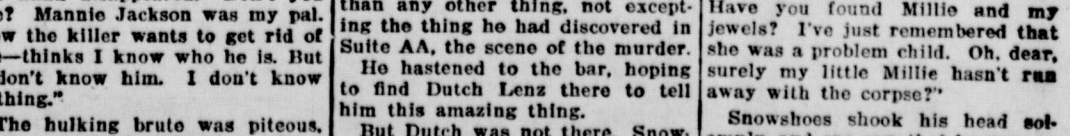
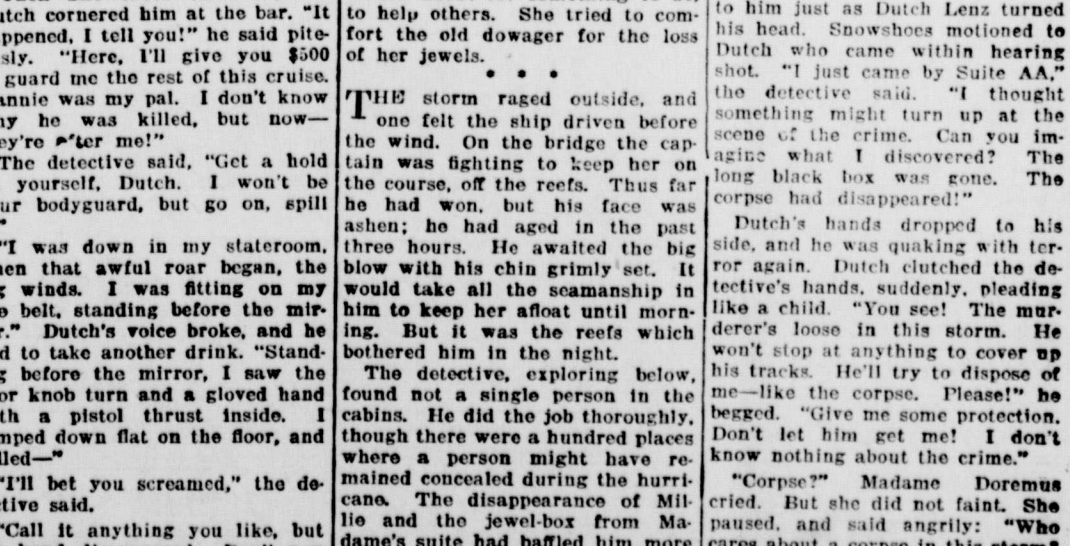
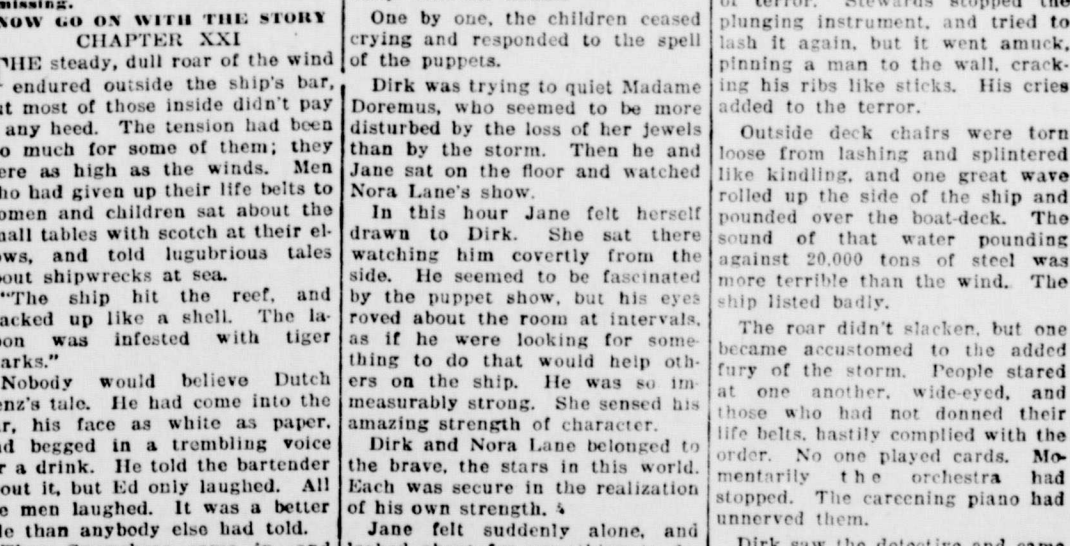
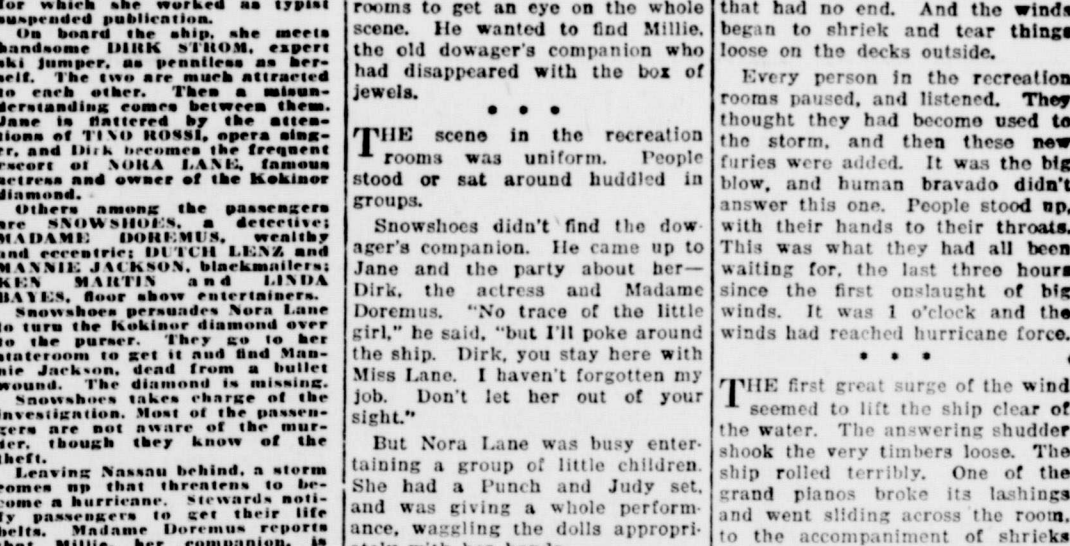

