RE-ENTRY DENIED TO SON OF CALLES

EX-DICTATOR IS ON WAY TO CALIFORNIA

BROWNSVILLE, April 11.—(U.P.)—Alfredo Calles who accompanied his father the one time dictator to the United States was denied reentry to Mexico tonight. The action of the Mexican immigration officials who explained they acted on orders from the department of interior at Mexico City surprised young Calles. The young man accompanied his father General Plutarco Calles and three political associates to Texas yesterday when the government expelled the former president of Mexico. General Calles was aboard an airplane enroute to Los Angeles when his son was stopped at the border. "I did not understand that I was included in the order. I merely accompanied my father to the border and planned to fly back to Mexico City. I cannot understand the department of interior's order", young Calles said. He said he was attempting to get explanation from Mexico City but first attempt had been unsuccessful.

Louisiana Oil May Be Shipped Into Texas

ETEX PIPE LINE CASE IS DISMISSED

SHERMAN, April 11.—(U.P.)—The way was open tonight for oil produced in Louisiana's New Rodessa field to be moved into Texas as a result of the federal tender board admission in Federal district court that it had no jurisdiction over such shipment. Richard Hill, attorney for the federal board number one at Kilgore, admitted to federal judge Randolph Bryant that the board had no jurisdiction over Rodessa oil. The court then granted a motion by Hill to dismiss without prejudice the case of the East Texas Pipe Line and associated firm seeking to enjoin the board from declaring such oil. Hill told the court that the board would not attempt to assert authority or acquire tenders or clearance certificates for oil moving in interstate shipments through pipe lines from Rodessa to Texas. The board previously had challenged the validity of orders of Louisiana conservation department and special orders permitting production of the oil.

DISSENSION IN RANKS OF COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, April 11.—(U.P.)—Dissension within the ranks of the House Old age pension investigating committee tonight threatened to delay continuation of the inquiry into affair of the Townsend to pay persons over 60 a \$200 a month pension. The committee it was learned had called off the meeting for at least three weeks. Members were understood to be divided on how the inquiry should be continued. Principal sources of the agreement: 1. Why Dr. F. E. Townsend head of the movement had not been called to testify. He offered to appear in a communication to chairman C. Jasper Belle, dem. Mo. 2. Why Robert Clements erstwhile secretary-treasurer of the movement was not permitted to give "full statement" of knowledge of financial affairs of the movement. 3. Why the inquiry had been delayed. Chairman Belle had gone to Kansas City, Mo., his home, and intends to stay there "a week or ten days".

WASHINGTON, April 11.—(U.P.)—United States weather bureau forecasters scanned maps today for Easter and predicted: "It may rain, and then again it may not." The weather outlook for tomorrow is all jumbled, it was explained. Anyway it might be advisable to take an umbrella in most sections. Only in the south could the bureau promise fair weather. "The Fifth Avenue, New York promenade may be under an over-cast sky. The bureau showed today and the same general condition is applied to Easter day parades in the east. Easter finery won't be dampened south of the Ohio river unless predictions go haywire. In the middle west and Rocky mountain parts Sunday will be cloudy with "rain possible" in the northeastern sections.

'Hunger Marchers' Parade Near Capitol

WASHINGTON, April 11.—(U.P.)—Five hundred "hunger marchers" carrying red banners paraded in the shadow of the White House today while a committee of five leaders went into executive offices with petitions demanding \$6,000,000 work relief program. The marchers assembled back of the White House and shouted loudly: "Give the bankers home relief, we want jobs." The president could have heard them if the windows were open. The paraders proceeded slowly down Constitution avenue and had pictures taken time and time again by tourists who had started out to take snapshots of cherry blossoms but ending up photographing red flags. The paraders were orderly. There were about 100 police along the line of march.

