Distributes Maps**

First supply of the centennial edition of the Texas Highway department's annual road maps has been received in Eastland county.

Joe B. Blankenship of Eastland, foreman maintenance supervisor for the highway department, said Thursday he distributed 100 number received in the first supply, to Ranger schools and other schools will receive them when they are mailed from Austin.

Information on the map is corrected to March 1, 1936. The color scheme has been worked out to enable easy reading. The state background is light yellow with federal highways in red and state highways in black. County lines are designated by dotted blue lines with county names also printed in blue.

The map is printed and carries under the legend the words "Issued by the state highway department for free distribution only — there are no toll bridges on the Texas Highway system."

The map is surrounded by photographs of the state capitol in natural colors and various other prominent buildings. In the right hand lower corner appears the words "Home Culture, Spiritual Center," Lewis Smith.

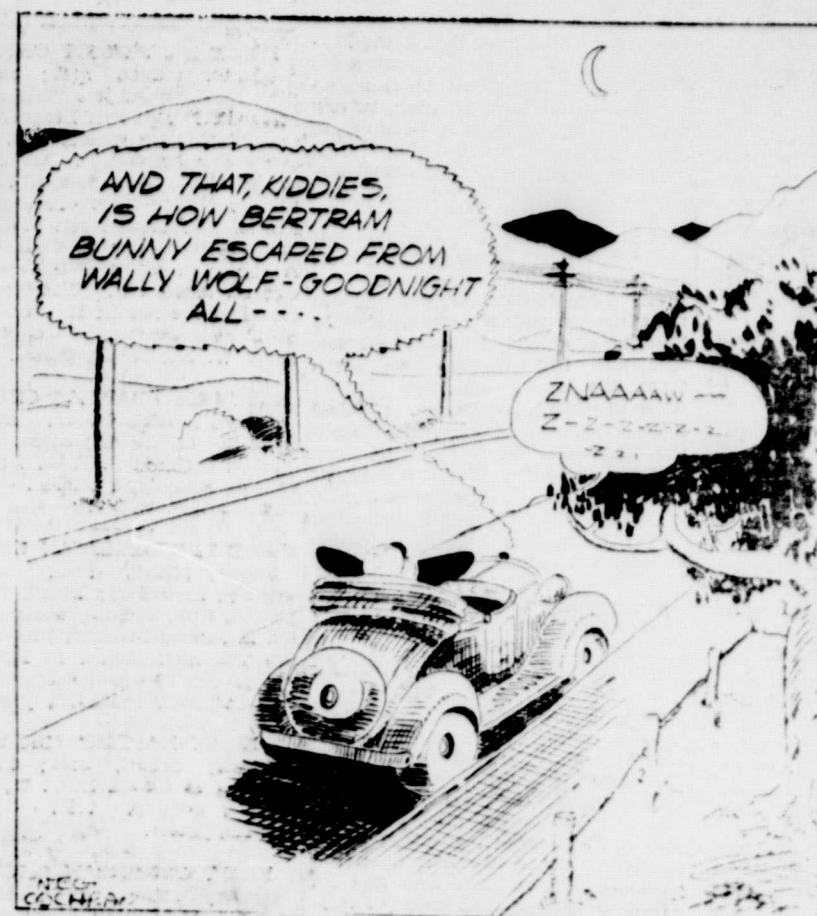
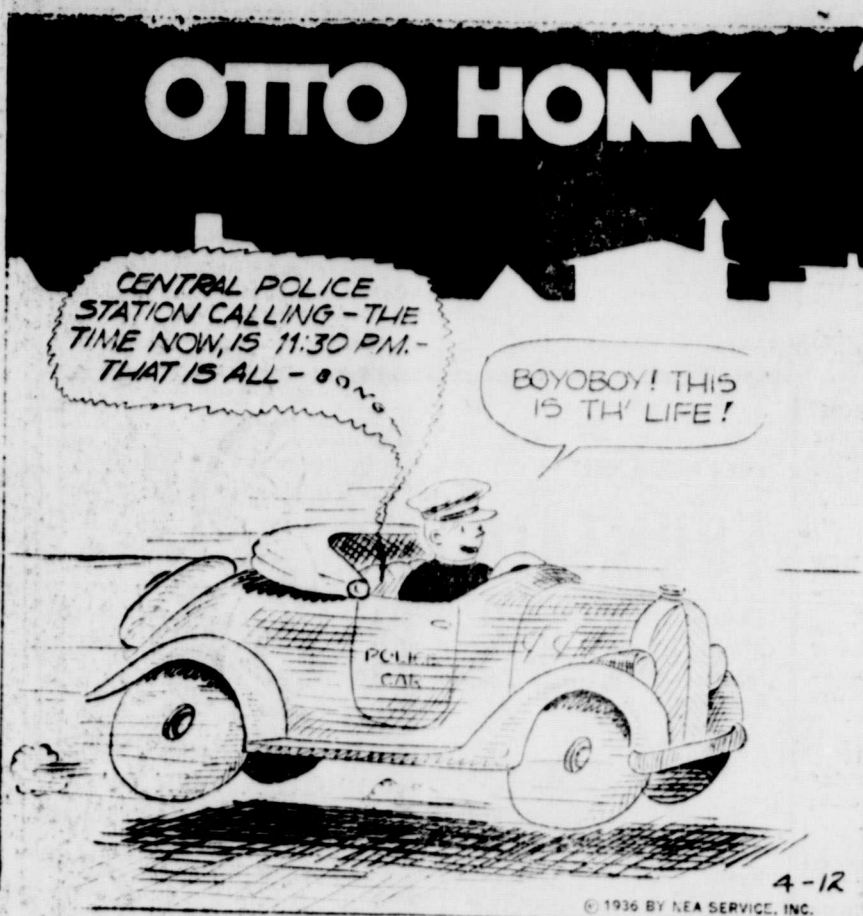

TREASURY GETS FUNDS TO CASH BONDS OF VETS

WASHINGTON, April 18.—Funds to cash the bonds that will be issued to veterans of the World War were made available to the Treasury by the signing of the Independent Offices Appropriation Bill by President Roosevelt. The bill carried \$1,730,000,000 with which to cash the Adjusted Service Bonds. This amount, along with other moneys now on hand, is expected to be sufficient to pay every bond that is issued should each veteran demand cash at once. It is not thought that such an eventuality will occur.

