## 'To Question Dr. Condon'

The Daily News yesterday carried a United Press account of Governor Harold Hoffman's latest move in sending an officer to Panama "to attempt to question Dr. John F. Condon," key figure in the sensational Lindbergh kidnaping trial, where the talkative Bronx educator is vacationing away from the photoflash bulbs and the glaring headlines, and incidentally creating a lot of new headlines by doing so.

There is no reason why Governor Hoffman should not send a man to Panama to question the doctor, if he believes the state's chief witness against Bruno Hauptmann overlook sticking to his story before, during, and after the trial. There never has been any reason why he should not send somebody to talk with the doctor about the matter. But it seems that now is a poor time to be thinking up that move in the case.

The doctor was available for questioning for a good while before the Bronx carpenter was given his reprieve by the governor. Why was he not questioned then?

Another thing that has been puzzling some of the nopoly liquor control will lead in American people is this: Why did Condon announce, through a national weekly magazine, that he was going to reveal some new evidence in the case, in that magazine at tion Nov. 3. a later date, and then, before the word was well on tis way, leave for Central America? Is Hauptmann going to be kept alive until that evidence, if any, is published to satisfy the curiosity of the American people, and the governor of New Jersey, and boost the magazine's circulation?