EX-FOOTBALL STAR IS GIVEN DEATH VERDICT

DALLAS, April 11.—(U.P.)—Dwight Beard, former North Carolina football star was given a death sentence today for the holdup killing of John Roberts retired Dallas policeman. The district court jury which convicted him had deliberated since Thursday evening and showed no sign of agreement until the verdict was returned. Beard, escaped life-term convict of North Carolina penitentiary, pleaded insanity as defense. He heard the verdict with no flicker of emotion. Beard's attorney had introduced the testimony of the family physician in North Carolina that the 25 year old athlete had suffered from dementia praecox since 20 when "something went wrong in his brain".

Brutally Assaulted Before Strangled

NEW YORK, April 11.—(U.P.)—Nancy Evans Pitterton, 34-year-old author was brutally assaulted before she was strangled to death and thrown into the bathtub of her exclusive apartment, an autopsy revealed tonight. Police said the assault was the only motive for murder although \$5 was missing from the victim's purse. The body of Mrs. Pitterton, wife of Lewis Pitterton, an executive of National Broadcasting, was discovered last night. She was nude, except for stockings. The clothes apparently ripped forcibly from her, littered the adjoining bedroom. Two pieces of wearing apparel were knotted around her neck. The body was in such a position that the feet protruded from the tub while the head was under the water faucet. No water was in the tub. Behind the Scene

WASHINGTON—While the good foods were attracting nearly everybody's attention, a federal agency began to take the world's largest corporation apart to show what makes it tick.

At the very outset, little Sammy Becker, chief investigator, started tugging at that toga of sanctimony with which for decades the five-billion-dollar American Telephone & Telegraph Company has draped itself every time anyone suggested it ought to be investigated. Already, little Sammy had exposed several patches of barks, to A. T. & T.'s acute embarrassment, and the inside dope is that you ain't seen nothin' yet.

More will come out of this investigation than mere "disclosures." Communications Commissioner Paul Atlee Walker, the gimlet-eyed former regulator of Oklahoma utilities in charge of the inquiry under a mandate of Congress, aims to:

- 1. Establish a basis for regulation of interstate phases of the telephone business. 2. Collect essential information for state commissions now working on rate problems—practically everywhere. 3. Develop the need for legislation to correct any possible malpractices in the industry.

The second and third points are most important from the standpoint of your telephone bill—and the first if you make many long distance calls. Faced with the vast complicated maze of the Bell System, with its more than 200 affiliated corporations and its expensive legal machine, state rate-making

Cisco Daily News, Just thought I would blurt out a little.

Well this is Thursday night the 9 and another sand storm raging; and this wind is about as void of water as the Townsend old age pension plan is of logic. While thinking plans and setups, lets take one little peek at this land (discriminating or generally known as the conservation program. It is planned to use the same base acreage as of 1935 under the tripple A setup and if that be so, then some of us old razor backs down here in these sand jacks will likely sit down rather than up. I am truly acquainted with the farming system in central Texas. I know that for the last twenty years those people planted on an average 80 per cent of their farm land to cotton, and did not make any reduction until the government paid those people a nice rent for their retired cotton acreage. Now lets see, out of 80 per cent in cotton, to reduce 25 per cent would still leave that brother with sixty acres in cotton. All right now here comes those sand jack razorbacks with from no cotton to 35 or 40 per cent of his farm land in cotton; yet he is required to at least reduce that 25 per cent, in order that he may be eligible to collect as much as two dollars per acre for his retired cotton acreage. More over should you run here and yonder, to sign this and that as we did last year, it would necessitate the renting out all the feed land to pay running expenses and loss of time. Now I am to some extent acquainted with at least a small portion of my dense ignorance. But as for myself I shall not sign no kind of paper, that cuts my cotton crop to what I am unable to buy one box of Dewitts early riser. While at the same time the central Texas man is profiting at his expense. It looks like a conglomeration mess to me, that we are not due just consideration. Why not all cotton farmers plant not more than 50 per cent of their farm land to cotton. Boys that would reduce a plenty; oh but that would never do. That would make Mr. blackland, lord sore. You know he has a wonderful farm, and a little political pull. We gotta handle him judicially you know. Some may ask hasn't the new farm setup put every thing up? O. yes, it has, but so high the most of us are naked and under nourished. I believe I had rather have 30 cent wheat than to have none. I'd prefer 3 cent hogs to no hogs at all. I prefer 4 cent cotton instead of madness. So that where I set. I am trying to stay out here on Mr. Will Poe's farm. TOM LITTLE

