Industry Gets a Foothold --- And Cisco?

Slowly, industries have been able to get started and maintain themselves in Texas, against the weight of established competition in the industrial areas of teh nation. Typical of these are the \$10,000,000 alkali-reduction

plant at Corpus Christi, and oil-industry machinery production in several Texas cities. Recent announcements have indicated that woolen mills

will be established at Orange, Texas, have opened a new field of development, though perhaps nobody has figured why the plants should be on salt water, instead of located in the wool and mohair region of the hill country.

The newest proof that industry is getting a toe hold in Texas is the plan for establishment of a huge pulpwood plant near Houston for the production of paper, paper bags and newsprint paper from Texas short-leaf pine pulp.

This week it was announced at Jasper, that the Champion Paper and Fibre company, which is building the Harris county plant, has executed a purchase contract to buy the second-growth pine from 704,985 acres of land in Jasper, Jefferson, Angelina, Sabine and Tyler counties,

This particular industry must compete with the vast production of pulpwood commodities in Canada, in the Pacific Northwest and in New England. It is doubly valuable to Texas, besides fostering new industrial payrolls, in that it reinstills value into practically worthless East Texas cutover pine lands. Second-growth timber usable in a pulpwood plant can be grown in five to eight years; and consistent thinning and "skimming" can produce reasonable annual production over the entire area.

Central Texas should be next. It should establish industries for the production of rayon, using cotton products. It should establish wool and mohair scouring plants, and, supplementing these, cotton and woolen mills for the utilization of local raw materials.

Texas no longer need depend for its finished products upon the factories of New England, or North Carolina. Slowly, as its farm population has suffered increasing poverty, Texas is learning the lesson that its climate, its raw products, its minerals and natural resources, its potentialities of cheap fuel from natural gas, crude petroleum and lignite, and its "white coal" of hydroelectric energy free it of dependence on foreign factories.


