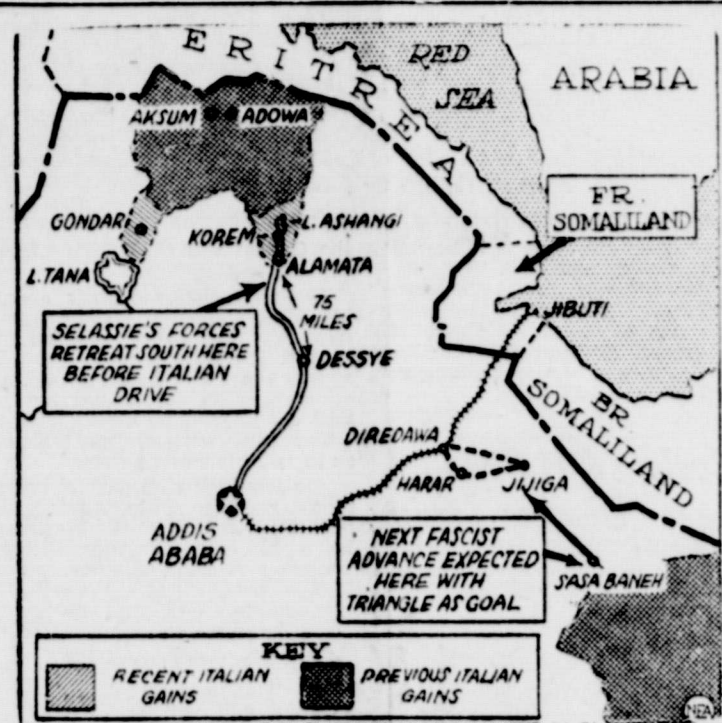

Tourist Cash This Summer

Surpassing even the optimistic estimates of native Texans, a practical national statistician of tourist trends today predicted that 11,565,000 persons will visit Texas this year, spending \$446,253,700 to share in the Lone Star State's celebration of its first hundred years of history, growth and development. The figures are those of Joe H. Thompson, who as national director of a Travel Bureau, Denver, has achieved recognition for conservative accuracy in many years of plotting the itineraries and spending plans of the American Motorist.

The amount to be spent represents approximately \$7,500 for each man, woman and child in Texas. Thompson points out it will find its way into the channels of established business in the state as follows: \$89,245,000 will go for lodging and a like amount for gasoline, oil, garaging and automotive repairs; \$93,707,000 will be spent for assorted retail purchases; \$111,556,000 will be spent for food, \$26,897,000 for amusements, and \$25,773,000 for miscellaneous refreshments, smokes and confections.

The Centennial Exposition is the principal lure, according to Thompson, but letters which have reached the travel bureau in such volume as to point to all-time record year tell also of plans to "discover the whole Texas empire" before leaving the state.

"There can be no doubt," Thompson declared, "that the determination of residents of all the other states to see Texas this year is the most significant development on this year's travel calendar. It is just one of those things, the proportions of which even we, who are closest to the hopes and aspirations of the nation's motorists, find hard to grasp."

The great purpose of this survey is to gather statistical information and it is not the intention of its sponsors to increase taxes. The survey itself has absolutely nothing to do with your taxes.

This survey is not in criticism of present or past tax assessors, but the survey is designed to help them in their work. You must remember that any errors found on the tax rolls is an accumulation of the work of officers since the organization of the county. Naturally some errors would come in, ownership would become lost, abstract numbers confused, etc.

The statistics sought will not hurt you. It may be of untold benefit. Please give it.

