ALIENIST SAYS REV. ESKRIDGE WAS NOT SANE

HOUSTON, June 9.—(U.P.)—Dr. T. B. Harris, alienist called as a defense witness, here today in the murder trial of the Rev. C. Edgar Eskridge answered a 2-hour long questioning concerning the defendant's mental condition with six words: "I feel that he was insane." Eskridge is on trial in district court charged with murdering police chief Ed O'Reilly at Orange on May 29, 1935. In the question, J. J. Collins, chief defense attorney, summed up the salient points of the preacher's alleged irrational actions prior to the slaying without referring to notes and prompted only twice by his co-counsel. Collins recited the defendant's anti-crime crusade at Orange, his fear of being killed, his boasting of great wealth, and "get rich quick scheme" as told by 37 witnesses since the trial opened a week ago. Dr. Harris said he believed Eskridge was insane, suffering from manic depressive insanity.

NO POLITICS SAID RELIEF HEAD TODAY

AUSTIN, June 9.—(U.P.)—An executive order issued today by Orville Carpenter, executive director of the old age assistance commission, warned commission employees to keep out of politics. The warning said: "Your attention is directed to a copy of a law passed by the 44th legislature that was furnished you at the time you were employed by this commission. This law expressly prohibits any state employee from engaging in, or taking any part in, any political campaign."

Aged Veterans Of Confederacy Meet

SHREVEPORT, La., June 9.—(U.P.)—Aged veterans of the Civil War, once proud army of the confederacy met today in the annual reunion that will be the final visit for many of them. LION BUNTING STARTS FLYING HERE TONIGHT

About 300 flags will be started hanging tonight as decorations for the Lions convention, said Mrs. James Haynie today as she and other workers busied themselves rearranging flags and bunting to dressing Cisco for the big event of welcoming and entertaining the representatives of 43 clubs of district 2-E June 16-17. These 300 flags do not include the decoration pieces which will be hung on the fronts of buildings along the business district, neither do they include the decorations which are to be placed inside and outside of the Laguna hotel, the Palace theater and the Lake Cisco Amusement pavilion which are to be the headquarters for the main events of the convention. Cisco will be gaily dressed and these ropes of flying flags will include Lions emblems and welcome signs which are to proclaim Cisco's hospitality and greeting to the hundreds of Lions and Lionesses who are to gather in Cisco for a two-day event which perhaps has not been eclipsed in the history of Lions district gatherings. The organization has been thorough the financing complete and the program setup outstanding. The publicity has covered the territory and will be climaxed by the welcome edition of the Cisco Daily News which will be published and distributed Sunday, being mailed out to the individual delegates of the district and placed in the hands of attending visitors personally. Appeal Is Filed In Walter Prater Case

AUSTIN, June 9.—District Judge Noland Williams receiving an inquiry from a jury and writing a refusal to answer it in chambers without the presence of the defendant in open court, was attacked in an appeal filed here today from the 99 year sentence given Walter Prater in Dallas on conviction of criminal assault. Judge Williams qualified the bill of exceptions with the notation that the action was with consent of Prater's attorney. The jury had inquired about the pardon power of the governor. The judge wrote on the back of the inquiry a notation that he could not legally answer it.

JOHN HAMMOND FAMOUS AIDE HEART FAILS

GLOUCESTER, Mass., June 9.—(U.P.)—John Hays Hammond, Sr., 81, who escaped a boer executioner, to become the candidate of a czar and a president died at his lookout hill estate late yesterday of heart attack. Hammond, a world authority on mining engineering and a close associate of the great Cecil Rhodes, had frequent mild heart attacks recently. Yesterday he ordered his car for an afternoon drive. When he failed to appear his secretary found him dead in the wash room of his study.

Arguments Begin In Lone Star Gas Case

DALLAS, June 9.—(U.P.)—Arguments in the suit by which the city of Fort Worth seeks to prohibit dilution of natural gas by Lone Star Gas company were heard today by Federal Judge W. H. Atwell. Attorneys for the company testified that a nitrogen dilution plant was constructed in 1924 to stabilize the natural gas put into North Texas mains designed to prevent smoking and soot-forming by gas appliances.

