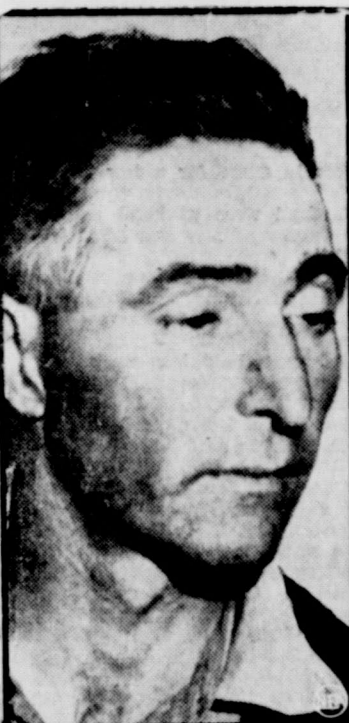

## Candidates Make Fine Mental Course

Now that candidates for public office are making speeches, the everyday Texan has a fine chance for a mental training course at the candidates' expense.

It is perhaps twice as valuable to listen to one with whom you disagree as with one whose policies you support and whose arguments you endorse.

It can hurt no one to know as much as possible about a campaign, or as many facts as possible about its controversy. The facts are that this candidate makes this statement and this promise, not that the statement necessarily is unbiased, or the promise impossible.

It is good mental exercise, and it is fun, to listen to a candidate when you don't believe a word he says. It tests your mental ability to answer in your mind his arguments, to pick flaws in his claims and promises. There is that comfortable feeling of being unconvinced.

Since there are four or five candidates in each of the races that will involve campaigning and speech-making, the opportunity is about four to one to hear someone you don't prefer, rather than the one you do.

This is a plea for the opposition. It proposes that you hear all the political speeches. It suggests you may find a stray fact or two, bedded in the mass of words and phrases. Basically, it points out the advantage in the widespread knowledge by citizens and potential voters, of what a campaign is about. For the citizens of Texas have their only share in governing the state in listening to and deciding between the respective merits of campaign speeches in democratic primary races.

## Rain in The Dust Bowl

Did the Centennial leaders have inside knowledge of the plans of Providence, or did the weather man take note of the Centennial opening date?

Texans, disturbed by widespread notoriety of the dust storms, worried by the arid threat to this year's crops, had been much worried lest Centennial visitors find a seared and parched state, suffering from dust and drought, facing economic injury from loss of crops, and offering an ideal picture of a country to stay away from.

But by the accord of events, generous rains fell throughout the Dust Bowl, all through West and Central Texas, through North Texas and the coastal regions. One big week of rain transformed the physical picture of Texas, and just by the margin of enough days for grass to sprout and the fields to take on verdant growth. It was good fortune indeed.

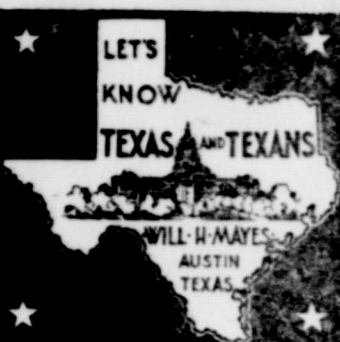

**Q. What will be the height of the San Jacinto battlefield monument?**  
**A. T. L. Nordheim.**—564 feet, which is nine feet higher than the Washington monument at Washington, D. C.

**Q. Where was Springfield and what became of it?**  
**A. R. O. G. Round Rock.**

**A. It was half way between the present towns of Mexia and Groesbeck, near the dam now being constructed on the Navasota river in Fort Parker State Park. When Limestone county was organized in 1846, it was made the county seat and remained such until 1873 when the county capital was moved to Groesbeck following the building of the H. & T. C. railroad, which left Springfield off its route. Once a prosperous village, its inhabitants have moved to other places.**

Texas late in 1835, with a company organized at Bardstow, Ky., to aid Texas in its struggle with Mexico when war became evident. He was with the Fannin forces that surrendered near Goliad, but escaped the massacre of March 27, 1836, and later wrote "The Adventures of Big Foot Wallace," and "Thirty Times in Texas."

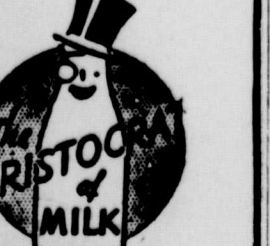

and cost \$1859.00, of which the WPA spent 1009.00, and the sponsor \$850.00.

Work is now being completed on the streets of Ranger, 40,000 lin. ft. of gravel surfacing has been completed or approximately 7.5 miles. This work is 95 per cent complete and has provided work for 55 men for five months.

