### THURSDAY IS SET, LABOR MAY DELAY

### Store Manager To Attend Penney Meet

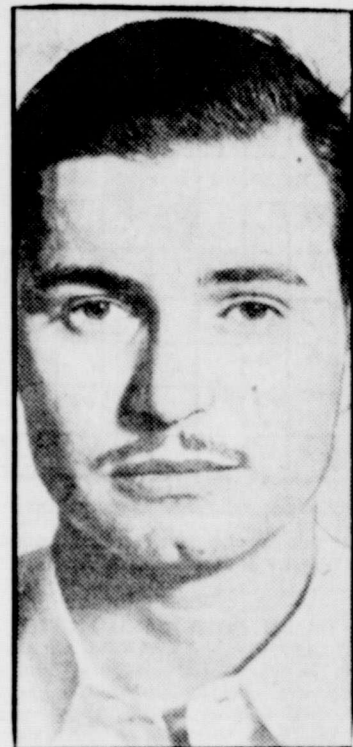

### GOMEZ STARTS ELECTIVE TERM IN CUBA MAY 20

HAVANA, May 19.—(U.P.)—Following the footsteps of his father—General Jose Miguel Gomez, Cuba's second president—the 45-year-old lawyer, Miguel Mariano Gomez Artalejo, will be inaugurated as the sixth constitutional president of the Cuban Republic, May 20. He was elected on January 10, the candidate of the Republican, Liberal, Nationalist Coalition.

When the venerable president of the supreme court, Dr. Federico Edelman, administers the oath of office in the Salon of Mirrors of the presidential palace, Gomez will embark upon his four year term, facing grave political, economic and social problems.

### ALLRED TELLS BANKERS TEXAS HAS MORE CASH

HOUSTON, May 19.—(U.P.)—Texas will end the fiscal year next August 31st with a cash balance of \$3,000,000, Governor James Allred said today at the annual convention of the Texas Bankers Association. Allred said that amount would be in addition to expenditures for the Texas Centennial celebration which will cost approximately \$3,000,000; a highway program larger than ever before, increased rural aid, appropriations of \$2,000,000 and interest and sinking fund payments of \$2,731,000 towards the state's bonded indebtedness.

### 5-INCH RAIN AT LUBBOCK AND CLOVIS

Farmers of the Texas Panhandle and along the Gulf coast had new hope for good crops Tuesday after the rainfall during the last 24 hours gave needed moisture in different sections of the state. Two persons were killed near Wilkerson, 16 miles west of Temple by lightning. Heaviest rainfall reported was five inches near Lubbock and the same amount at Clovis. Amarillo reported 4.0 inches; Dalhart 3-4 of an inch; Boise City, one inch and Morse 1-1/2 inches.

### Traxler Flying To Oklahoma For Trial

CANADIAN, May 19.—(U.P.)—Pete Traxler, notorious Oklahoma desperado, will be taken by airplane from the Oklahoma state penitentiary at McAlester this afternoon. Traxler waived extradition proceedings today. He will be tried in Oklahoma for the slaying of an officer at aPuls Valley. A plane bearing Oklahoma authorities was expected to arrive at an emergency landing field 8 miles north of Canadian at 2:30 p. m. today.
