 vinous and malt liquors that do not contain alcohol in excess of fourteen per cent (14%) by volume," and "Against legalizing the sale of vinous and malt liquors that do not contain alcohol in excess of fourteen per cent (14%) by volume."  
 (c) "For legalizing the sale of all liquors," and "Against legalizing the sale of all liquors."  
 After a careful study of the statutory provisions above cited, I am of the opinion that it was the intention of the Legislature to authorize elections to be held in the various counties and political subdivisions thereof in Texas to determine whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors of certain alcoholic contents should be legalized and that for the convenience of the voters the Legislature designated by alcoholic contents three issues that might be voted on by the citizens of any county or political subdivision thereof, these issues are quoted above and referred to as Subdivisions a, b, and c. Subdivision a provides for an election to determine whether or not malt liquor containing an alcoholic content not to exceed 4% by weight may be legalized; subdivision b provides for an election to be held to determine whether or not malt liquors containing an alcoholic content not to exceed 14% by volume may be legalized, and subdivision c provides for an election to determine whether or not all liquors shall be legalized.  
 In view of the statutory provisions as above quoted, I cannot agree with the contention of the plaintiffs that the same issues were involved in the election held on April 18th, 1936, as was involved in the election on January 3rd, 1936, but I am convinced that it was the intention of the legislature to create and provide these separate and distinct issues to be voted on from time to time by the

BOND PRINTED IN FRANKLIN'S SHOP IS FOUND

READING, Pa., May 1 — (AP) — A clerk while changing files brought to light an old paper dated August 27, 1766.

The document, a bond and warrant of judgment to obtain payment of 240 pounds, 12 shillings, six pence, was given to Nicholas Kinser of Tulpehocken township by a neighboring blacksmith, John Womeldorf, for 483 pounds, 5 shillings, double the amount of the obligation.

The paper, witnessed by William Rorer, justice, bore a seal on which was the head of George III of England.

Benjamin Franklin and D. Hall printed the bond in Philadelphia. Further examination of the document revealed the bond was paid and August 15, 1767, and the debt and interest amounted to 255 pounds, 13 shillings.

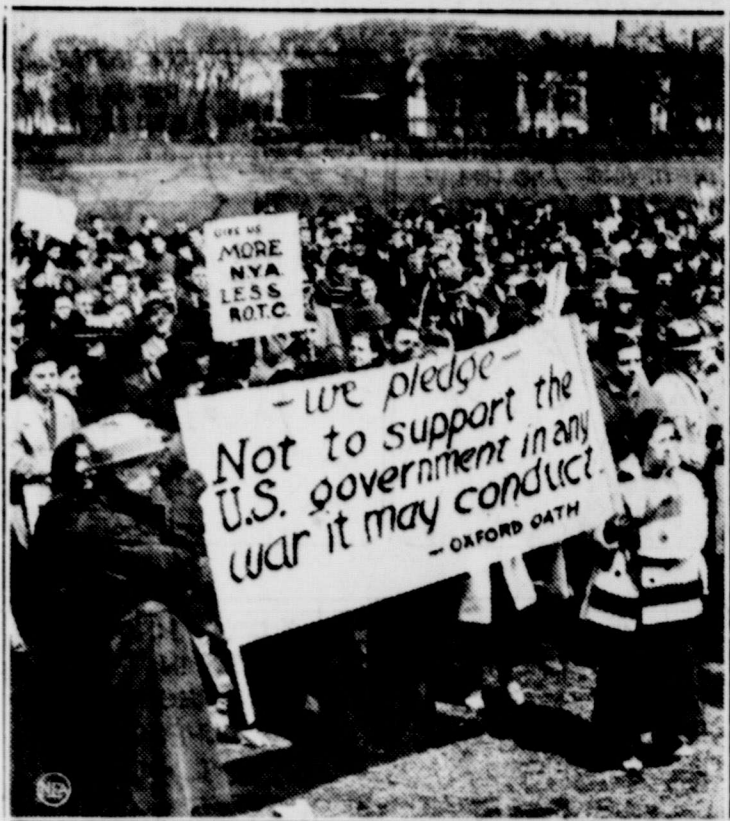

### Farm Debt Program Office At Eastland

PLANTINE, May 1—Revision of the state farm debt adjustment section of the resettlement administration program into 10 districts resulted this week in the location of one of those at Eastland.

Arrangements were completed by Guion Gregg, Dallas state director with F. Houston of Dallas. P. B. Madison of Littlefield was assigned as district director.

The district will be known as No. 5 and Eastland will be headquarters for 25 counties. This program attempts to make amicable adjustments with creditors of farmers on debts without necessity of court procedure.

The main duties rest with a committee appointed by the governor. Members of the Eastland county committee are W. R. Usery of Carzon, F. S. Boland of Scranton and Milton Newman. The county agent's personnel and the extension service compose an advisory group upon whose judgment the program's decisions are made.

The Eastland county committee meets the first Tuesday in each month. Madison stressed that the important functions of the program are those of the committee members.

In the Eastland district office located at the Eastland National Bank building are Miss Rita Troxell of Eastland and Miss Kattie Pictet of Abilene, stenographic and clerical aids for Madison.

Gregg is in charge of the western division of the state and Houston for East Texas.

Counties in this district are Garza, Somervell, Kent, Stonewall, Haskell, Hood, Throckmorton, Young, Jack, Wise, Parker, Palo Pinto, Stephens, Shackelford, Jones, Fisher, Scurry, Mitchell, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Comanche and Erath.
