Emergency Relief Ordered for Sufferers

ESTIMATE DAMAGE AT 15 MILLION

Rehabilitation of the south's storm ravaged sectors which counted a death toll of 432 was speeded today as federal funds were made available. Floods following in the wake of the tornado that hit six states Sunday and Monday accounted for 4 of the deaths while storms took toll of the rest. The south storm dead of the last week totaled 474 as 42 were killed last Thursday in storms that hit Georgia, North Carolina and other sections. With 186 known dead at Gainsville, Ga., the Red Cross today started a list of missing persons. Already 25 names were on it. Tupelo, Miss., the other southern city hit hardest by the tornado counted 206 dead and several persons unaccounted for. Damage to the tornado torn section totaled nearly \$15,000,000. President Roosevelt radioed orders from his yacht in Bermuda waters allocating \$2,500,000 of the emergency relief fund to tornado relief.

It adjourned its investigation of the murder charge last week on the day before Bruno Hauptmann was executed and with the charge supposedly "discredited" was expected to vote "no bill" yesterday.

COMMITMENT SECURED TO PAVE CUT-OFF

Reports on the contracting of the paving of highway 89 and No. 1, through Cisco were discussed at the Chamber of Commerce directors' meeting last night and other routine business was discussed. After much negotiations and meetings by the highway committee appointed to hasten, if possible, the paving of highway 89, a definite commitment has been secured from the state highway commission. It was stated by Secretary Spencer, to put the entire 45 miles of road under contract prior to January 1, 1937. Secretary Spencer also reported that Engineer Ehlinger says he expects the contract for paving the west end of highway Number One through Cisco, to be let during April. It has been rumored that a contract would be let this week, but a perusal of advertised lettings for the early part of the month does not show this contract. The directorate endorsed the publishing of a city directory for Cisco by Heber Page, of Springfield, Mo., who was present. The establishment of the milk depot for Cisco, which is establishing headquarters at the corner of East Eighth and Main streets, was also discussed. Directors present were: J. J. TEXAS FLEET PUTS OUT TO SEA FOR 'BLACK GOLD'

HOUSTON, April 8 — (U.P.) — The search for "black gold" has put out to sea. Salt Dome Oil-California Company's joint exploration of 60,000 acres of sub-sea land beneath Galveston Bay waters started when 10 boats, 17 seismologists and helpers, and a number of sailors, cooks and mechanics cast off at Barbour's Cut. The scientific party will "shoot" the 60,000 acres thoroughly. "It may require as long as 18 months," said Kark Hasselmann, president of Salt Dome. The 18 democratic members tentatively decided to give further tax to deter corporations and not to discriminate in tax rates against forming insurance companies.

AUSTIN, April 8 — (U.P.) — Withdrawing of a marble board gaming case from the court of criminal appeals was protested before the court today by Lloyd Davison. Davison said the dispute of validity of such boards has become a matter of such public interest that there should be a final court ruling. An affidavit to withdraw an appeal from \$100 fine had been filed in the case of R. A. Hazard from Harris county.

COMMITTEE OF THIRTEEN WILL REPORT

GENEVA, April 8 — (U.P.) — The League of Nations today decided to ask Italy if it was willing to start immediate negotiations for peace in its war with Ethiopia. The committee of 13 called upon Salvador De Mazariga, Spanish representative to approach Baron Bempeo Elosi of Italy tomorrow, regarding the immediate peace form. Italy has pronounced a wish that any negotiations be postponed until after Easter. Great Britain submitted a note to the League pertaining to all information she had gathered tending to prove Italy actually is using poison gas against the Ethiopians. The League published that Great Britain had cited six cases in which foreign observers in Ethiopia saw the Italians using poison gas. The committee of 13 agreed that a committee of judicial experts should study the alleged violation of the anti-gas, and other conventions, and report to the committee tomorrow. It was understood the Red Cross told the League it had not been informed regarding the violation of the anti-gas convention and was unable to seek such a nomination because a convention had been negotiated by the League and not Red Cross duty.

MUSSOLINI SAYS ETHIOPIANS MUST BE ANNIHILATED

ROME, April 8 — (U.P.) — Premier Benito Mussolini told the cabinet at an emergency meeting today that Ethiopian armies must be annihilated it was announced. Not only must the armies be annihilated but they will be Mussolini said.

Time to Do Something About the Weather

Mark Twain once remarked that, although everybody talks a great deal about the weather, no one ever does anything about it. And a nation which has suffered from the weather as much as has the United States could very well take that sage remark to heart.

For we seem to have gotten ourselves into a position where we get our paws caught in a crack no matter which way the weather goes. If we get a long dry spell, our soil blows away and our crops blister and die; if we get heavy rains, we have floods, property damage, and more loss of soil.

If we can't do anything about the weather itself we can at least start making our country weather-proof. And from Morris L. Cooke, rural electrification administrator under the New Deal, comes a sharp warning that if we don't do exactly that we shall pay a terrible price.

"Our country is afflicted with earth disease," he tells a senate committee. "No individual ever hastened to a faster doom than we are doing today. We are like a man well gone with cancer or tuberculosis. We cannot remain a virile nation for another hundred years unless something is done."

