## 2 MEN KILLED, **WOMAN HURT** IN BUS WRECK

An Eastland man was killed, an-other was injured fatally and a woman was hurt when a truck collided with a bus on the Weatherford Highway about 18 miles west of Fort Worth at 5 p. m. yesterday

Newton D. Smith, 28, of Eastland, passenger in the truck, was killed instantly, while the driver, J. M. Threatt, 40, of the same city, died four hours later in a Weatherford Smith died of head injuries. Loss of blood from a manleg and shock resulted Threatt's death. He was taken to Weatherford in a private car.

Mrs E. H. Hopper, 40, of Van Alystyne a passenger on the bus, which was coming toward Fort Worth, received a cut on her mouth and minor bruises. There were eight other passengers on the bus-three women and five men-but Mrs. Hopper said that none of them was in-jured. Neither was the driver hurt.

## Marvelous Discovery in Big Bend

Texas was in existence long before Noah floated his ark Dr. Charles N. Gould is the regional geologist of the national park service. He is on duty away down here in Texas. He has covered the Big Bend-Rio Grande area of Texas and upper Mexico. On the Texas side of the Rio Grande he found remnants of oysters that would weigh petrified-a ton or so per dozen-in the Big Bend region in the wilderness of Brewster county. Now all the geologists of the world will sit up and take notice. Petrified oysters . 30 inches in diameter were found near Boquillas, in the area where the proposed international park is planned by the United States and Mexico. Dr. Gould said that some of them that thrived in those days were probably larger.

All this recalls a story told by a geologist from a noted museum of Chicago who was sent to the upper reaches of the Brazos river to dig up the remains of the finny tribe and other monsters of an unknown age. His name was Mueller. He was a Dane, and a widely known scientist of the tribe with which he affiliated. He made many known scientist of the tribe with which he affiliated. He made many marvelous discoveries of the shell age and of all the other dead ages. He made Seymour his headquarters. The banker of the village welcomed him to the town, and invited him to dinner to share his Texas hospitality. Mueller was a hard-boiled scientist. He believed that the world was created millions of years ago. His host was strictly orthodox as to the creation. He laid aside his knife and fork and other table implements and said to the Danish explorer and excavator: "Man, do you think I'm a fool? ## Marvelous Discovery in Big Bend

Texas was in existence long before Noah floated his ark. Dr. Charles N. Gould is the regional geologist of the national park service. He is on duty away down here in Texas. He has covered the Big Bend-Rio Grande area of Texas and upper Mexico. On the Texas side of the Rio Grande he found remnants of ovsters that would weigh petrified-a ton or so per dozen-in the Big Bend region in the wilderness of Brewster county. Now all the geologists of the world will sit up and take notice. Petrified oysters 30 inches in diameter were found near Boquillas, in the area where the proposed international park is planned by the United States and Mexico. Dr. Gould said that some of them that thrived in those days were probably larger.

All this recalls a story told by a geologist from a noted museum of Chicago who was sent to the upper reaches of the Brazos river to dig up the remains of the finny tribe and other monsters of an unknown age. His name was Mueller. He was a Dane, and a widely known scientist of the tribe with which he affiliated. He made many known scientist of the tribe with which he affiliated. He made many marvelous discoveries of the shell age and of all the other dead ages. He made Seymour his headquarters. The banker of the village welcomed him to the town, and invited him to dinner to share his Texas hospitality. Mueller was a hard-boiled scientist. He believed that the world was created millions of years ago. His host was strictly orthodox as to the creation. He laid aside his knife and fork and other table implements and said to the Danish explorer and excavator: "Man, do you think I'm a fool? Don't you know that the Lord created the world in six days and rested on the seventh?" That was the finish of Mueller under the roof of the financier. He completed his job thoroughly, made many marvelous excavations, captured many trophies of ancient ages and then shipped his find to the Chicago museum.