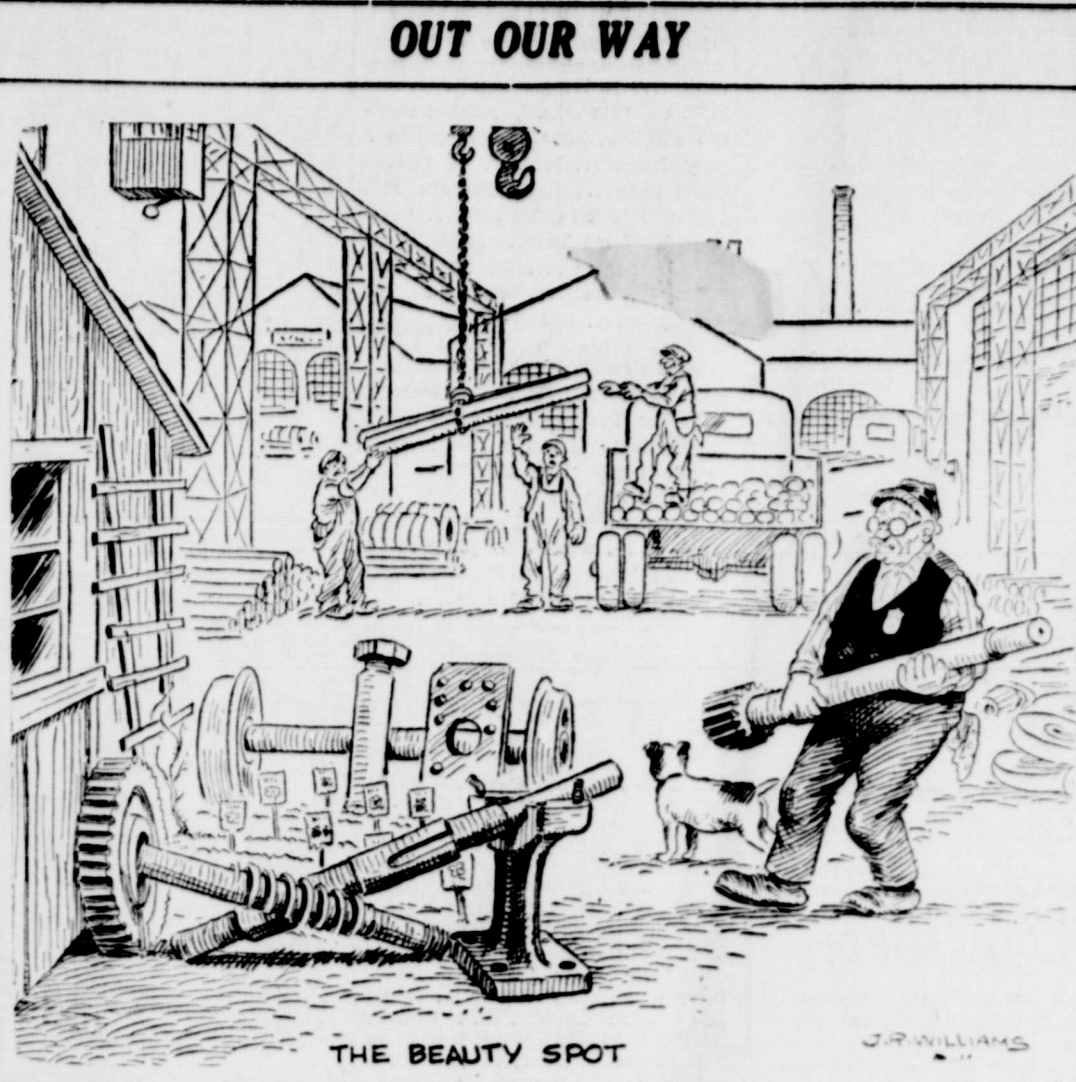

HOUSTON GETS RELIEF FROM THREE SOURCES

HOUSTON, April 11 — (UP)—Houston people are getting relief from three sources. W. W. Whitson, Texas Relief Administrator pointed out in an interview of the relief situation.