So far, according to Mr. Cooke, we have hardly made a start toward "doing something." We have built and are building some great flood control dams; but, he warns, if these have to stand by themselves they are doomed to utter uselessness.

The streams they impound will bring down silt, the silt will raise the river bottoms behind the dams, and before we have got over being proud of our engineering prowess our dams will become ineffective.

If Mr. Cooke is correct, it becomes evident that this business of soil and flood control is a more complicated affair than we have been supposing. To stop floods and erosion it may be necessary to go all the way to the headwaters of the little tributary creeks and brooks that feed our great rivers; to keep the water on the land, we should have to do a great many expensive and difficult things.

These things, says Mr. Cooke, would include control of the use of land by farmers, coupled with the erection of a vast number of small run-off dams at the headwaters of rivers.

Now Mr. Cooke may be unduly alarmed about things; but he is at least sounding a warning which we cannot afford to ignore.

ford to ignore. If the danger is as great as he says it is, we cannot wait any longer to apply a remedy; and if the remedy, in turn, is what he says it is, we need to put our best brains to work drawing up a vast national plan.

In other words, it is high time for us to investigate this whole question of flood and erosion control, and to investigate it with a thoroughness and a completeness beyond those of any previous investigations. Our national future itself may be at stake.

The very least we can do is to take counsel with the most expert authorities—and if their verdict is as unfavorable as Mr. Cooke's, to do exactly as they advise, regardless of the cost.

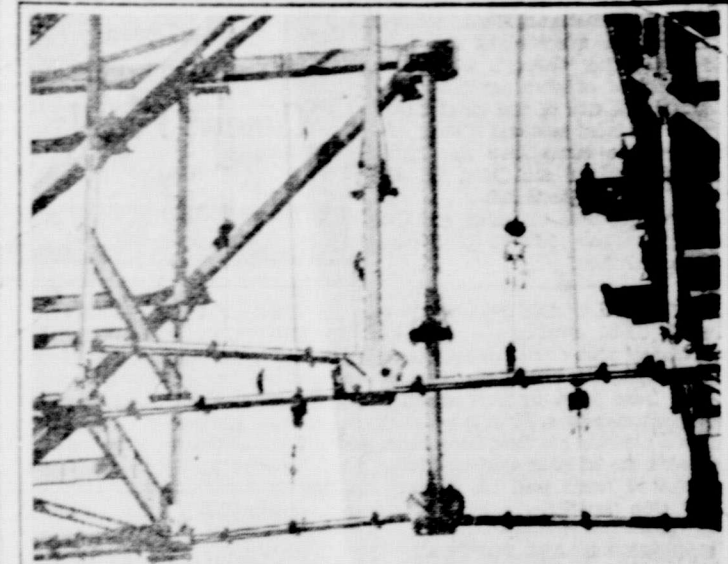

Last Gap Closed in Giant Bay Span



Clinging to girders and dangling from cables, workmen in the upper photo appeared like flies as they completed the difficult job of "hooking up" the last arms of the world's largest cantilever bridge, the San Francisco-Oakland Bay span. Working on their precarious perches, the bridge crews hoisted two huge eyebars simultaneously and fastened them with pins weighing several tons each. In the lower photo the bridge is shown after the last gap had been closed, the arrow pointing to the juncture. Traffic will flow east from San Francisco across the tandem-suspension bridges, through the Yerba Buena tunnel, and across this cantilever span, 185 feet above high water.

Court Erred Says New Trial Motion

A motion for a new trial for Raymond Henry, facing 50 years Sunday in the "hanging skeleton" death of H. L. McBee at Rising Star May 1, 1933, was on file Tuesday in District Clerk P. L. Crossley's office.

L. H. Flewelen of Ranger and R. E. Grantham of Cisco, attorneys for Henry, contended the court erred for the following reasons:

1. The court erred in refusing to instruct the jury to return a verdict finding the defendant not guilty, as charged in the indictment.
2. The court erred in failing and refusing to instruct the jury that the state relied herein for conviction on circumstantial evidence, and in failing, and refusing to apply the law of circumstantial evidence in this cause.
3. The court erred in failing and refusing to instruct the jury that Ted Crosswhite was an accomplice witness, and in failing and refusing to apply the law of accomplice testimony in this cause.
4. The court erred in failing and refusing to instruct the jury Mrs. M. E. Tyler was an accomplice witness in this cause and failing to apply the law of accomplice testimony in this cause.
5. The court erred in failing and refusing to submit to the jury in appropriate terms, the issues as to whether or not the state's witnesses, Mrs. M. E. Tyler and Ted Crosswhite, were accomplice witnesses, and in failing to instruct the jury the law applicable to such accomplices, if the jury believed them so to be.
6. The court erred in refusing to permit the witness Ivan Ellis to testify before the jury in reference to finding an automobile on the Zephyr highway in Brown county on or about May 7 or 8, 1933, and in failing and refusing said witness to testify that said automobile belonged to Lynn Smith. Such testimony was and is material to the defense in this case for the reason that state's witnesses, Pete Fenwick, M. E. Tyler and Mrs. M. E. Tyler, testified that they used Lynn Smith's automobile when they claimed to have disinterred the body of the deceased and hung the same to a tree during the last week of May, 1933.