Eastland Surfacing for the streets of Eastland has provided work for 65 men over a period of eight months and is 90 per cent complete. This project is set up for 44,500 Lin. Ft. of street surfacing and 4,170 Lin. Ft. of retopping streets, a total of nine miles.

Carbon Improvements and repairs have been completed on the Carbon School building and grounds. This

project cost \$2,260.00, of which the WPA funds were \$2,929.00, and the sponsor's \$331.00.

Gorman Four blocks are to be surfaced and 3,900 Ft. repaired on streets of Gorman. This project is 70 per cent complete and is employing eighteen men.

Precinct 1 Ranger, Cheaney, Ranger-Staff and Funhandle roads. Consisting of 15.35 miles. Seventy per cent complete. Rebuilding all drainage structures, replacing old wooden bridges with native stone, laid in concrete mortar with reinforced concrete tops with 28 foot roadways. Giving an all weather road from Ranger to Cheaney, from Cheaney to Eastland, and from Staff to Highway No. 1 west of Ranger. WPA funds \$37,566.62, sponsor \$5,493.58.

Eastland-Grapevine, from Highway 67 south of Eastland through the Grapevine community and from west of Mangum where the pro-

posed dam across the Leon is located, north by the Consolidated Beester Station to Highway 1. WPA funds \$28,348.75, sponsor, \$3,456.00, 13.8 miles.

Precinct 2 Desdemona, Eastland and Gorman-Ranger roads. Leading from Desdemona through Staff to Eastland and Ranger and from Gorman to Eastland and Ranger through Staff. Fifty per cent complete. Consisting of 22.9 miles of road. WPA funds \$39,616.17, sponsor \$5,759.50.

Carbon, Okra and Long Branch community. Leading from Carbon on highway 67 to Okra and on to Rising Star on Highway 23, also west to the Long Branch community. Eighty-five per cent complete. 8.55 miles. WPA funds \$16,938.00, sponsor \$3,572.00.

Gorman, Desdemona road. Re-paving old asphalt road connecting the two towns. Consisting of 10 miles. Completed. WPA cost \$2,336, sponsor \$1,313.00.

Precinct 3 Nimrod to Highway 23. Seven miles of roadway leading from Highway 23 to Nimrod connecting with road leading to Sabanno and Fieker. Fifty per cent complete. WPA funds \$18,604.71, sponsor \$3,549.50.

Rising Star and Okra road. 12.2 miles, leading from Rising Star through Okra to Carbon. Forty per cent complete. WPA funds \$20,747.00, sponsor \$6,507.50.

Precinct 4 Seranton-Dothan road, leading north out of Seranton to Highway 1 at Dothan. 8.5 miles. Ninety-five per cent complete. Cost WPA funds \$11,705.13, sponsor \$1,914.60.

Cisco-Cottonwood and Dothan 13.78 miles, leading north from Highway 1 through Cottonwood and Bluff Branch communities to Highway 23 and west by Cottonwood school and south to Highway 1 at Dothan. WPA funds \$33,238.68, sponsor \$3,840.25.

All lateral roads are being built on standard specification, with 60 foot right-of-way. All curves are being eliminated or flattened. Road hills are being cut down to grade and gravelled surface is being built 20 feet wide.

All wooden bridges are being replaced with native stone walls set in cement and mortar with reinforced concrete tops. All right-of-way dragged and fence rebuilt required. All ditches are being flattened and back sloped, and baffle walls built where necessary.

The lateral road work alone in Eastland county involves spending of \$259,232.30, and work for over 600 men for an average of six months. Projects already submitted and approved by the WPA for lateral road work is sufficient to employ the above number of men for another full year, if the men and money are available to do the work.

Fascism Is Denounced by Rabbi

AUSTIN, June 8--The world crisis of today is not a new crisis, instead it is the same crisis that challenged previous ages, but which is now intensified by excessive nationalism, declared Rabbi Martin Zieionka of Temple Mt. Sinai, El Paso, in the bacalaureate sermon for approximately one thousand University of Texas graduates here Sunday evening. Rabbi Zieionka, using as a subject "The Conflict," frankly asserted he could present no panacea for the solution of the problems that face a topsy-turvy world. But he recognized the clash as one between materialism and spiritual interpretation of life and declared that progress only can come through the medium of faith and religion. The bacalaureate speaker warned we may lose our democracy because we accept it as a matter of fact. The forces of materialism that are

so viciously attacking democracy he summarized as follows:

"Communism is definitely anti-religious and probably as many accept that philosophy of life because it calls religion an opiate as accept it because it challenges capitalism. It must be met by the philosophy of democracy brought forth with equal fervor and translated into our daily living. It cannot be wiped out with legislative enactments. It can't be conquered by putting men into jail or by breaking up meetings and cracking the heads of its advocates.