There will shortly be men in the field calling on each farmer and ranchman asking questions and filling blanks with required information. They will treat you courteously. Please give them the information sought. I feel sure you would much rather give them correct information, rather than have them guess at it, and fill their blanks with incorrect information. 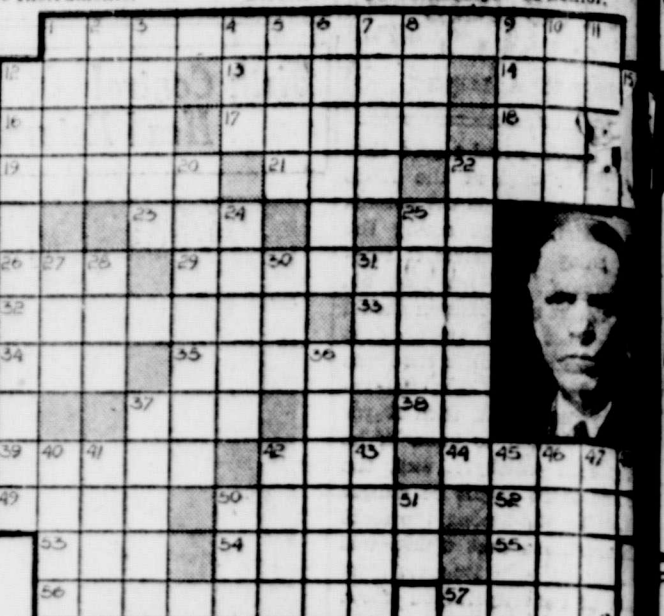

state, irked by Norris' staunch support of the New Deal, generally have disowned him, leaving him for democrats to accept as their candidate.
This is what many democrats seem inclined to do. They recall that Norris bolted the republican party in 1928 to support Al Smith. They clearly remember that the veteran progressive stump speaker, Mr. Roosevelt, four years ago and has continued his support of the administration during the past four years.
The paradoxical situation is that the nominal head of the democratic party is waging a battle for a man long considered the strongest republican of the state. If Quigley wins the primary and throws his support to Norris, as he says he will, the general election will find two republicans running for the senate, one of them backed by the democratic party.

Norris Plans Not Known
Norris has remained quiet concerning his future plans, but close friends in the state freely predict that he will enter the campaign next fall, especially if there seems to be strong popular demand for his candidacy.
The democratic primary vote will be split among four candidates, and it appears likely that Quigley has a good chance to win. Other candidates are State Treasurer George Hall, for many years a democratic wheelhorse; Former Representative Terry Carpenter of Scottsbluff, a Townsendite; Emil Placek of Waterloo, prominent banker and New Deal supporter; and Quigley.
Even if Quigley is defeated at the primary, it is thought likely that Norris' name will be on the ballot next fall; progressive republicans have been circulating petitions for many years past and they report that enough signatures have been obtained to place his name on the ballot.

Borah and Roosevelt File
Delegates to both national conventions will be chosen. President Roosevelt and Senator William E. Borah have filed for the preferential vote on the democratic and republican tickets, respectively.
The preferential primary vote, however, means little as convention delegates are not bound to support the candidate receiving the voters' preference. Republican candidates for delegates have not pledged their support to Borah. Best information is that at least 11 of the 14 who seem likely to be elected will vote for Governor Alf Landon after a complimentary ballot for Borah.

\$169,050 Land Bank Loans in Eastland Co.
SAN ANTONIO, April 13—During the period from May 1, 1935, through December 31, 1935, 113 Federal Land Bank and Land Bank commissioner loans, amounting to \$169,950, were closed in Eastland county, according to an announcement made by H. P. Drought, state director of the National Emergency council for Texas.
Of this number 21 loans, amounting to \$32,500 were made by the Federal Land Bank, and 92 loans, amounting to \$137,450, were made by the Land Bank Commissioner.
The total amount of loans closed by the Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commissioner in Texas during the above period was \$139,570,759, representing 46,390 individual loans.
On December 31, 1935, Federal Land Bank loans and discounts outstanding in Texas amounted to \$219,698,198, and Land Bank Commissioner loans and discounts outstanding amounted to \$82,967,534. Outstanding loans and discounts of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank on December 31, 1935, amounting to \$3,417,478.
Loans and discounts of the different agencies of the Farm Credit Administration outstanding on December 31, 1935, throughout the United States were as follows: Federal Land Banks, \$2,971,943,721; Land Bank Commissioner \$794,726,418; Federal Intermediate Credit Banks, \$153,927,919; Production Credit Associations, \$96,659,882; Regional Agricultural Credit Corporations \$43,460,186; Emergency Crop Loans, \$106,575,646; Drought Relief Loans, \$65,313,382.