Europe Upset by Fears of Red Army As Soviet Weighs Secret Alliance

VIENNA, March 6.—(U.P.)—Whether Russia's red army will ever be rushed from the east to fight in any war in the West has become a political problem of the moment in Europe, overshadowing the Anglo-Ethiopian struggle.

Every nation in the Old World has its attention riveted on the secret diplomatic moves now being made. Some see these with hope, and many with fear, dreading the shadow of a Red regime which might loom behind marching Red battalions.

Germany and England in the west are the chief protagonists in the diplomatic battle for and against bringing the Soviet Union into a military pact, under which Moscow would pledge to send guns, tanks, men and air fleet to the rescue of the French against any violator of France's frontiers.

France's Less Blow to France
Since France lost a powerful ally, Poland, whose military machine largely was built under the direction of the French Supreme Command, the Quai d'Orsay has had to find a replacement strong enough to replace the Poles, who had won the credit of being the mightiest ally of France.

Poland's Loss to France
The French believe they have found the best substitute in the Soviet military machine and assiduously work to bring about Russia's cooperation in the event of war with the West.

With the realization that events in the far East, with Japan looking forward for new fields of expansion, dictated a friendly policy toward the Soviets, the British government has charged from its former opposition to the Franco-Soviet rapprochement, but Germany stands suspiciously watching every play in the game.

Halling the Nazi regime as the bulwark against Communism Adolf Hitler is said to look with the gravest apprehension at the developments on the horizon, with the

manila, has never encouraged military pacts with the Soviets, but if he rushes through the Rumanian-Russian military assistance agreement toward the West will be opened. It then will depend upon Moscow to keep its powder dry and its bayonets sharpened.

Others Show Concern
Not only Germany. However, nourishes this concern. Some of the nations nearer to Soviet frontiers are alarmed at the prospect of free passage being accorded the Red army through their territories to fight with France. Poland for one, will have nothing of such a plan.

Czecho-Slovakia, glad to have a new friend to protect new frontiers which contain so many people of German blood and sympathies, has grasped the hand of the Bolsheviks, but another vital link in the chain is Rumania, and it is skeptical. If Soviet troops ever move westward, they must cross Rumanian territory, if they cannot traverse Polish soil.

But Rumania has a large strip of former Russian territory, Bessarabia, over which Bucharest and Moscow have quarreled. Rumania does not want to see Soviet troops coming into that area at the invitation of Bucharest, because of the fear they might not leave again when the spoils of war are being divided.

Hungary Shows Alarm
This concern has become known to Austria and Hungary, with the latter already showing alarm at the thought of western powers sponsoring any pact which will give Soviet Russia the right and involve the obligation of soldiers rushing across Europe.

To calm the fears of the Danubian states, the latest project now in the diplomatic melting pot is to give the Soviet a new role. This would be as a guarantor of the Danubian Pact, whereby Soviet Russia would stand ready to act if the territorial independence of Austria or any of the other states were violated.

This is a tempting offer to anti-Nazis. If this plan is to go through, it will depend largely upon the decision of King Carol of Rumania. Carol, whose word is law in Rumania,

Work to Start Soon Upon New School

McALLEN, March 6.—(U.P.)—Work orders for the new \$35,000 Latin-American elementary school building to be built at the corner of Houston Ave. and South 21st street, are expected from the Public Works Administration within 10 days, according to R. Gordon Pierce, architect.

Cost of the new building, which school district officials said will greatly relieve congestion in the city's two Latin-American schools may not be as great as \$35,000, although the cost has already been scaled down from the original bids

of \$45,000. Ramsey Brothers of Harlingen were low bidders for the contract.

The new building will contain a maximum of eight classrooms and a large auditorium, which neither of the present Latin-American schools has. The building will follow Spanish-California types of school structures architecturally, according to Pierce.
