== said election resulted in the majority voting against legalizing such vinous and malt liquors containing the alcohol content above stipu-lated; that the result of the said election was declared by the Commissioners Court in appropriate or-ders being entered therein in all

things as is required by law.
That on April 18th, 1936, another election was held in Eastland county to determine whether or not the sale of vinous or malt liquors that do not contain alcohol in excess of 14 per cent by volume be legalized in Eastland county; that said election resulted in a majority voting for legalizing the sale of vinous and matl liquors containing alcohol in excess of 14 per cent by volume in Eastland county; that appropriate orders were made by the Commissioners Court declaring the result of

said election. It is contended by plaintiff's that the election held on April 18th, 1936, involved the same issue as was involved in the election held on January 3rd, 1936, invoking Section 32 of Article I of the Texas Liquor Control Act which provides as follows: "After the first local option election held as provided in this act, in any county, etc., no sub-sequent election upon the same issue in the same political subdivision shall be held within one (1) year from the date of the preceding local option election in said coun-

It is the contention of the defendant that there was contemplated by the Legislature that three ssues might be submitted to the voters of any county or political subdivision to determine whether or not the sale of liquors containing certain alcoholic content might be submitted to the voters for determination, that such issues are separate and distinct, one from the other, and that the issue submitted in the election held in Eastland county on January 3rd, 1936, was a different issue to that submitted to the voters on April 18th, 1936, and for that reason the election in April 1936 was in all respects legal.

In passing upon the issues involved in this suit it is necesary for the court to contrue the articles of the statute relied upon by the parties to this controversy for the purpose of clarifying the issues involved. Section 40 of Article I of the Texas Liquor Control Act provides in part as follows: The Commissioners Court upon

its own motion may, or upon petition as herein provided shall, provided in Section 32, order local option elections for the purpose of determining whether liquor of the various types and alcoholic contents herein provided shall be legalized or prohibited."

"In areas where the issue or issues to be submitted pertain to the legalization of the sale of liquor, one or more of the following issues may be submitted:






