The owner, Edward Smith of Schriever La., was bitten last night by an Adder which he had kept with others in his hotel room. Surgeons amputated his left arm but the poison had already spread through his system.

COOLIDGE FURNITURE TO BE SOLD AT AUCTION MAY 7 INCLUDES OLD CRADLE AND WHITE HOUSE PIECES

By HOMER JINKS United Press Staff Correspondent NORTHAMPTON, Mass., May 6 — (U.P.)—Furniture owned by Calvin Coolidge from cradle to White House will be placed on the auction block tomorrow. Hundreds of letters of inquiry preface a capacity crowd at the school arena, a spacious building two miles from Northampton's business center and scene of the usual sale. Most of the articles to go under the hammer will be furnishings from the "Beeches" the mansion in which the late president spent his last days. Some, however, will be from the White House, and one piece that is destined to bring a top price is a cradle constructed in homely fashion by Mr. Coolidge's father. Efforts to ascertain if the late president was rocked in this cradle thus far have failed.

COTTON ROADS WILL UNDERGO ALABAMA TEST

The program, part of the federal department of agriculture's search for new uses for American-produced commodities, involves the use of rough cotton fabric as a reinforcement for bituminous-surfaced highways.

Roper (top), Secretary of Commerce, laid the basis for a tentative cessation of hostility between government and business. Roper outlined a 10-point program for re-employment and recovery, while Sibley called for cooperation between federal and private agencies.

A discussion of all insect problems will be held in the county agent's office, Eastland, at 2:30 p. m. Friday, May 8th, led by R. R. Reppert, A. & M. Insect Specialist. The meeting is open to anyone in Eastland county who is interested. Those who attend are invited to bring specimens of any insects to have Mr. Reppert identify and recommend a method of control. During the meeting Mr. Reppert will give special attention to the screw worm fly and its control. Livestock raisers will be specially interested in this, as the animal loss from crew worms in Eastland county runs into hundreds of dollars.

Striking Convicts Return to Work

PARCHMAN, Miss., May 6 — (U.P.)—Two score mutinous convicts at Mississippi prison camp No. 5, went peacefully back to work today after a one-day strike for shorter hours. Superintendent J. P. Thomas announced today that all was quiet at the camp where yesterday some 40 convicts led by Ralph Fuitts, bank-robbler and former pal of the late Raymond Hamilton, barricaded themselves at the camp and defied prison guards to get them out.

U. S. LEGATION UNDER GUARD; MORE RIOTING



ROME, May 6 — (U.P.)—Italy will formally annex Ethiopia Saturday, it was authorized today. Premier Benito Mussolini, it was said will refuse to discuss any internal settlement which does not consider that Ethiopia is now Italian territory. The chamber of deputies were expected to approve the bill Saturday proclaiming Italian sovereignty over Ethiopia.

AMERICAN LEGATION GUARDED BY ITALIANS

ADDIS ABABA, May 6 — (U.P.)—Safe under the rifles and machine guns of the conquering Italian army 4,000 foreigners foresaw today an early return to the normal life of Ethiopia. The American legation was under guard by Italians.

DEATH CLAIMS DEAN OF TEXAS NEWSPAPERMEN

AUSTIN, May 6 — (U.P.)—Hugh Nugents Fitzgerald, 73, editorial writer for the Marsh-Fentress papers and dean of active newspapermen in Texas died at his home here today. Fitzgerald was for many years editor of the newspaper work in Dallas and Fort Worth. In Dallas he was editor of the Times-Herald and on the staff of the Dallas News. In Fort Worth he was editor of the Record.

Two Youths Seeking West Coast Record

WICHITA Kan., May 6 — (U.P.)—A light monoplane believed to be the one in which two California youths are seeking a non-stop west coast transcontinental speed record passed over the Wichita airport today. Apparently the flyers checked their positions and headed east toward St. Louis.

Ruinous Farm Rules

Here is an interesting set of rules that is going the rounds of the press, started by the University of Tennessee and ironically instructing the farmer "how to go broke:"

1. Grow only one crop.
2. Keep no live stock.
3. Regard chickens and a garden as nuisances.
4. Take everything from the soil and return nothing.
5. Don't stop gullies or grow cover crops—let the soil wash away and then you will have "bottom land."
6. Don't plan your farm operations. It's hard work thinking—trust to luck.
7. Regard your woodland as you would a coal mine; cut every tree, sell the timber and wear the cleared land out cultivating it in corn and cotton.
8. Hold fast to the idea that the methods of farming employed by your grandfather are good enough for you, in any form of cooperation.
9. Be independent—don't join with your neighbor.
10. Mortgage your farm for every dollar it will stand to buy things you would have the cash to buy if you followed a good system of farming.

The whole ten are not needed. For general purposes the first four, supplemented by the ninth, will serve the purpose. Fortunately it is less necessary than it was a few years ago to rub it into the farmer in this way. The careless or ignorant methods recommended to insure ruin are practised less and less. Southern farmers, formerly the greatest sinners in several of these respects, have been particularly apt to learn the lesson.

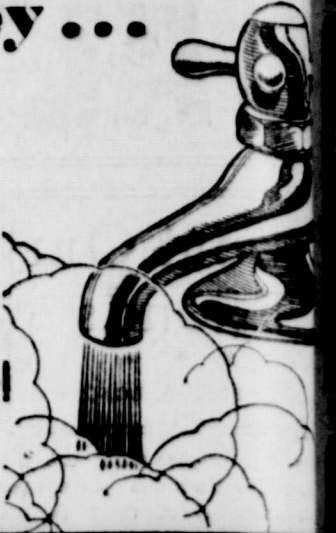

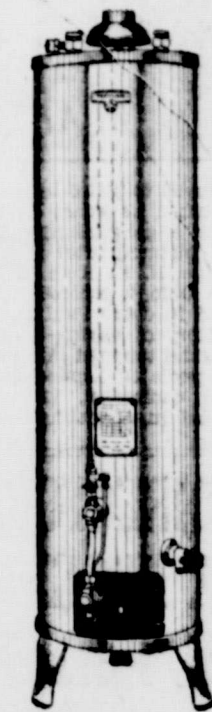