The Federal government is entirely out of direct relief an dhas only a work relief program, the WPA. This is now furnishing jobs for 5,808 family heads here. More than 1,000 have been cut from the WPA rolls since March 15.

The Texas Relief Commission, under very strict regulations, is taking care of families with no employable member. This aid is being extended to 3,900 cases in this county. It will continue until July. There are about 1,600 of the cases will be eligible for old age pensions.

Surplus commodities from the Federal Surplus Commodity Corporation are being used to supplement cash relief from the state.

Unemployables are receiving these commodities through relief commission case workers. The articles were bought by the government because of surplus market conditions. They do not form an adequate diet.

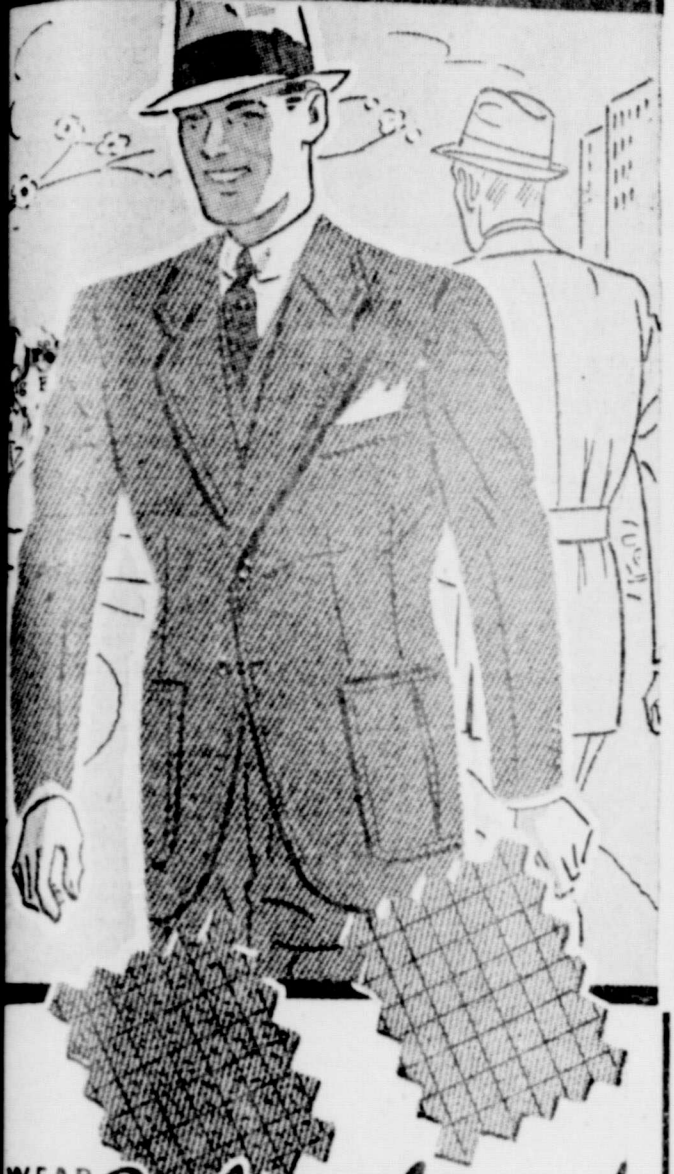
These are the only agencies to which the unemployed can turn for relief.

They are already operating at full capacity and no more can be added to the load, Whitson said.

The WPA must continue to reduce its rolls. Another 1,000 must go by May 31. The WPA is expected to last only through June.

The Community chest recently exhausted its relief funds and stopped aid to 700 or 800 families which could not qualify for either WPA or state relief.