WASHINGTON, June 9.—(U.P.)—Gallagher hospital attendants established a closer watch today over representative Marion Zioncheck, playboy congressman, from Washington, after he broke out of the psychopathic ward and strolled through the grounds in bare feet and a flowing bathrobe. Zioncheck kicked two screens loose from a window and jumped to the ground a few feet below. Smoking a big black cigar, and with his bathrobe sticking out behind him, he began making a circuit of the hospital grounds. The cheers and shouts of other inmates aroused hospital attendants. By the time they reached the ground Zioncheck was holding earnest conversation with a truck driver in the streets.

(Copyright, 1936, by United Press) PUBLIC HALL, CLEVELAND, O., June 9.—(U.P.)—The republican convention convened in this vast auditorium today and quickly ratified the choice of broadshouldered Senator Frederick Steiwer as Keynoter. A recess was ordered at 12:33 just fifty minutes after convening until 8 p. m. Steiwer was acclaimed before an audience of more than 10,000 persons in the flag draped gold, cream and blue assembly hall. The convention's action came as managers for Governor Alf Landon struggled with troublesome platform problems and enthusiastically issued forecasts of victory, probably on Thursday's ballots. Less than an hour after the call to order by Chairman Henry Fletcher at 11:43 a. m. the delegates roared their approval of Steiwer. The Oregon senator will present his keynote address at tonight's session. Approval of the temporary slate of officers quickly followed. Republican notables crowded the convention platform. Many sat in their places with state delegations, but dramatizing his split with party leadership, Senator William Borah remained at his hotel room. He may, however, attend tonight's keynote session. First stir of presidential enthusiasm from the assembly floor came when it was announced that former Senator John Thomas, of Idaho, a Borah manager, had a platform plank to present to the resolutions committee. Brief applause burst out at the announcement.

ARMY MEN MAY SURVEY LEON RIVER PROJECT

A survey of the Leon river project by army engineers is forthcoming, provided President Franklin D. Roosevelt has or will sign congress' omnibus flood control bill. J. Frank Sparks, chairman of the board of directors who recently returned from Washington, stated Monday. The bill was made to include the Leon project by amendments of Senator Morris Sheppard and representative Thomas L. Blanton, Sparks stated. Army engineers would survey the project and the work, if approved would be under their supervision. Sparks stated the bill provides for appropriation of funds for the projects approved by the engineers. The Leon district was formed by the Texas legislature and a preliminary survey has been completed. The district is composed of Eastland and Callahan counties. Directors of the project hope for construction of a dam near Mangum for the conservation of water and irrigation of land.

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He Took Her Wages

One Saturday night not long ago in a certain state in this land of the free and the home of the brave, a married woman who had found it necessary to get a job, came home with her pay envelope. Her husband forbiddingly took her money away from her. However, the next morning before leaving for church to worship God, he added to her pleadings to the extent of giving her back five dollars of her earnings.

Don't shower invectives on that husband's head. He was entirely within his legal rights, for the law of his state declares that a man can quite justly appropriate his wife's wages. So you see that according to the legal code of his commonwealth the man was not unfair with his wife but in fact generous in that he let her have so much as five dollars of her own money.

On one side of a state line, that wife-wage-appropriating husband is a law-abiding citizen. Yet twelve inches away, across the line of another state, which recognizes a married woman to be a person and gives her the right to her earnings, he would be a law-violating citizen. See how absurd the law can be?

In one state a person can get a divorce for almost any reason imaginable on three months residence. In another state a year is required. In still another one mate deserted by the other must stick around in matrimonial bondage until five years have elapsed before divorce is permitted. And in still another state nuptial knots cannot be untied for any reason whatsoever.

Because the laws of our various states so ridiculously conflict and are so discordantly out of tune, there are persons promoting worse confusion worse confounded, and more distress more multiplied, by actively advocating that the national government be given power to regulate the personal affairs of the citizens of all the states.

If our forty-eight states were forty-eight industries with mutual interests instead of forty-eight commonwealths, they would long ago have worked out a practical basis for pulling together. Business has earned that it must cooperate, that there must be team play if there is to be progress and satisfaction. So the businesses in each line get together about every so often and exchange ideas and work out cooperative policies. The bankers hold their conventions; the accountants theirs; the power men theirs; the florists theirs; and so on; yet no business surrenders its individuality.

