Texas, through the years, has built a system of restricted flow for wells that has saved, for instance, the great East Texas oil reservoir from having been wasted away, in a physical sense, and its oil having been wasted in an economic sense by production wholesale for a 10 to 25-cent market.

While individual operators may kick at being limited to a few minutes' production daily, the industry as a whole proration hearings, is that whereas users of gasoline might benefit over a period of a few months in prices from unrestricted flow, the destruction of a field like East Texas soon would cause a permanent increase in the cost of motor fuel.