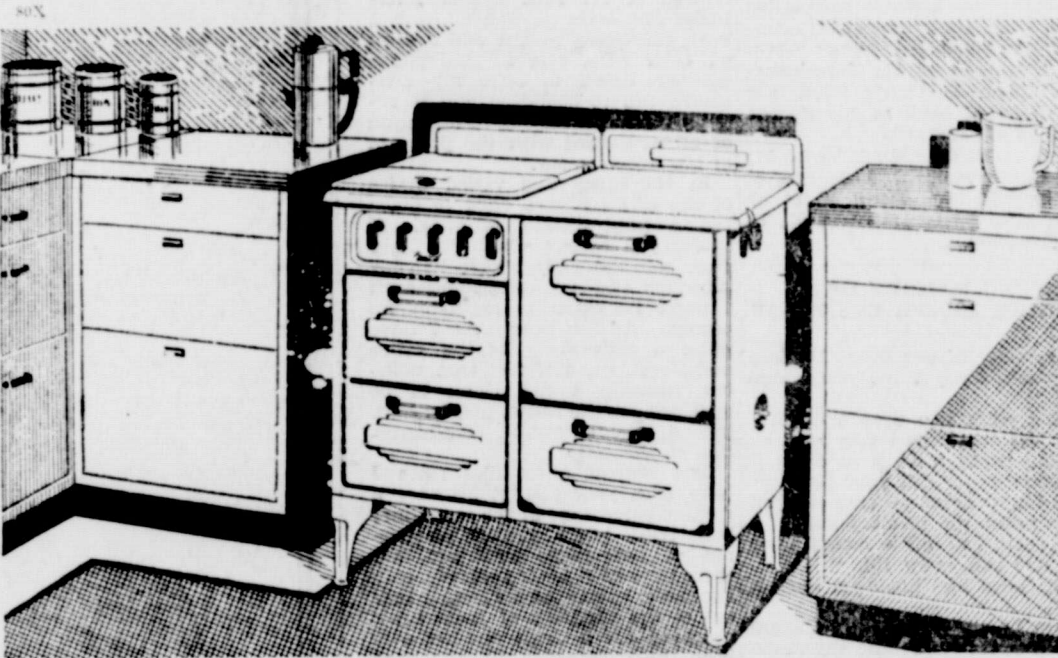

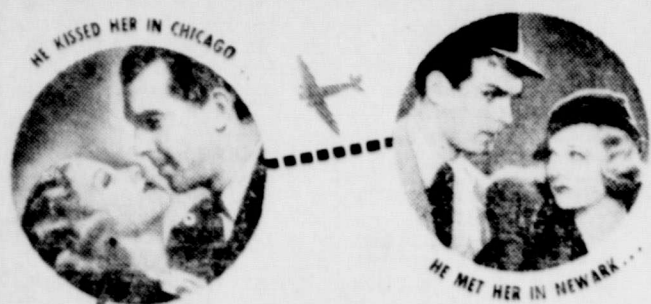

Pecans Safe Here Killed In The West

Local farmers in Cisco trade territory are divided as to whether the pecan crop is killed. Some farmers questioned think that pecans were injured by the freeze, but it develops that they do not have pecan trees themselves. Others who have trees are of the opinion that they were not injured.

Dr. Charles Hale, pecan enthusiast in Cisco says his pecans were not injured but his English walnuts were killed.

Other sections of the country have not been so fortunate, which fact will make for a better market here. Abilene's pecan crop has been virtually destroyed, according to local growers.

From 75 to 90 percent of the trees were already in bloom when the freeze arrived Monday night, killing both fruit buds and blooms. Only native trees withstood the freeze, said C. C. Sellers, E. L. Harwell and A. J. Shirley, Abilene growers.

Reports indicated that what promised to be a bumper crop has been killed as far south as San Antonio, but Clyde orchards will yield fifty per cent of the crop if conditions remain favorable. With the exception of berries and grapes, other Clyde crops were killed.