Instead of setting up a lot of arrogant little dictators in Washington in the shape of bureaucrats to tell the inhabitants of all the states where to get on and where to get off, why shouldn't the states of the union follow the plan that big business has found to be effective? Why shouldn't the forty-eight states have their representatives get together in annual convention and exchange ideas that have been found to be good and workable, and adopt broad, cooperative policies?

There are many archaic, useless state laws that need remodeling or repealing. Maybe one or two new laws should be created, such as a statute in every state that will give a wage-earning wife the right to her wages. Child labor needs regulation, too; but the constructive way to get at that is through an intelligent working together of the states, and not through federal meddling in. What this country needs is more state cooperation and less national dictation.

Q. State who will decide whether I can get an old-age pension. L. E. Fort Worth.

A. There are 39 investigation offices in as many parts of the state, where local investigations are made. Reports are made by these to the state office at Austin for final decision.

Q. Who are exempt from poll tax payments in Texas? R. D. L. Rank.

A. All persons under 21 years of age, all who have become 21 after Jan. 1, and those who passed 80 before Jan. 1. Indians, not taxed persons insane, blind, deaf or dumb and those who have lost a hand or foot, or are permanently disabled are also exempt.

Q. When was the "Old Stone Fort" erected at Nacogdoches? R. M. Henderson.

A. The exact date is not known, but it was about 1779.

Q. Where was "Camp Ricketts" and how did it get its name? R. D. P. Alice.

A. It was a military camp established shortly after the Civil War at the present site of Hidalgo, on the Rio Grande, then called Edinburg. It was named for Capt. James B. Ricketts, U. S. artillery officer, who won distinction at the Battle of Bull Run.

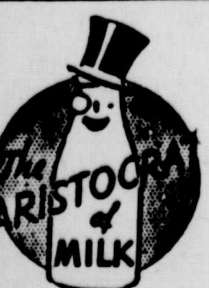

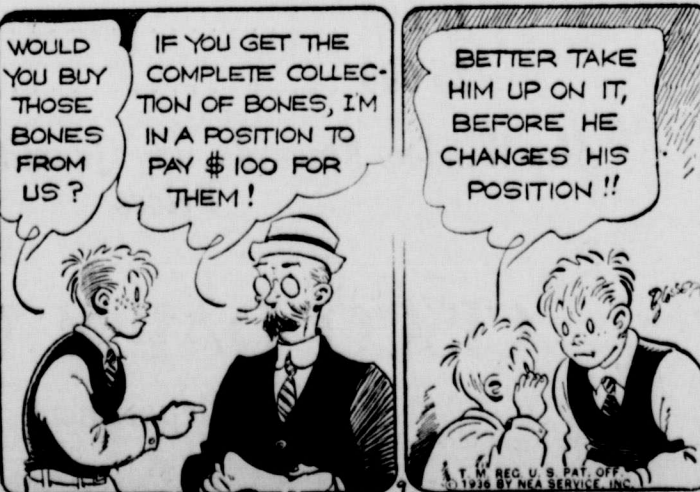

Farmers Experiment Inoculating Peas

Several Eastland county farmers are inoculating cowpeas, peanuts and other legumes to determine whether the practice pays in the county. The inoculant being used is a commercial preparation containing the necessary bacteria which is mixed with the seed before planting.

In speaking of using inoculants, Mr. E. A. Miller, extension agronomist, states, "Judging from the reports of demonstrations, especially cowpeas, soybeans, and peanuts, results of the experiment station at Nacogdoches where the inoculation of cowpeas last year gave a 42 per cent average increase in forage for all varieties, it is very important that we lay more stress on artificial inoculation."

The increase in size of vines is not the only benefit expected as the bacteria in the inoculant attach themselves to the roots of the plant, forming small nodules and taking nitrogen from the air, adding it to the soil. Nitrogen is the most expensive element found in fertilizers and is very essential to normal plant growth.

Some of the growers who are inoculating are H. M. Gilbert and H. R. Gilbert of Carbon, Dick Weeks and J. L. Brown of Alameda and W. B. Starr of Dan Horn. The county agent advises that he still has some inoculant on hand if there are any interested.
