- Cancelled the school district's May 12 general election. Board members Thurman Myers, place 1, and Sergio Leal, place 4, both of whom were up for re-election, were unopposed at the closing of the filing
- Approved a waiver of the 15 percent rule for freshman STAAR

While talking about the STAAR exams, the superintendent said it was the first time that standardized testing could affect a student's course grade, and that the decision had been made to defer this action for one year, if the local school board

approved the waiver.

"We feel strongly that it should not influence the course grade," Sheets said.

While the students will still have to take the STAAR exam, the test result won't affect the grades.