More than 2,000,000 applications have been received by the Veterans Administration for adjusted service bonds and additional applications are being received at the rate of approximately 100,000 per week. The lead of new applications is steadily declining. The War Department reports, however, an increase since passage of the full payment act in new applications for certificates. Many veterans who had heretofore not applied for one reason or another, now seeing the actual cash available, are tumbling over themselves to make application.

Bureau Working Overtime

The Bureau of Printing and Engraving is working 16 hours a day printing the bonus bonds. Approximately 400 persons are engaged in this job alone. The print order for approximately 35,000,000 bonds is the largest that the bureau has ever faced, although not the most complicated, as all of the bonds are of the same denomination. Bureau officials estimate that they will have no difficulty in completing the job by June 15, the date upon which the first bonds will be issued.

High officials of The American Legion were invited to the bureau late in February when the first bond came off the press. John Lewis Smith, National Finance Committee chairman, and Joseph J. Malloy, department commander of the District of Columbia, were present. Movie news reel cameramen and the radio recorded the event for those outside of Washington. Since then the bonds have been issued in a steady stream from the bureau presses.

Funds for Vets Decrease

In addition to providing funds to cash the adjusted service bonds, the Independent Offices Appropriation Act carried appropriations for the fiscal year 1937 for the Veterans Administration and other independent establishments of the government. Included under this heading are funds for four new hospitals to be erected, one each at Detroit, Michigan, Reno, Nevada; White River Junction, Vermont; and at a point either in Tennessee or Alabama that has not yet been determined.

Lieut. E. A. They will be transferred immediately to Marine training base, San Diego, Calif., for three months intensive training before assignment to some battle ship, plane carrier or some overseas station for duty.

Applicants must be single, 18 to 25 years of age, 5'6" to 7'4" in height, education 10 grade or above of good moral character and in excellent physical condition.

Court's Opinion in Doggett Case Sent

The opinion of Judge W. C. Morrow of the Court of Criminal Appeals, which Wednesday reversed and remanded the case of Clifford Doggett, convicted and assessed the death penalty in connection with the slaying of L. P. Threet near Cisco August, 1935, was received at Eastland Saturday.

A portion of the opinion read: "In the original opinion the sentence of death was affirmed against the appellant for the murder of L. P. Threet. The conviction was had in the district court of Eastland county. At the time of the trial of the present case the appellant was under conviction for the offense of robbery with firearms, he having been convicted in the district court of Callahan county. He was condemned to suffer confinement in the penitentiary for 99 years. No appeal was taken by the appellant from the conviction of robbery with firearms. At the time of the trial in the present case he was serving the sentence for robbery with firearms.

The appellant's conviction for robbery with firearms is upon the same evidence, same facts and the same transaction as the conviction from which the present appeal is perfected. In the record of this appeal there is a written agreement, sanctioned by the judge presiding,

Weekly Sunday School Lesson
God, the Forgiving Father

Text: Luke 15:11-24
International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for April 19.

THE Parable of the Prodigal Son, someone once remarked, ought to be called the Parable of the Gracious Father. It is the father's unfailing love that the story proclaims.

Youthful wasters in every age have despised the blessings and benefits of home, have turned their backs upon the responsibilities of family life, and have gone out into the world seeking only their own pleasure.

More than one such prodigal has found the way that looked so alluring a path of degradation and death. The full effect of the degradation has been manifest at times in the destruction of all will to restoration. The power to repent and turn back itself has failed.

HERE in our parable the prodigal sank to a very low ebb, then not only metaphorically, but literally, he came to himself. He was stripped of everything that he had and of every external thing.

There was some truth in the portrayal of the Negro preacher who represented him as selling garment after garment until he had "come to himself," and there was nothing left. Physically and spiritually that was true. He was bare of body and of soul, but, fortunately, he was not bereft of the one last vestige of common sense and action.

In the depth of his condition of distress, home seemed a very different sort of place. He pictured the hired servants of his father as possessing something that he had lost, and he deter-

mined, though it must have been an abject thing, to go back to the home and the father whom he had spurned, to cast himself upon the father's mercy and to ask only that he might have the place of a servant.

MORE than one prodigal has thus returned, sometimes failing to find a very warm reception. There have been fathers who have been stern and unyielding to the returning wanderers; so that the outstanding thing about this story is the picture of the father, thoughtful, merciful, magnanimous, with the rich and gracious love that is above all harshness and mere justice, who deals with this repentant son in terms of what may be tomorrow, and not in terms of the failure and tragedy of yesterday.

It is the love of this earthly father that is the prototype of the love of God. It was the essence of the teaching of the Gospel of Jesus that all that was best in earthly life only bore witness to the richness and fullness of something larger in the Father, who is the source of all life, and light, and love, and goodness.

The whole nature of the world today might be symbolized in the condition of this prodigal. It is a world that has turned its back upon grace and truth and love and kindness, that has turned to schemes of greed and war and hate, a world that has spurned alike the will of God and the abundance of God, and that lies today bleeding in its wounds and in its poverty.

But over this world there broods the love and grace of the Divine Father. Would that as individuals and as a world we might return to the Father's house and find a place of restoration and newness of life!
