#### CITY OF CISCO TO PRESS BACK TAX PAYMENTS

The City Commission at its regu- lar session Tuesday night passed an ordinance relative to tax payments making the penalty more lenient in some respects to the end that delin- quents may be encouraged to pay without the cost of suits that are to be instituted where parties are thought to be able to meet the payment now due, and past due. The essential features of the ordi- nance are the reduction of interest penalty from 10 per cent to 8 per cent and it is to be temporary as to time in force. No penalty is to be placed on 1934 and prior taxes, and cities times of partial payments of taxes through the year without penalty. All delin- quent taxes to bear an interest rate of six per cent until paid ex- cept those prior to 1934 which are to draw interest from July 1, 1935. Some suits have already been in- stituted and others are to be filed at once it is announced. The city will need the tax money in order to carry on its regular expense budget and to further prosecute the settling plant work which is going on at Lake Cisco.

FORT WORTH, June 10 — (UP)—One of the largest crowds in the city's history is expected here Friday afternoon to greet the Presi- dent of the United States and Mrs. Roosevelt upon their arrival by motor from Dallas. Plans for handling the huge crowd have been completed with orders for 1,200 soldiers and 200 police along the line of march for the presidential party. While here, the chief executive will be the guest of his son and daughter-in-law Elliott and Mrs. Roosevelt.

#### Estridge Was Sane, Mental Expert Says

HOUSTON, June 10 — (UP)—Testi- mony of a psychiatrist called by the state here today in murder trial of C. Edgar Estridge clashed with that presented by mental experts who appeared for the defense. Dr. Frank Harrison, Dallas, told a district court jury today that the crime-fighting Baptist minister was "perfectly sane and normal men- tally" when he killed police chief Ed O'Rilly at Orange on May 29, 1935. Dr. Harrison was the first re- buttal witness called after J. J. Collins, chief defense attorney, rested the preacher's case this morning. He said he examined Estridge in June, 1935. "I found nothing to indicate he did not know right from wrong," the psychiatrist said.

## Eastland County Record, Good or Bad?

In a discussion which took place at the city hall Tuesday started by Henry Stubblefield's visit to Abilene district court Monday brought out some interesting facts about Eastland county's law enforcement and her reputation concerning criminality within her boundaries.

Mr. Stubblefield said that out of 27 criminal prosecutions in the court, 24 were convicted and about half of those cases were from Eastland county. He said he felt ashamed of the record his county was making as the home of criminals. Then Grant Daniels made this suggestion which is worthy of thought: The fact that Eastland county figures largely in the court proceedings, shows that Eastland county officers are about their duties. They are finding their criminals and bringing them before the tribunal of justice whereas other counties are not enforcing their laws and therefore, are not figuring largely in the courts.

So there are the two views of the situation. One at first thought would say that our county has not had its laws enforced and hence breeds many criminals, while on the other hand, this line of thought, that the reason Eastland county is figuring so largely in the courts is because of the very fact that officers are attempting to enforce its laws and bring criminals to justice. So there we are. It has become a well known fact that criminals do not want to be tried in Callahan county on account of the fact that Callahan jurors always bring in verdicts commensurate with the crime and may it not be that Eastland county may gain this same kind of reputation if Eastland county jurors will make proper findings in cases brought for trial. The matter is important and worthy of study.

## Liquor Violations Draw Penalties— Eastland County Figures Prominently

Monday and Tuesday were busy days in Judge Whit Davidson's court at Abilene and Eastland county records give unfavorable publicity to the county but show the officers have been on the job.

In violation of the liquor taxing act, Paul Tomlin pleaded guilty and drew a sentence of a year and a day in the El Reno reformatory, in Oklahoma. The suit was dismissed as to James T. Tomlin and Clarence Weatherston.

Paul Tomlin also was a defendant in another liquor count, to which he pleaded guilty and was given a year and a day, suspended for five years. Marion Bell, named jointly in the complaint, had imposition of sentence suspended for five years. The cases originated in Eastland county.

The following Eastland county citizens, all pleading guilty, were sentenced for violation of the liquor taxing act:

Mack Brannin, Cisco, year and a day in Leavenworth, suspended for two years.

Vance Edward Moates, Cisco, drew a year and a day in El Reno reformatory for violation of the Dyer Act. Jeff Gilbert, named in the same complaint, was given a term of a year and a day in El Reno, suspended for two years.

Quenville Ingram drew a year and a day in El Reno, suspended for five years, when he pleaded guilty to violation of the liquor taxing act. On the same count, Calvin Ingram and Ed Ingram, who also pleaded guilty to the charge, were told by the court that imposition of sentence would be suspended for five years. All three are from Eastland county.

Payette Campbell, year and a day in Leavenworth.

Ernest Prittle was assessed a term of a year and a day in El Reno, suspended for five years, for violation of the white slave traffic act.

Cases continued until next session of court were those of John Boyd, Harold Terry, Charlie H. Sparks and

Jim Elliott, Cisco, year and a day in Leavenworth, suspended for two years.

George L. Ingram, Cisco, year and a day in Leavenworth on first count, and two years in Leavenworth, suspended for two years on second count.

Fred Tarter, Cisco, two years in Leavenworth on each of two counts, making a term of four years.

Ida White, Eastland, year and a day at Alderson training school in one case and year and a day, suspended for two year period following Alderson term, another case.

Millie Jenkins, Cisco, negress, year and a day in Alderson, suspended for two years.

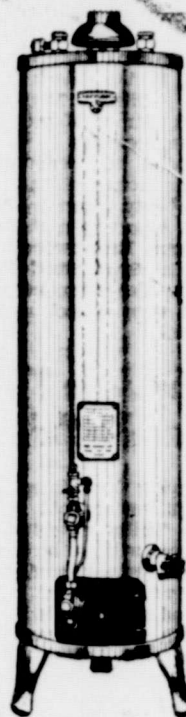