"The immediate challenge, however, comes from Fascism and it makes little difference whether in German or Italian form.

"Fascism is defined as a national expression of the personal teachings of materialism in all ages past. It is a denial of those spiritual factors of freedom to live, act, speak, and think as the people want. Some of us are enchanted by the reported progress made by nations under dictators because we despair about finding a way out of our difficulties.

"If we honestly believe in the supremacy of democracy we must realize that oft times quality must be sacrificed for quantity; that there is more progress in the mistakes of the people made by majority votes than in the accomplishments of nations made at the behest of a tyrant."

Opposed to these material interpretations of life, Rabbi Zieionka cited religion as the pre-eminent exponent of the spiritual forces of life. He said that there may be differences of emphasis, but that Christianity and Judaism agree upon the basis placed upon the two teachings.

Quoting the scriptures—"Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart and with all thy soul and with all thy might" and again, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself"--Rabbi Zieionka declared that if we agreed upon this platform nineteen hundred years ago the experiences of these centuries have proven their rightful places in our lives and that this doctrine is the answer to the conflict.

"Previous ages have seen the challenge of tyrants and autocrats of religious bigotry, of war and threats of war, the oppression of weak minorities but never before have all challenges been combined as they are at the present time," he said. "This makes the present crisis all the graver."

"Three decades ago, the struggle seemed to have vanished because democracy was on the ascent and every nation sought its place in the sun with that open declaration of democratic principles but the intervening decades have brought disillusion even to the most ardent advocates of democracy."

This disillusion was revealed in Rabbi Zieionka's sermon as follows: "Selfishness is shown by innumerable investigations of powerful corporations.

"Militarism insists on preparedness for war even at the expense of college and high school students instead of preparation for peace.

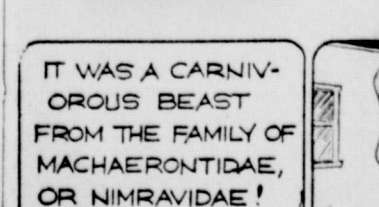
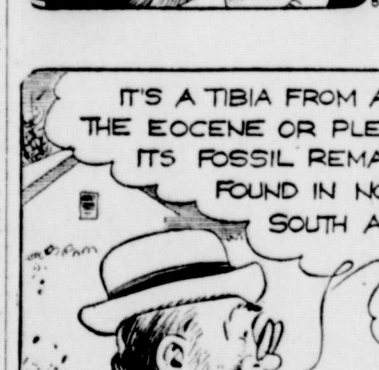
"Some groups and some men feel that are above the law.

"Our courts are challenged because of innumerable technical delays.

"Freedom of speech and freedom of press are challenged continually and the struggle to maintain that freedom is a glorious chapter in an age-old conflict.

"If democracy has failed it is not due to the principles it has proclaimed but to the selfishness of men."

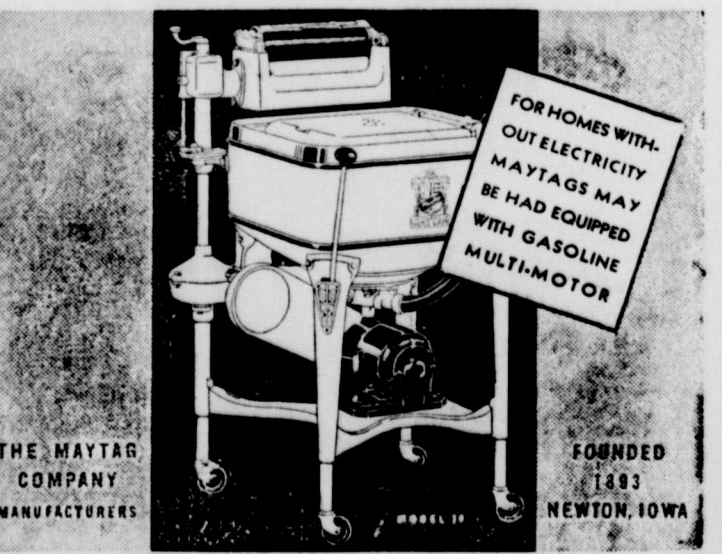

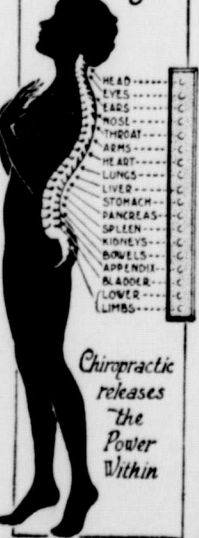
